Purpose of Bill:	Establishes within DOE the youth civil defense corps. Requires BOE to adopt standards and curriculum for student participation.

Department's Position:

The Department of Education (Department) recognizes the intent of SB 2783 and offers comments.

The federal Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program is currently administered by the counties (https://www.honolulu.gov/demvolunteer/cert.html). CERT training is free. Youth ages 14-17 may attend with a parent or legal guardian. Additionally, schools may arrange for CERT training for their students. High schools, including Campbell, Farrington, Kapaa, Roosevelt and Waimea, have participated in the CERT program. This program, fully developed and implemented, may be considered in lieu of creating and establishing a new Youth Civil Defense Corps program in the Department.

Should this measure pass, the Department is concerned about the potential cost implications and implementation requirements associated with a new start-up youth civil defense corps program, including but not limited to operations, administration, and lack of qualified personnel and expertise.
