2 Department Testimony: The Department supports this bill and defers to the Department of
3 Education (DOE) for issues on implementation.

The purpose of this bill is to include blood glucose monitoring by the student and DOE 4 employees and agents who volunteer to assist a student with blood glucose monitoring. Public 5 Health Nursing Branch currently provides education and training on proper administration of 6 7 insulin and glucagon in the school setting. Students requiring diabetes care in the school setting are referred to a Department of Health public health nurse (PHN). The PHN completes a 8 comprehensive assessment and develops an individual student diabetes plan. This plan, which is 9 based on the students needs, may include education to school personnel on diabetes, blood sugar 10 testing, insulin and glucagon administration, and emergency action plans for hyperglycemia or 11 hypoglycemia. Training is based on the American Diabetes Association guidelines. 12 13 Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony.

Dear Senator Kidani and Members of the Senate Committee on Education:

On behalf of the American Diabetes Association (ADA) we thank you for your past support and passage of Act 214 in 2015. We request your support once again of **SB2975**.

Your support of <u>SB2975</u> will ensure the intent of the legislature to continue to protect keiki with diabetes in schools by offering further clarity in the language.

The current law for students with diabetes includes liability protections and is set forth in Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) §302A-1164, as follows: (h) Any person, except for a qualified health care professional providing the training required in subsection (g), who acts in accordance with the requirements of this section shall be immune from any civil or criminal liability arising from these acts, except where the person's conduct would constitute gross negligence, willful and wanton misconduct, or intentional misconduct.

School employees are being told they are unable to volunteer because there is not enough liability protection for them. This position appears to stem from a perception that certain activities that are normally associated with routine assistance to students with diabetes are not covered by HRS §302A-1164. While the language of that statute was never intended to be construed so strictly, SB2975 seeks to eliminate any such ambiguity by amending the statutory language to specifically include those actions. Doing so will ensure that volunteers who provide diabetes care assistance will be fully protected from liability under HRS §302A-1164(h). SB2975 also seeks to clarify and ensure that students who are capable of doing so are allowed to self-manage their diabetes care.

Please support SB 2975's current language and include:

- increased clarity in language for liability protections for staff who volunteer to assist students with diabetes such as assisting a student with blood glucose monitoring; and
- allow students with diabetes to possess, at all times, necessary supplies and equipment to perform blood glucose monitoring and treatment activities under the student's diabetes medical management plan.

I would greatly appreciate your consideration and support of SB2975 to ensure that students with diabetes are safe at school and able to succeed academically.
