Raises the age from twelve to eighteen of passengers permitted to ride in the bed of a pickup truck under certain conditions. #### Testimony COMMENTING on SB0345 Relating to Passengers Riding in Bed of Pickup Trucks

1 Fiscal Implications: None

2 **Department Testimony:** We appreciate the intent of SB 345, however, recommend including the

3 language in SB 203 Section 291-14 (2) (d), which designates an appropriate fine and a mechanism for

4 the fine to be collected and utilized.

5 This measure seeks to reduce injuries and death to persons riding in the back of pickup trucks. The most

6 effective means for preventing truckbed injuries and fatalities is to prohibit any and all passengers from

7 riding in the cargo area of pickup trucks. SB 345 extends this protection for passengers up to age 19.

8 Truckbeds were designed to carry cargo and not passengers. There are no national safety standards

9 that support securing passengers in the back of pickup trucks. As a result, passengers in the bed of

10 pickup trucks are at increased risk of death and serious injury. In Hawaii, there have been 33 truck bed

11 passengers killed in traffic crashes since 1996. More than one-third (36%, or 12) of the 33 victims were

12 18 years of age or younger. There have only been 3 victims over the most recent 5 years (2009-2013),

13 and all 3 were under 19 years of age.

14 Offered Amendments: The recommends language in SB 203 Section 291-14 (2) (d) states,

- "any person who violates this section shall be subject to a [fine]: <u>(1)</u> Fine of [\$25] <u>\$45</u> for each
  violation[; provided that any person who violates subsection (c) shall be subject to a fine of \$50
  for each separate violation.];
- 18 (2) Surcharge of \$10 which shall be deposited into the neurotrauma special fund established
  19 pursuant to section 321H-4; and
- 20 (3) Surcharge of \$10 which shall be deposited into the trauma system special fund
  21 established pursuant to section 321-22.5."

#### TESTIMONY OF ROBERT TOYOFUKU ON BEHALF OF THE HAWAII ASSOCIATION FOR JUSTICE (HAJ) IN OPPOSITION TO S.B. NO. 345

To: Chairman Clarence K. Nishihara and Members of the Senate Committee on Transportation:

My name is Bob Toyofuku and I am presenting this testimony on behalf of the Hawaii Association for Justice (HAJ) in OPPOSITION to S.B. No. 345, relating to Passengers Riding in Bed of Pickup Trucks.

The Hawaii Association For Justice fully supports raising the age to 18 for anyone to ride in the back of a pickup truck. Riding in the back of a pickup truck obviously poses increased risk of injury in a vehicle crash and minors are not felt to possess the maturity and capacity to assess the risks associated with riding in the bed of a pickup truck.

However, the provision in the bill that provides: "Any passenger in the bed or loadcarrying area of a pickup truck shall be deemed to have assumed the risk of injury or death as a result of an accident or injury occurring while the vehicle is in operation," is bad public policy and a poor means of promoting safe driving and protecting public safety.

An unintended consequence of this provision is that it actually discourages safe driving. For example, if someone is riding in the back of a pickup truck, a drunk driver could injure or kill the pickup bed passenger and not be responsible because the pickup bed passenger is deemed to have assumed the risk. Assumption of the risk is a doctrine of the old common law that disqualified a person from recovering for the negligent infliction of injury or death regardless of how bad the negligent conduct was or how innocent the assumption of the risk. This produced grossly unfair results that led to the abandonment of assumption of the risk. This unfairness is apparent when you consider that drunk or reckless speeding drivers would be able to injure or kill people riding in pickup beds without responsibility and those hurt or killed would have no right of recovery.

In addition, for many people who need pickups, there is simply no practical alternative to riding in the bed. For example, people with businesses such as yard workers, small contractors,

rubbish haulers, small retailers, and many more, need trucks but are not rich enough to buy and maintain another car are unfairly discriminated against simply because they are too poor to buy additional cars. Construction workers who are shuttled to job sites would also unfairly lose their rights through no fault or choice of their own.

HAJ recognizes that this measure is well intended; however, its unintended consequences outweigh its benefits. It is requested that this measure be held or amended to delete subsection (d) relating to assumption of the risk.
