Title of Bill:	SB 0361 RELATING TO EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES.
Purpose of Bill:	Allows home schooled students to participate on an equal basis in extracurricular activities offered at the public school they would otherwise be required to attend.

Department's Position:

The Department of Education (Department) appreciates the opportunity to provide comments on SB 361. Respectfully, we will defer taking a position until the Board of Education (Board) is given the opportunity to review this measure.

Last year, the Board submitted its report in response to the 2013 Senate Concurrent Resolution (SCR) 76 on this subject to the 2014 Legislature. The Board convened a stakeholder group to research models and best practices on home schooled student participation in public school extracurricular activities and sports and explore implementation of such a program in Hawaii.

In its report, the Board concluded:

- In light of the discussion at the stakeholder meeting wherein the issues and questions surrounding the particular seven items related to best practices were discussed but remained unsolved and the apparent lack of strong support of this initiative at this time, the Board is unable to recommend policy changes.
- The responses to the questions raised, particularly about the ongoing monitoring of the academic progress of homeschooled students and requisite funding for administration were paramount and require further examination before any policy decision and implementation can be considered.
- It is important to note that the principal stakeholders explained that their administrative responsibilities are tremendous and oversight and monitoring of the variety of curriculum that homeschoolers utilized would put a particular strain on their workload.
- The Homeschool representatives also noted that indicative of a parent's choice to homeschool is the desire to individually select curriculum, thus, determining a means to evaluate progress will be difficult.
- The Board is willing to relook at this issue at any time in the future should the need to arise.

• The stakeholder input was extremely valuable to identifying the salient issues that impact Hawaii's schools and Hawaii's homeschoolers. The Homeschool community is an important part of Hawaii's student population.

Bills relating to public education with policy implications are being reviewed by the Board. Positions taken will be subsequently shared with the appropriate legislative committees.

Fiscal Implications: If a disease outbreak were to occur in a school setting, the Department would be responsible for costs associated with the outbreak investigation as well as the costs of any vaccines administered with the intent of preventing further disease transmission.

4 Department Testimony: Although the Department appreciates the intent of this measure, the 5 Department strongly recommends that any home schooled child who wishes to participate in an 6 extracurricular activity meet the same health requirements required of any student attending 7 school in Hawaii, outlined in HRS §§302A-1154 through 1157. Introduction of a communicable 8 disease such as measles or pertussis (whooping cough) into an environment where many children 9 are closely congregated could lead to outbreaks, jeopardizing the health of the students, school 10 faculty/staff, and the community should transmission occur.

11 **Offered Amendments:** The Department respectfully suggests the following amendment to

12 SB361, "A home schooled child who wishes to participate in an extracurricular activity shall

13 meet the <u>health requirements for school entrance as delineated in HRS §§302A-1154 through</u>

14 <u>1157 prior to participation in school-based activities as well as the participation requirements and</u>

restrictions for that activity, including maintaining appropriate grade point averages and paying

16 appropriate fees; provided that the requirements or restrictions shall not be inconsistent with this

17 section. "
