The State Public Charter School Commission ("Commission") appreciates the opportunity to submit this testimony in support of the intent of Senate Bill 600, "Making an Emergency Appropriation for Kua o ka La Public Charter School and the Hawaii Academy of Arts and Science Public Charter School," which appropriates emergency funds to Kua o ka Lā New Century Public Charter School ("Kua o ka La") and the Hawaii Academy of Arts & Science Public Charter School ("HAAS") for costs associated with the threat of lava flow on the island of Hawaii.

Due to the uncertainty of this natural disaster, the nature and full extent of the resulting impacts and costs are as yet unknown, but the charter school sector lacks funding sources that can be directed or diverted to emergency purposes akin to the impressive efforts that have been implemented by the Department of Education ("DOE") as to DOE schools in the area.

Both HAAS and Kua o ka La report lower than projected enrollment as residents relocate away from the area. HAAS is in the direct path of the flow in Pahoa. Depending on the flow, HAAS could lose the use of its main campus facility. Alternative sites on both sides of the projected flow likely would require facilities investment or at least retrofitting for school purposes. In addition, HAAS staff and students may lose access to one or more schools sites. Providing instruction on both sides of the flow may entail additional staffing costs.

The impact to Kua o Ka La, the main campus of which is located on the coast south of Pahoa, so far has been costs associated with expanding its Hilo site in anticipation of some students being cut off from access to the main campus. The school also is concerned about a potential influx of students, depending on the trajectory of the flow and its impact on transportation.

The schools have been working directly with Senator Russell Ruderman on this legislation, and the Commission also has relayed the school's costs projections, on which this appropriation is based, to the Office of the Governor, the Senate Committee on Ways and Means, and the House Committee on Finance. Our understanding is that other potential means of providing support also are being explored, but at this time we strongly urge this Committee to report this measure out to preserve this legislative vehicle as an option.

The Administration of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) will recommend to the Board of Trustees a position of **SUPPORT** on SB600, which provides emergency relief to two charter schools impacted by the Kīlauea lava flow.

Kua o Ka Lā and the Hawai'i Academy of Arts and Science are two public charter schools that educate and nurture keikī in the Pāhoa region. Unfortunately, the Kīlauea lava flow has substantially disrupted the operation of these schools, along with their students' academic development.

OHA has recognized the need for emergency funding to the Pāhoa area due to the Kīlauea lava flow, and has appropriated \$300,000 to provide a one-time donation of \$500 per Native Hawaiian household in the area. This measure is consistent with OHA's concern for the impacts of the Kīlauea lava flow on the residents of Pāhoa, and believes that it will provide critical relief for the teachers and keikī of the affected charter schools.

OHA therefore urges the Committee to **PASS** SB600.

Dear Chair Tokuda and committee,

I am elated that the legislature is recognizing the need to support charter school students with proper facilities. There is a direct correlation between student achievement and proper facilities including good lighting, good ventilation, proper temperature controls, and well maintained buildings and grounds. It is true that charters have used their educational funds to support the basic facility needs in the past. Since the 2008-09 funding year, our per pupil funds have decreased by 30-35%, while our facilities fixed costs have risen. This has put an extreme burden on our academic programs, especially in the arts and sciences. We will be very grateful to receive support for our facilities and will be accountable for reporting use of the funds in our annual financial audits.

I do have a concern with using Federal Impact Aid funds towards facility financing. It is like the State requiring putting in Federal Impact Aid funds into its CIP projects. The impact aid should have been distributed to the school in the year it was allotted for and not held for future use in a facility funding project. There are many needs operationally for the funds. One of the department's use of these funds is to subsidize the huge cost of substitute teachers. Charter Schools do not get any support for substitute teachers.

The debt service for the department is around \$1600 per pupil. Charters have gotten by with more modest facilities, so that figure may be unreasonable as a per pupil amount for charter school facilities. However, for the past 13 years (with exception of 2008), we have received zero dollars. There were two years where about \$200 per pupil was "carved" out of our per pupil allocation, but it did not add extra money to our budget. We ask you to support the children in our public charter schools as you do in other public schools in the State. They deserve this basic need of education. Food and transportation are the other basic needs that remain unsupported in charter schools, but we are willing to address these basics one at a time. This will be a major step forward for our children in public charter schools.

Dear Chair Kidani and Committee,

My name is Jordan Drewer and I am a Junior and the Student Representative on the Board of Directors at the Hawaii Academy of Arts and Sciences PCS (HAAS). I come before you today to speak in support of Senate Bill 600. Being a student representative, I hope to give you a different perspective into charter schools. Many people look at the costs of facilities, the cost of paying staff, and the education. But what isn't looked at very often is the success of students in schools.

I started at HAAS in 2010 as a sixth grader, and loved the school immediately. Being with HAAS for the last 5 years has greatly influenced my education and career plan. In seventh grade I joined the robotics program, and my Lego NXT team made it to states. Seventh grade also marked the beginning of my STEM career within HAAS. The STEM Program has been an extremely beneficial class to myself and fellow students. I found my interest in Science and Technology, as well as learned the valuable education to go far in life. This education led to the STEM group I was part of that were credited with inventing the HAAS Power Pole Protectors as well as the Vog Scrubber.

Charter Schools are amazing, the way they are put together creates an engaging environment for my fellow students. An environment without bullying, without fighting or a lot of the drama that some schools have. Students love going to these schools, even committing to lengths such as hitchhiking to get to school.

I want to ask the Chair and committee a question, when you were in high school what class do you remember most? At HAAS we have classes such as STEM, art, surf class and skate class that draw students to the schools. These classes motivate them to do well within the rest of the school. These are classes that the students all enjoy, that they take because it will help them with the career they have in mind. But not having the funding of public schools hinders the extent the schools can go to teach students. The three greatest hindrances are; No funding for transportation, not enough funding for food, and no facility funding. Any money that we have to put towards these three areas has to come out of our per-pupil funding that should be going towards facilities and equipment to educate the children.

Not having money for transportation greatly affects the lives of students. If they have no set way to get to school, they have to go to lengths such as waking up very early to catch the Hele-On bus that doesn't even always get to school before it starts, or even hitchhiking to get to school.

In the area of food, HAAS uses the Title 1 NSLP to bring in money for lunch, but we only get about \$3.45 when the average meal costs \$5.50. This is money that is paid for in public schools, but in HAAS it comes out of our per-pupil funding, taking money away from our learning.

The last of the three, and in some eyes the greatest of the three hindrances is facility funding. HAAS cannot afford the costs to build a cafeteria for students to eat in, a gym so students can have a dry place to do PE classes, or even enough classrooms for all the classes. The STEM class has to share the room with a math class, causing more cramped conditions as well as not letting STEM have all the room it needs to grow. We do not even have a chemistry lab in our science classroom.

In some charter schools, the students take it upon themselves to find money to have things like sports and other student programs. A great example comes from the student body of HAAS. In the fall of 2013, myself and a group of students came up with the idea to create a student run organization called Hope for HAAS to fund the programs that we feel HAAS should have. Programs such as a sports program, a drama program, and even the growth of the STEM program. These are all programs HAAS simply doesn't have the money to support and help grow. This project raised the morale and motivation of the students involved immensely.

When the lava started to head towards my school and we didn't receive emergency funding, we changed the direction from improving the programs to raising money for relocating our campus if the need arose. It's times like these when students take the initiative and decide to do everything they can for their schools, that make charter schools the way they are. It's times like these that make charter schools unique. I hope that this convinces you to support Senate Bill 600, for it will improve the stability of the schools in situations of emergencies such as the lava and provide many children in hawaii with a brighter future and a better education.

Please pass this bill so both schools can be prepared to provide strong continual support for their students and the Puna community!
