SB 627 - RELATING TO HIGH TECHNOLOGY

Chairs Taniguchi and Wakai, Vice Chairs Inouye and Slom, and members of the committees:

The University of Hawai`i strongly opposes SB 627 which requires the University of Hawai'i to extend the current land lease with the High Technology Development Corporation for no less than 10 years from the date of expiration of the existing lease.

In 1990, the University of Hawai'i entered into an agreement under which the Mānoa Innovation Center (MIC), constructed on University land, was to be leased to the High Technology Development Corporation (HTDC) for a 25-year term, after which the facility was to revert to UH. All parties agreed, in writing, to this arrangement.

Since taking office last year, UH President David Lassner has set forth his Strategic Directions 2015-21, which comprises of four key initiatives for the University of Hawai'i. One of them is the Hawai'i Innovation Initiative, a bold and proactive partnership with the local private sector and government to build a thriving innovation, research, education and training enterprise that will develop a third major economic sector for the state -- fueled by UH's plans to aggressively commercialize its research and to employ and develop top researchers in several focus areas over the next decade.

In order to accomplish this, new and remodeled facilities are essential and an expanded MIC will play an important role in achieving that goal. The University is still in the formative stages of defining exactly what form and structure will best support this needed innovation agenda. However, it is expected that these activities will be based at the Mānoa Innovation Center, which is already a significant site for the University's research enterprise. In fact, UH and its related programs are already the single largest set of tenants in the facility and pays the largest portion of the rent, which goes to support HTDC operations. The University could occupy all the existing space at MIC, with its programs that are renting facilities elsewhere, immediately.

The University does support the development of a technology park on O'ahu, the only island without such a capability. However, MIC is not large enough to house the

activities normally found within a technology park, so another venue should be found to provide full support for emerging technology businesses. HTDC would be the natural organization to lead such an initiative and UH would support them.

The University of Hawai`i believes this is an opportune time for the State to invest in the development of high technology to diversify and strengthen the local economy. However, this should not be done at the expense of research growth and the new innovation agenda developed by UH.

The University of Hawai`i urges the joint committee to preserve the original agreement made with UH at the time MIC was constructed by not passing this measure.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on this important bill. The High Technology Development Corporation (HTDC) **strongly supports** SB627 relating to extending the land lease at the Manoa Innovation Center.

This past year the Board of Directors of HTDC set forth a vision to drive economic growth by facilitating innovation in all sectors of the economy. Specifically, we set an ambitious goal calling for the creation of 80,000 innovation jobs that pay \$80,000 or more by 2030. In connection with this 80|80 initiative, we seek to create an environment that inspires our younger generations to come back to Hawaii, that emboldens our current workforce to stretch beyond their imagination, and that strives for a place where the brightest minds choose to work.

In order to be successful in this endeavor, we must all be willing to embrace change, be willing to fail and learn from that failure, give people the confidence to try things they would not ordinarily attempt, and to keep going even though the outcome is unknown, just because it is worth trying. Together we can succeed.

However, we cannot focus our efforts on job creation if we are preoccupied with finding new space and relocating the twenty six (26) businesses (Activision, ADNOVIV, AMEL Technologies, Archinoetics, Autism Training Solutions, Blackhawk, CARDAX, Cut Collective, Dev League LLC, Financial Planning Hawaii, Hawaiian Cool Water, Imua Design Group Inc., Kuehnle Agrosystems Co., LLC, Lesson Tracks, Liko Film Incubator, LLC, PICHTER, PV Tech, Real Estate Strategies, Shopping Made Mobile, Slickage Studios, Seress, LLC dba SOS Tech Solutions, Spectrum Photonics, Startup Capital Ventures, Sudukrew Solutions, Tutor Hawaii, Undefeated Games, Inc., Way Sine) currently generating jobs in the Manoa Innovation Center. If this legislation does not go through, these businesses will have the additional burden and uncertainty associated with relocation, in addition to their everyday stresses of running a startup business.

On a higher level, this legislation sends a larger message to the innovation community – that the legislature supports innovation and new job creation.

HTDC maybe one of the best kept secrets of the State of Hawaii. In the past year, new HTDC projects include construction of the Entrepreneur's Sandbox in Kakaako, development of three technology parks, and the Neighbor Island Innovation Initiative. I have attached for your perusal a high level fact sheet that shows our impact in FY2013. Highlights include : HTDC SBIR program provided matching funding to 23 Hawaii based companies that received over \$2.7 million in federal Small Business Innovation Research Grants. MIC Incubator tenant Hawaii Coolwater acquired a Califonia based business to increase its global sales. Over 90 graduate companies had 2013 sales of 56 million and contributed \$10 million to the Hawaii tax base. Also attached is the HTDC MIC graduate survey for your information.

The unfortunate aspect is that most of these efforts and our efforts in creating the high wage job opportunities for our future generations will come to a halt if this legislation does not move forward.

We are continuing our discussions with the University of Hawaii to extend the lease, but are also cognizant of the fact that this issue has been discussed for the past ten years without resolution despite annual attempts by HTDC to expand general funds, construct an alternate site, or negotiate an extension. With the lease expiring in 2 months, we feel the issue requires legislative attention.

Chairs Taniguchi and Wakai, Vice Chairs Inouye and Slom, and Members of the Committees on Higher Education and the Arts and Economic Development & Technology.

The High Technology Development Corporation (HTDC) **strongly supports** SB627 relating to extending the land lease at the Manoa Innovation Center.

The current land lease arrangement expires in April 2015. While HTDC continues discussions with the University of Hawaii (UH) on an extension for the land lease at the Manoa Innovation Center (MIC), the potential loss of Oahu's only technology business incubator and the potential shut down of HTDC remains a statewide concern deserving legislative attention.

MIC is home to 26 tenant companies and 16 companies who are part of the virtual office program. The incubator provides special leasing rates for startup companies to help offset the high costs of company creation. The incubator also provides flexible month to month leases with minimal security deposit which significantly reduces the typical risks associated with starting a business.

Mentoring by HTDC helps the companies get through major growth hurdles to become solid businesses that contribute to the tax base. All of these benefits would not be economically feasible in a privately run incubator, but are cited as the most crucial needs by entrepreneurs in the program. With the MIC, HTDC has efficiently managed this program with a modest budget and has leveraged its efforts to deliver business assistance programs throughout the state. The loss of the incubator would mean the current tenants and the next generation of new startups would have to find a new place to start. This would undoubtedly result in slower growth for companies, fewer innovation jobs, and would strain Hawaii's credibility for innovation.

The MIC has graduated over 90 companies representing over 300 high wage jobs, nearly \$24 million in investment, and \$56 million in revenue in 2013. The MIC is the birth place for Hawaii's most successful technology companies: Digital Island (1999 \$60MM IPO), Hoku Scientific (2005 \$21MM IPO), and Blue Lava Wireless (2005 Acquired for \$137MM) to name a few. The continued contributions to Hawaii from the founders of these companies are significant. Specifically, Henk Rogers, founder of Tetris and several other startups, who has continued to reinvest in Hawaii's future through the Blue Startups accelerator and the Blue Planet Foundation.

The MIC is the physical front door for new companies and organizations looking to engage with the innovation network. Through the years, the MIC has been a showcase for legislators and VIPs such as Steve Case to learn about the Hawaii tech startup environment. The MIC has also incubated many pilot programs including recent projects such as the INNOVATE Hawaii manufacturing accelerator program assisting the fashion industry; the Energy Excelerator program supporting renewable energy technology companies; and the XLR8UH program supporting new innovation companies with ties to the University of Hawaii. The first cohort of XLR8UH is graduating and several companies have already joined the tech incubator program at MIC.

While the loss of Oahu's only tech incubator is significant because of the loss of companies and jobs, the financial loss to HTDC could force the agency to shut down. Rent revenues generated by the incubator provide the funding for HTDC to operate its programs for innovative companies statewide. Specifically, the rent revenues cover:

- half the salary for each of the HTDC staff
- 100% of HTDC's technology & entrepreneur educational program budget
- match for HTDC's federal manufacturing program funding

HTDC's highly leveraged model generates \$8 of program funding for every \$1 of General Funds received.

Without the incubator programs and revenues generated HTDC could no longer function as the State's leader for Technology Based Economic Development. The loss of the MIC lease would result in HTDC cutting all its programs including new projects such as:

- Construction of the Entrepreneur's Sandbox in Kakaako through a federal grant
- Development of three technology parks
- Neighbor Island Innovation Initiative

HTDC started these new projects as part of its ambitious goal of creating 80,000 new tech and innovation jobs earning \$80,000 or more by 2030. The MIC remains a critical component of the infrastructure required for the innovation sector to flourish and due to the fiscal implications of the MIC land lease, HTDC is forced to address this issue first. Recognizing that:

- the legislature has the authority to act when the issue is a statewide matter of concern
- without the lease HTDC would not have any staff
- HTDC is integral to innovation and entrepreneurship which were prioritized in the State Plan by Act 133 last year

HTDC strongly supports SB627. Last legislative session, HTDC's \$23 million capital improvement project (CIP) budget request to build a new technology incubator in Kakaako did not make the final budget. This session, the same request for HTDC was eliminated in the final budget request due to lack of available CIP funding. HTDC is therefore unable to pursue the technology incubator project due to the funding.

HTDC is now under increased pressure to find a timely resolution to extending the MIC land lease in order to maintain its funding. HTDC is cognizant of the fact that increased General funding as a long term solution is a difficult proposition. Even if HTDC were fortunate enough to receive a CIP appropriation to build a new facility in Kakaako, the time to authorize funds, procure through the state system, perform the environmental impact survey, receive all required approvals, move through the appropriate HCDA hearings, and construct a new facility would take several years. Furthermore, once the facility opens, it will take some time to ramp up occupancy.

HTDC will continue its discussions with UH on a lease extension and intends to pursue an alternative site when CIP budget funding becomes available

I am Burt Lum, Executive Director of Hawaii Open Data, a non-profit dedicated to advancing open data principles in Hawaii and creating collaborative environments that foster civic innovation. We focus on improving data accessibility and integrity in support of public/private collaboration, government transparency and civic engagement. I am also Founder of Bytemarks, a technology consultancy, co-host of Bytemarks Cafe, a weekly science and technology show on Hawaii Public Radio and have reported on Hawaii's tech scene for many years.

As a tech supporter, I **strongly support SB627, Relating to High Technology**. Hawaii's growing environment for entrepreneurship, startups, business formation and tech innovation is reaching a critical mass and the High Technology Development Corporation (HTDC) is a key organization at the center of this activity.
