Fiscal Implications: Appropriated out of the general fund, the sum of \$200,000 or so much 1 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2015-2016 and the same sum or so much thereof as 2 may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 for the Hawaii Colorectal Cancer Screening and 3 Awareness Pilot Program to the Department of Health (DOH). 4 Department Testimony: The DOH appreciates the intent of SB0749, but defers to the 5 Governor's Executive Budget request. The DOH recognizes the importance of screening and 6 early detection of colorectal cancer. Colorectal cancer is the second leading cause of cancer 7 death in Hawaii and there are clear ethnic and gender disparities in colorectal cancer mortality. 8 In addition, colorectal cancer screening rates are much lower for those residing in low-income 9 households and those less than a high school education. 10 Since 1997, the Department has provided critical breast and cervical cancer screening and 11 early detection services to low-income, uninsured, and underinsured women through the Breast 12 and Cervical Cancer Control Program (BCCCP). The program's support has been instrumental 13 in helping community providers build the capacity and infrastructure needed to reach women 14 most at risk and raise community awareness around early detection. 15 Modeled after the BCCCP, a Colorectal Cancer Screening and Awareness Pilot Program 16 would increase awareness and screening rates, currently at 61 percent, of men and women over 17 the age of 50 in an effort to reach a goal of 80 percent by 2018. The activities would not be 18

19 sustainable beyond the proposed appropriation.

SB 749 – RELATING TO THE COLORECTAL CANCER SCREENING PILOT PROGRAM

Thank you for the opportunity to provide written comments in support of SB 749, which establishes the colorectal cancer screening pilot project and appropriates funds for it.

The American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN) is the nation's leading cancer advocacy organization. ACS CAN works with federal, state, and local government bodies to support evidence-based policy and legislative solutions designed to eliminate cancer as a major health problem.

Colorectal cancer, often referred to as colon cancer, affects about 900 people in Hawaii each year. Colorectal cancer is a dangerous and deadly cancer because precancerous polyps and early-stage colorectal cancer don't always cause symptoms, especially at first. This means that someone could have polyps or colorectal cancer and not know it. That is why having a screening test is so important.

The purpose of this measure is to establish a program to screen for colorectal cancer for uninsured and underinsured individuals. Instead of creating a completely new program, this pilot program closely resembles the existing breast and cervical cancer screening program as a model. This measure was drafted in collaboration with the Department of Health.

The Queen's Health Systems would like to provide support for SB 749, which would authorize and fund the Hawaii Colorectal Cancer Screening and Awareness Pilot Program.
