Statement of George D. Szigeti Chief Executive Officer Hawai'i Tourism Authority on SB 83 Relating to Appropriations House Committee on Tourism Wednesday, March 16, 2016 10:00am Conference Room 312

The Hawai'i Tourism Authority (HTA) offers the following **testimony opposing** SB 83 to the extent the bill would appropriate money from the Tourism Special Fund to pay for travel expenses and subsidies incurred by the University of Hawai'i's (UH) intercollegiate athletics program.

We have tremendous aloha for the UH athletics program. Our opposition to SB 83 is limited to paying for travel expenses and subsidies from the Tourism Special Fund. Under HRS § 201B-11, the Tourism Special Fund is to be used to carry out HTA's mandate. Under that mandate, HTA is directed to promote Hawai'i as a premier visitor destination and integrate the interests of visitors, the community and the visitor industry. The proposal to fund expenses and subsidies incurred by the UH athletics program is far removed from HTA's mandate and the purpose of the Tourism Special Fund. Put simply, there is no nexus between the proposed expenditure and the purpose of the fund.

Equally important, any diversion from the Tourism Special Fund will negatively affect HTA's efforts to market Hawai'i and attract visitors to the state. The visitor industry is the largest part of our economy. We have experienced growth for four years. In 2015, total visitor arrivals increased by more than 4 percent, and visitor spending is projected to have generated \$28.2 billion in sales for the state's economy, provided \$1.75 billion in state tax revenue and supported more than 181,500 jobs in the visitor industry and related sectors.

Now is not the time to invest *less* in developing and maintaining the industry that contributes so much to our state. Hawai'i faces stiff competition from other global destinations, many of which have substantially more marketing funds at their disposal. If we take money from the Tourism Special Fund for other purposes, we undermine our commitment to invest in the visitor industry.

HTA is proud to sponsor sporting events in Hawai'i, including the Diamond Head Classic, the Maui Invitational, the Hawai'i Bowl, PGA Tour events and Ironman events. Hosting major sporting events in Hawai'i draws visitors to the state and generates substantial media exposure, which together produce a manifold return on investment. In 2016, HTA has committed to supporting 19 sports events statewide and counting, with a projected economic impact of at least \$144 million.

The same direct connection and benefit to the visitor economy cannot be said of funding travel expenses for UH college athletes. UH is a great institutional asset of the state. At HTA, we are proud to cheer for our UH teams. However, UH must look to its operating budget to pay for its athletes' travel expenses. The Tourism Special Fund has a different purpose—a purpose that is too important to the state to be diverted.

Aloha Chair Brower and Committee Members,

I serve as Chair of the Board of Directors for the Hawai'i Tourism Authority (HTA) and would like to register my opposition to Senate Bill 83.

As well intended as SB83 is for supporting University of Hawai'i sports and its student-athletes, its enactment would come at the expense of Hawai'i's tourism industry and, specifically, the numerous community, cultural and environmental programs that HTA supports annually.

This year alone, HTA is providing \$3.3 million in funding to support 162 nonprofit groups statewide that are dedicated to presenting events, festivals and programs perpetuating the special qualities of Hawai'i's culture and way of life.

Consider that if SB83 becomes law and a minimum of \$3 million is taken away from HTA and given to the University of Hawai'i, HTA will have to assess making cuts to marketing and programs that we support.

The State of Hawai'i needs to support University of Hawai'i athletics to the best of its ability, but accomplishing this by effectively weakening HTA's capability to support Hawai'i tourism and community programs statewide is the wrong decision.

I respectfully request that HTA's budget remain intact, so that we can continue to support community programs that mean so much to our residents and visitors.

On behalf of Hawaii Tourism Japan, I respectfully submit the following written testimony in <u>opposition</u> to S.B. No. 83, SD1, relating to appropriations, which is to be heard by your Committee on Tourism on March 16, 2016.

My name is Eric Takahata and I am the Managing Director for Hawaii Tourism Japan, the designated marketing contractor for the Hawaii Tourism Authority (HTA) in the Japan market. We provide a full range of comprehensive marketing management services for the destination of Hawaii in the Japan market.

In Hawaii's tourism industry, the Japan market has played a significant role in Hawaii's economy for the last 35 years. It is the largest international market and the third largest market overall, representing approximately 1.5 million visitors, and over \$2B in expenditures to Hawaii annually.

We have concerns that redirecting funds from the Tourism Special Fund, as provided in S.B. No. 83, SD1, to other interests outside of HTA may negatively impact the availability of dedicated funds toward the Japan Market. Reduced resources will inevitably result in the need to eliminate marketing activities and possibly compromising Hawaii's market position in Japan.

We kindly ask that you carefully consider the possible economic consequences this measure may have in Hawaii's visitor industry. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony and for your consideration.

SB 83 SD1 - RELATING TO APPROPRIATIONS

Chair Brower, Vice Chair Ohno, and members of the committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony in support of SB 83 SD1, which will appropriate funds from the tourism special fund for travel expenses and subsidies incurred for the intercollegiate athletics programs at the University of Hawai'i.

The University of Hawai'i at Hilo Intercollegiate Athletics program competes at the NCAA Division II level and is a member of the Pacific West Conference which consists of 14 member institutions. Of those members, four are from Hawaii while the other ten are located on the mainland (9 in California/1 in Utah). University of Hawai'i at Mānoa competes at the NCAA Division I level and is a member of the Big West Conference and Mountain West Conference depending on the sport.

UH Hilo and UH Mānoa face unique travel challenges that are specific to Hawai'i. In fiscal year 2014-15, nearly 70% of UH Hilo's entire operations budget was consumed by team related travel (airfare, hotel, ground transportation, food, etc.) with costs continuing to rise. In fact, BYU-Hawaii has announced that they will be disbanding their athletic program after the 2016-17 seasons and the Pacific West Conference will be adding Biola University to take their place. This decision leaves UH Hilo with one less Hawai'i institution to schedule with and adds yet another mainland school thereby increasing costs even more.

In comparison, the average team travel costs for the mainland schools in the Pacific West Conference is 42%. Other NCAA Division II schools in the West Region that UH Hilo competes against such as in the California Collegiate Athletic Association allocate less than 30% of their operations budget for travel related expenses.

UH Hilo is the only school in the entire country that must travel by air for every contest away from home and also contend with limited, direct mainland service. We make 40plus team trips to O'ahu to compete against UH Manoa, and fellow Pacific West rivals, Chaminade University, Hawai'i Pacific University and BYU-Hawai'i. Despite these costs, intercollegiate athletics is a proven economic engine for the community and State. The economic impact has been well documented but one recent example is UH Hilo hosting the 25th Amer Ari Golf Invitational this past February. This prestigious event attracted 19 of the top NCAA Division I men's golf programs in the country that also brought parents and fans that occupied 700+ room nights as well as revenues from car rentals, restaurants and visitor attractions. This is an annual event that UH Hilo has hosted for the past 25 years.

Both UH Mānoa and UH Hilo athletic programs provide significant tangible economic benefits to the State in terms of additional visitors who travel with their teams to Hawai'i. We also provide significant intangible benefits to the communities we represent with home team pride. UH student-athletes are wonderful examples to our keiki in our communities and serve as strong role models while advocating the importance of education.

We appreciate the opportunity to provide testimony. The University of Hawai'i at Hilo respectfully requests passage of SB 83 SD1. Thank you for your time and consideration.

SB 83 SD1 - RELATING TO APPROPRIATIONS

Chair Brower, Vice Chair Ohno, and members of the committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on SB 83 SD1. This bill appropriates moneys from the tourism special fund for fiscal year 2016-2017 for travel expenses and subsidies incurred for the intercollegiate athletics program of the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa (UH Mānoa).

The UH Mānoa athletic department recently completed an in-depth comprehensive assessment of its program. The exercise resulted in four main conclusions:

- 1. The UH Mānoa athletic department is performing equal to or better than its peers both on-the-field and financially.
- 2. The financial model of expecting the UH Mānoa athletic department to breakeven is inconsistent with collegiate athletics nationwide where only 24 of 230 public universities operate in the black. Those 24 schools are members of the "Power Five" conferences such as the Pacific 12 or Southeastern (SEC) conferences which typically have media revenues of \$30.0 -\$40.0 million per school - - compared to the UH Mānoa's \$2.5 million of media revenues.
- 3. Collegiate athletic programs typically receive "external support" made up of three components: student fees, direct government support and institutional support. Compared to its peers, the UH Mānoa athletic department receives one of the lowest levels of support in the nation at 33% of revenues. In comparison, the average for peers in the Big West Conference is 67% and in the Mountain West Conference 41%.
- 4. The UH Mānoa has \$5.2 million of uniquely higher costs that our peers do not. Absent those higher costs, the UH Mānoa athletic department would have finished 2015 with a budget surplus rather than a deficit.

The University of Hawai'i incurs high expenses (as much as \$5.2 million) that are specific to Hawai'i and are not incurred by other athletic programs. SB 83 SD1 would help address the portion that is due to higher travel expenses and to subsidies. Based

on 2014 numbers reported to the NCAA Institutional Performance Program standardized data base, the UH Mānoa athletic department faces \$3.0 million of higher travel related costs, which includes travel subsidies and guarantees to bring teams to Hawai'i; as well as higher travel costs for our athletes to travel to the mainland as compared to our peer institutions.

This funding in SB 83 SD1 would help the school to continue offering competitive collegiate athletics events in the community as well as representing Hawai'i nationwide and internationally. As the only Division I athletic program in the State, the UH Mānoa plays a significant role by providing opportunities for local athletes to compete at home at the collegiate level; providing residents with fan experiences over hundreds of events yearly; and serve as a source of collective community pride as Hawai'i's Team.

In addition to the intangible benefits to the community and State, the UH Mānoa athletic program also provides significant economic benefits to the State. An economic impact study released by the UH Shidler College of Business on January 7, 2015 concluded that UH Mānoa athletics results in:

- \$66 million of direct spending on labor, goods and services, that generated \$128 million of Hawai'i business sales
- \$36.9 million of income for Hawai'i workers
- \$7.0 million of increased State tax collections, and
- 860 jobs created

Furthermore, the study estimated that the athletic program resulted in over 20,000 visitors to Hawai'i who came for athletic events that spent over \$31 million locally. The study did not quantify the benefit to tourism from the valuable exposure Hawai'i receives when UH Mānoa athletic events are played or televised outside Hawai'i, it is believed that impact would also be significant.

While the UH Mānoa believes it provides significant benefits to the community as well as economic benefits to the State, including in tourism; it does not take a position on the merits of the source of the funds proposed in SB 83 SD1. We will defer on the merits of the source of the funding, recognizing that the legislative process will allow for open dialogue on it and reasoned decision making after consideration of all positions offered. However, we do believe that UH athletics is a worthy endeavor that contributes significantly to the larger state economy and in that respect, warrants additional public investment.

The University of Hawai'i respectfully requests passage of SB 83 SD1. Thank you for your time and consideration of this testimony.

Thank you for this opportunity to offer my comments relating to SB 83, SD1.

As a life-long supporter of the University of Hawaii athletics program, may I humbly offer the following comments/concerns on this proposal:

- 1. I believe that there should be external support for the UH athletics program. However, I question whether monies should be diverted from the Tourism Special Fund in order to pay for the athletic programs' travel expenses and subsidies. As this fund was created to promote Hawaii as a premier visitor destination, there doesn't seem to be a nexus between the proposed appropriation and the mandate under HRS 201B-11.
- 2. As Mayor of Maui County, I am especially concerned due to the fact that HC&S recently announced that it will be shutting down the state's last sugar plantation. Over 650 employees will lose their jobs by the end of the year, and about 170 will become unemployed this month. With this closure, many of the displaced HC&S employees will be forced to look to employment in the visitor industry. As our county transitions to a significantly greater reliance upon tourism, now would NOT be the time to take any funds from the Tourism Special Fund. Instead, it would be a time to increase funding to attract visitors to the state and Maui County.
- 3. Again, while I have always supported UH athletics, it concerns me that monies would be taken from the Tourism Special Fund which could negatively impact our state's economy.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in **opposition** to this measure. The purpose of this measure is to make a \$3 million appropriation from the Tourism Special Fund for travel expenses and subsidies incurred by the intercollegiate athletics program of the University of Hawaii.

The Maui Council has not had the opportunity to take a formal position on this matter. Therefore, I am providing this testimony in my capacity as an individual member of the Council.

I oppose this measure for the following reasons:

- 1. The Tourism Special Fund exists to promote Hawaii and its visitor attractions. In Maui County, some of the fund's resources are used by nonprofit organizations and the County government, via grants from the Hawaii Tourism Authority, for cultural, educational, entertainment, and sporting events, including the Maui Invitational college basketball tournament, that attract visitors. Funding for these events should not be put in jeopardy by having Tourism Special Fund revenue redirected to non-visitor-related programs.
- 2. The counties are fighting for a fair share of Transient Accommodation Tax revenue during this session, to ensure the indispensable visitor services they provide can be sustained. The State already takes too much TAT revenue for non-tourism purposes. The TAT should not be further weakened by siphoning more revenue to unessential (though laudatory) purposes.

For the foregoing reasons, I **oppose** this measure.

Aloha from Kaua'i,

The County of Kaua'i, Office of Economic Development receives HTA product support via the County Product Enrichment Program. We provide a match to those funds and distribute grants to our long term beloved events and new events each year. In CY 2016 we have funded 38 different programs from the Mokihana Festival and Waimea Town Celebration to the Lāwa'i International Center programs and the Festival of Lights. Many events have used this funding and taken a small community only event and built it up so that it can be more inclusive of our visitors.

Although Kaua'i remains huge fans of the UH Athletic Department Programs, we do not agree with pulling funding from the Tourism Special Fund which supports these programs on our islands. They not only reach visitors but they are a staple for our Kama'āina who enjoy these events as a break from lives spent working in a 24/7 visitor industry world.

The Hawai'i Tourism Authority's cash investment towards operational expenses has produced two positive benefits. One is that the investment was multiplied more than seven times in overall cost; the other was that the investment was an integral component of establishing these events as part of the overall visitor (and residential) experience.

The Hawai'i Tourism Authority and the County of Kaua'i's investment in the Product Enrichment Program is shown to provide not only economic support for Kauai and Hawaii vendors, contractors and suppliers, but to enhance and develop a positive visitor experience. In addition, the local community derives a benefit from being involved in these events as organizers and as participants. Many events serve to interpret the local culture and serve to create an environment of local and visitor mix, further establishing a connection between the community and its key industry. I am unsure how many people remember this, but the Hawai'i Tourism Authority was created because there had long been a void in how we provided our visitor industry product. We had spent many years simply advertising and marketing and had forgotten to take care of and nurture our product. By "our product" I mean the visitor experience. Waikīkī was a good example of what had fallen into disarray. Besides the obvious downtrodden look of Waikīkī at the time, Kama'āina had pulled out of Waikīkī and left visitors wondering where the "Hawaiians" were.

The original Hawai'i Tourism Authority plan was to shift levels of funding between product building and maintenance and marketing depending on which was doing better at the time. When our numbers went down, product would take a hit and allow marketing to have more support and when marketing and advertising were doing well, like today, then product would get additional funding support.

Product experience includes all the wonderful community events, festivals, special events, natural resource support for parks and trails, Hawaiian cultural programs that preserve all things cultural...things that make Hawai'i different from Mexico or any other destination that may look like us but does not feel like us.

Because we are doing so well, product is expecting to get additional support, however if you take the funding away, product loses its turn.

I oppose Bill SB83 that proposes to take away \$3-million of HTA's budget to subsidize travel expenses by the University of Hawaii athletic teams.

A reduction of HTA's budget will force cutbacks to our tourism marketing and limit funding of local organizations, including those that look to HTA for support of natural resource protection, cultural programs and festivals.

As Festival Chair for the Past 3 years and Entertainment Chair for the past 17 years, The Waimea Town Celebration(WTC) is celebrating its 40th year in 2017. The Festival shares with the world the language, music, traditions, stories and culture of Kauai. The celebration is an 8 day event that features composers, musicians, kumu hula, storytellers, and cultural practitioners who devote their lives to the perpetuation of all that Hawai'i has to offer — and without the efforts of organizations such as ours, much of this wonderful treasure could go unnoticed.

Many of these COMMUNITY ORGANIZED programs are funded by the HTA and the Kauai County OED and provide a huge economic stimulus to Hawaii and Kauai. Currently, WTC noted international visitors from 13 different countries numbering in the 1200's, out of state numbering 7500, and local attendance of 20,000+. Our economic impact according to DBEDT 2015 figures are as follows; Total direct visitor expenditures are \$13.38M, economic impact of sales are \$22.18M, Household income generated \$6.27M, Jobs supported 155 and Tax revenue of \$1.40M. This kind of impact from ONE festival on Kauai, of which there are many and not counting the others on the other islands. HTA funds WTC to get "Heads in Beds" and promote Hawaii/Kauai, we are doing our best with what we have currently, with economic impact like this, you still want to cut HTA's Budget and take away from investing in Hawaii and its Communities?

I challenge you to review all of HTA's Funded Programs/Festivals and see what kind of impact it has for Hawaii.

Please reconsider the decisions to cut HTA's budget.

HEA is a non-profit business alliance established following the devastation on Kaua'i from Hurricane Iniki. Our mission is economic revitalization, historic preservation and beautification. Our members are made up of small businesses and local manufacturers.

In 1997 HEA began "Friday Art Night" with HTA's CPEP funding. "Friday Art Night" is now a self-supporting event that has continued every Friday Night for the past 19 years. The event attracts both tourists and residents to Hanapepe each week and provides a large economic boost to local small businesses. This event would not have been possible without HTA support and funding.

HEA has been successful in securing CPEP funding for the annual Kaua'i Orchid & Art Festival has been held each spring for the past 9 years. Because of HTA funding, we were able to expand to hold the inaugural Kaua'i Chocolate & Coffee Festival in the fall in collaboration with Special Events Hawaii and with sponsorship from HTDC and Dow AgriScience. Both events attract hundreds of local residents and visitors. In fact, we were stunned by the attendance at the Kaua'i Chocolate & Coffee Festival in October 2015.

All of these events have been made possible by support from the Hawaiian Tourism Authority and the County of Kaua'i through the CPEP process. Without such support, we would be unable to put them on. These events provide opportunities for local businesses, vendors, manufacturers, and growers by bringing visitors to our town and creating exposure and visibility for what they do. In addition, all these events are important to the visibility and viability of the west side of Kaua'i and provide important community building opportunities while being attractive to island visitors.

I have had the honor and privilege of calling the hospitality and tourism industry my profession since obtaining an internship on Maui in college in 1995. Since that time, I have been employed, full time in leadership positions in the hospitality field for 19 years, 16.5 of that on Maui. Today, I am responsible for running the largest resort on Maui and oversee the Starwood Vacation Ownership Villa Collection in the state of Hawaii as an Area Managing Director. I am presently the Vice Chair of the Maui Hotel and Lodging Association and serve as the Chair of the Maui Visitor Bureau.

I can attest, and have confidence in, that HTA is making the full and best use of its state funding to market tourism for the Hawaiian Islands and support our state's most important industry. If not for this industry and the vitality of it, countless local residents could be unemployed. Cutting \$3-million from HTA's budget to subsidize travel expenses for University of Hawai'i student-athletes is an inappropriate use of the Special Tourism Fund.

If SB83 were to become law, it would harm HTA's ability to promote Hawai'i and compete against other destinations for global travelers. In addition, HTA would be put in the position of having to reduce funding to local nonprofits that rely on our support to host community and cultural programs appreciated by both residents and visitors alike. The funds allocated to the HTA are to ensure our roust visitor industry flourishes for years to come. Any limitation to those funds would be shortsighted in an effort to drive long term sustainability of our industry.

Like residents statewide, I am a supporter of the University of Hawai'i and proud of what its academic and athletic accomplishments represent to our state. I have family and know many who are presently attending and are alumni of UH. They have benefited from the strong education and academic programs from this thriving University. The camaraderie of those is strong and as a state, we are proud.

That said, if the University of Hawai'i needs additional funding to cover travel expenses to operate a Division I athletic program, it should not come from the Special Tourism Fund or at the expense of HTA's budget to promote tourism for the State of Hawai'i.

Dear Chair Brower, Vice Chair Ohno and Members of the Committee,

The Maui Hotel & Lodging Association (MHLA) is the legislative arm of the visitor industry. Our membership includes over 150 property and allied business members in Maui County – all of whom have an interest in the visitor industry. Collectively, MHLA's membership employs over 20,000 local residents and represents over 19,000 rooms. The visitor industry is the economic driver for Maui County. We are the largest employer of residents on the Island - directly employing approximately 40% of all residents (indirectly, the percentage increases to 75%).

MHLA is **opposed** to SB 83 SD1, which makes an appropriation from the tourism special fund for fiscal year 2016-2017 for travel expenses and subsidies incurred by the intercollegiate athletics program of the University of Hawaii.

Under HRS § 201B-11, the Tourism Special Fund is to be used to carry out HTA's mandate. Under that mandate, HTA is directed to promote Hawai'i as a premier visitor destination and integrate the interests of visitors, the community and the visitor industry. The proposal to fund expenses and subsidies incurred by the UH athletics program is not within HTA's mandate and the purpose of the Tourism Special Fund. There is absolutely no nexus between the proposed expenditure and the purpose of the fund.

Tourism is Hawaii's most important industry, being the State's economic driver and largest provider of jobs for families statewide. In 2015, total visitor arrivals increased by 4.1 percent producing a record total of \$15.2 billion in visitor expenditures. Visitor spending is projected to have generated \$28.2 billion in sales for the state's economy, provided \$1.75 billion in state tax revenue and supported more than 181,500 jobs in the visitor industry and related sectors.

Hawaii's tourism industry has been successful in recent years, but continued success depends on Hawaii being able to compete against global destinations, many of which have far greater funds available for tourism marketing. Now is not the time to take money from our Tourism Special Fund.

My name is William Anonsen and I am the Managing Partner/Principal of THE MARITIME GROUP, LLC. We strongly support SB 83 which proposes to provide an appropriation for travel expenses and travel subsidies incurred by the intercollegiate athletics program of the University of Hawaii, with a consideration of using the T.A.T. funds and not from the Hawaii Tourism Authority, and established controls prohibiting their diversion and an appropriate funding cap that covers the necessary direct travel expenses, during the FY 2016-2017.

As Hawaii doesn't have a professional sports franchise, the University Hawaii's intercollegiate athletics program serves to fill that void with community support and pride. Sporting events enhance Hawaii's economy, image and quality of life. The HTA recognizes these benefits by establishing a sports marketing program that is designed to increase Hawaii's sports presence outside the state to a national and global audience.

Hawaii's geographic location in the Pacific, makes the UH's athletics program unique and at a disadvantage due to team/players travel expense to participate in sport contests on the mainland, in addition to travel subsidizes for travel expenses for some of the visiting teams who must travel to Hawaii for UH's home games. Despite the additional expenses that are incurred to participate in these intercollegiate athletics competitions, the advantages more than offset the direct cost;, in increased publicity and media coverage, televised games that showcase Hawaii and promote the islands to potential visitors, coupled with visitors traveling to Hawaii to accompany their teams, in addition to UH's athletics serving as "Ambassadors of Aloha" when traveling.

The UH's intercollegiate athletics program, provides academic opportunities to student athletics, helps to further enhance Hawaii's destination image, and help to foster a sustainable sports tourism market to diversify a visitors and residents experiences, while highlighting Hawaii's unique attributes.

The legislature may want to consider securing the funds directly from the T.A.T. fund which is aligned with the benefits of UH's Intercollegiate activities with visiting teams, support staff, families and team fans visiting our islands. I strongly support giving the athletics department \$3-million, although it would better serve all parties to consider funds from the \$200-million T.A.T, to preclude HTA and UH from having an adversarial relationship based on this issue. The two entities should be working together, not sifting money from one to the other.

My name is Warren Haruki and I am the President & CEO of Grove Farm Company and Chairman & CEO of Maui Land & Pineapple Company. We strongly support the funding provided in SB 83 SD1 to the University of Hawaii at Manoa athletics program.

In order for Hawaii residents to enjoy and participate in University of Hawaii athletics locally, UH must often pay travel subsidies and higher guarantees to visiting teams. When the school plays games away as ambassadors of the State, they have to pay much higher travel costs than typical universities have to bear. No other athletic program in the nation is saddled with this amount of travel costs and travel subsidies! SB 83 SD1 would help to offset those higher costs that the University of Hawaii incurs, thereby allowing it to compete in collegiate athletics on a more level playing field.

It is also important to realize the UH athletics is a huge revenue generator for the State. Direct spending amounts to \$66M a year according to an economic study and direct tax revenues amount to \$7M a year. If those direct tax revenues were used in a funding model similar to the transient accommodations tax, perhaps that amount should go directly to UH athletics.

These funds are carefully allocated for strategic marketing programs aimed at growing arrivals to Hawaii from national and international markets. HTA also does a great job assisting worthwhile community programs across the state that help to differentiate Hawaii's visitor experience from other competitive destinations around the globe.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony. My name is Alyssa Simbahon and I am currently the UH Mānoa Graduate Legislative Fellow and also serve on the UH Letterwinners' Club Board of Directors, but I submit this testimony in my personal capacity. I write in strong support of SB 83, SD1, which appropriates \$3 million to the UH athletics department to offset higher travel expenses and subsidies.

I was a student-athlete on the UH soccer team from 2009 to 2011. From 2008 to 2009 I played soccer at the University of San Francisco, another Division I program. There we had the luxury of taking buses to many of our matches. Travel was significantly shorter and significantly cheaper.

But UH athletic teams do not have this luxury. Travel costs to the mainland are high. It costs approximately \$27,000 for a soccer team to make a west coast road trip. This includes airfare, lodging, bag fees, vans, student athlete per diem and incidentals (laundry, gatorade, water, etc.). A soccer travel roster typically consists of eighteen (18) players, three (3) coaches and one (1) athletic trainer.

In addition to providing funds to help offset these higher travel expenses and subsidies costs, SB 83, SD1 will help UH with establishing a competitive edge. Offsetting travel expenses will allow UH to dedicate more moneys to maintaining facilities and providing programs that help attract athletes, both local and out of state, to come to UH.

Many UH athletes serve as role models for Hawaii youth. The youth watch and follow UH athletes, and strive to run like them, throw like them, or kick like them. The youth meet and see UH athletes at community events, and stand in line to get their autographs after games. UH athletes ultimately inspire youth to pursue a higher education and play collegiate sports.

Collegiate sports, as with all levels of sports, teach our youth invaluable lessons, both on and off the "field." Although my collegiate career ended in 2011, I always carry the lessons of teamwork, endurance, passion, and hard work wherever I go.

I respectfully ask that you pass this measure for our athletes, and most important, for our youth. Thank you for your time and consideration.

Chair Brower, Vice Chair Ohno, and members of the committee:

My name is Nick Rolovich and I am respectfully submitting this testimony in support of SB 83 SD1 which would provide the University of Hawaii at Manoa athletics department with funding for travel expenses and subsidies.

While I am the Head Football Coach at the University of Hawaii, I am presenting this testimony as an individual and not in any official capacity with the school.

I have had the privilege and honor of being associated with the University of Hawaii athletic program for a good part of my life. Initially it was as a student athlete on the Warrior Football team followed by opportunities to participate as part of the coaching staff. After being away from Hawaii for a number of years, I was given the opportunity to return to the University of Hawaii as its Head Football Coach. Not only is it an opportunity for me to return to my alma mater that provided so much to me when I was a student athlete, but it is an opportunity for my family and I to return to the place that we consider home.

I recently returned to Hawaii from coaching at the University of Nevada at Reno for a few years. After playing and coaching in Hawaii and then coaching in Nevada, I have seen the inequities that SB 83 SD1 is proposing to address. For example, when Nevada came to Hawaii, the University of Hawaii had to pay Nevada a travel subsidy to offset its travel costs to the islands. Conversely, when the University of Hawaii traveled to Nevada to play at Reno, it did not receive any travel subsidy and was required to bear the full cost of its travel. In addition, when the University of Nevada football team traveled for its away games, the distance traveled and the costs incurred were a fraction of what the University of Hawaii was required to incur.

SB 83 SD1 will help to offset the higher costs that the University of Hawaii currently incurs for travel expenses and subsidies. SB 83 SD1 will allow the school to use those funds that would have gone for those costs, to be used for other purposes which will help the athletic program be more competitive with its peer programs on the mainland.

Importantly, SB 83 SD1 will also demonstrate a strong commitment by the State to the health of its only Division I athletic program. I can state from first-hand experience that much as been written and reported about the possible closing of athletic programs at the University of Hawaii due to continuing budget deficits. As my staff has gone out to recruit student athletes to come to Hawaii, they have had recruits tell then that competing schools were telling the athletes that the

school is not supported and is in danger of closing its athletic programs. Unfortunately, we do know that we have lost a few recruits that could have significantly helped our football program because of what is being said about the University of Hawaii's fiscal situation. SB 83 SD1 could be a vital signal to recruits and competing schools that Hawaii does support and is committed to the athletic programs at the University of Hawaii. SB 83 SD1 can make a significant difference for the University of Hawaii.

I respectfully request passage of SB 83 SD1. Thank you for your time and this opportunity to present this testimony.

Chair Brower, Vice Chair Ohno and members of the committee:

I am submitting this personal testimony in support of the funding for the University of Hawaii at Manoa (UHM) athletics program provided in SB 83, SD1. I am a professor of business economics at the Shidler College of Business at UHM. However, I am submitting this testimony as an individual. In doing so I am not speaking on behalf of the Shidler College or UHM. Rather, I am speaking as a professional economist who is also a fan of UHM sports. (My wife and I are season-ticket holders for Warrior football and members of the Na Koa booster club, and we also attend other UHM sports events.)

In my capacity as a professor of business economics, I supervised the 2014 economic impact study prepared for the UHM Athletics Department. The results of that study have been noted in various media outlets and are well summarized in UHM's official testimony on this bill, and hence I will not repeat these here. However, I do want to state that I stand by these economic impact estimates.

Instead, I will focus my remarks on how UHM Athletics supports an important economic objective for our state: *diversified tourism*. Much as diversified agriculture is increasingly important to Hawaii, *diversified tourism* is likewise crucial.

We are all aware that tourism is the largest driver of Hawaii's economy. Estimates published by the State Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism conclude that tourism is Hawaii's largest economic driver directly accounting for 16% of Hawaii's GDP, not counting indirect effects. That's one reason why our government supports tourism via infrastructure such as the Convention Center and events such as the Honolulu Marathon and the Pro-Bowl.

But tourism is also vulnerable to economic swings. The effects of the Great Recession still reverberate in our economic memories. Consider as an example December 2009. Statewide visitor arrivals were down by 14% relative to the same month in 2007. On

December 5 of 2009, UH football hosted the Wisconsin Badgers. (We lost. Ugh!) But, it is estimated that the game brought at least 3,000 Wisconsin fans who most likely would not have come to Hawaii but for the game. At a time when tourists were desperately needed for our economy, UHM Athletics provided a compelling reason for more people to visit Hawaii.

Now. Let's look into the future. Suppose it is 2019 and the US economy is again in recession. The Jones family in Portland, Oregon and the Smith family in Tucson, Arizona are contemplating their vacation plans. Due to the recession, both families are thinking about staying close to home. However, the Jones's are Oregon State alums and football fans, and the Smith's are parents of the University of Arizona quarterback. They realize that their football teams play Hawaii in Honolulu. These games cause each family to make Hawaii their vacation choice for 2019.

In so doing, UHM Athletics is contributing to *diversifying* Hawaii's tourism sector and filling in low points. And, hotel maids, tour bus drivers, visitor attraction workers, waiters, bartenders and stadium workers all see higher incomes, and the State enjoys greater revenues.

I understand that the Legislature has to weigh many competing requests for funding and in the process has to evaluate the "returns on investment" of public funds. Given the competing needs, I do not pretend to know what choice is best. However, I do know that UHM Athletics has a positive economic impact on the state as evidenced in our economic impact study. I also know that UHM Athletics demonstrably contributes to *diversifying* Hawaii's economy.

For the reasons above, I respectfully request passage of SB 83, SD1, and thank you for your consideration of this testimony.

Besides paying for their own team travel, they often have to pay for the travel expenses of the other teams to come to Hawaii. Rather than allow ourselves to wonder annually why our University of Hawai`i (Manoa and Hilo) Athletics Departments lose \$4-million annually, the time has come to allow our student-athletes and the administration a fair chance to get back to (at least) a break-even model.

With mandated opponent travel subsidies, a horrible deal at Aloha Stadium (through no fault of the Stadium management), a lagging or non-existent effort to allow fan parking fees on game dates at UH to be rightfully attributed to athletics, a weak annual subsidy from the UH student body when compared to other Big West and Mountain West conference opponents, and a dearth of funding from the state or university coffers vs. what is received from those very same conference opponents, it is frankly a wonder that UH Athletics doesn't lose \$7-million annually.

STATEMENT OF THE ILWU LOCAL 142 ON S.B. 83, SD1 RELATING TO APPROPRIATIONS

The ILWU Local 142 **supports the intent** of S.B. 83, SD1, which makes an appropriation from the Tourism Special Fund for fiscal year 2016-2017 for travel expenses and subsidies incurred by the intercollegiate athletics program of the University of Hawaii, requires the Governor to determine whether funding for the travel expense and subsidies should continue beyond fiscal year 2016-2017, and, if such funding should continue, requires the Governor to take appropriate action to implement the determination.

However, the ILWU Local 142 recommends that such an appropriation should be made out of the General Fund and strongly opposes taking the money from the Tourism Special Fund.

For Hawaii residents, UH athletics is comparable to professional sports for residents of other states. We in Hawaii have no other Division I program to support, and a major aspect of the University's participation in athletics is travel. Our teams have to travel to compete; other teams must also travel to provide competition for our teams.

When other college teams come to Hawaii, very often they bring with them an entourage of fans. This promotes Hawaii tourism for those who visit but also for the good will that is generated by their visit and brought back to their hometowns.

Some will counter that athletics should take a back seat to academics, that any funding should go toward academic endeavors, but UH sports have their share of fans—those who may criticize the teams' performance but would be loath to see them gone for good. UH athletics is an integral part of the University experience, and travel for UH teams is essential.

Although we support funding for the UH athletics travel requirements, we request that the funding for UH athletic travel be appropriated out the budget process rather than the Tourism Special Fund. Tourism is Hawaii's largest industry and must continue to be promoted and supported. Funding taken away from the Tourism Special Fund will only hurt the Tourism Authority's ability to promote Hawaii as a visitor destination, since the shortfall in the Tourism Special Fund will have to be made up from budgeted marketing funds to meet other worthy funding commitments from the Tourism Special Fund.

The ILWU supports funding for the UH athletic program travel expenses but urges that a source of funding other than the Tourism Special Fund be considered. Thank you for allowing us to offer our views and concerns.

My name is Jack Richards and I am the President and CEO of Pleasant Holidays, LLC. Our company is one of the largest tour operators in the U.S. and one of the largest destination services and activity providers in Hawai'i. We employ over 100 people on 4 of the Hawaiian Islands.

Pleasant Holidays opposes Senate Bill No. 83, Senate Draft 1 (SB83 SD1) to the extent that money from the Tourism Special Fund will be appropriated for other uses. The appropriation of funds out of the Tourism Special Fund is contrary to the purposes of the special fund and of the Hawai'i Tourism Authority (HTA), which was given sole discretion to use the Tourism Special Fund pursuant to Chapter 201B, Hawai'i Revised Statutes.

Tourism is the largest industry in Hawai'i and the HTA is tasked to ensure that Hawai'i remains a top-of-mind travel destination. If this were simply a matter of funding the intercollegiate athletics program, then there are numerous areas for the legislature to re-appropriate funds. However, if the goal is ultimately to promote the Hawai'i brand, then it seems less logical to siphon funds from the HTA, which has the sole purpose of developing and implementing the State's strategic tourism marketing plan, and transferring the funds to an executive department, which is tasked with providing higher education.

My name is Cindy Rote and I am a resident of Kuliouou Valley. I am submitting this testimony as an individual in support of the funding provided to the UH Athletics Department via SB 83 SD1 to offset travel expenses and subsidies costs.

In 1996 I graduated from the University of California at Davis with a double major as an All American Women's Water Polo student-athlete. I was a member of the United States Women' Water Polo National "B" team and had the opportunity to represent our country internationally. In 1997, I was hired by the University of Hawaii at Manoa (UH) as the first assistant women's water polo coach to recruit and start the varsity Wahine Water Polo team, which has been nationally ranked in the top 10 from day one. I have been a resident of Hawaii for the past 19 years and I have worked with college students, as a lecturer and with student-athletes as an assistant coach and as the Director of Student-Athlete Development, my current position.

I fully support intercollegiate athletics for every positive developmental opportunity it provides. I am living proof of how athletics can impact and improve a life through education. Growing up in the school district portrayed in the movie Coach Carter may be the easiest way to explain, that higher education was not always a goal in my life. My father was a high school dropout who did not value education. He valued hard work and instilled a tenacious work ethic in me. My Peruvian mother spoke English as a second language and even though she knew nothing of the American education system, she always was encouraging me to "get my educacion (education)". Through high school sports, the coaches who served as mentors and the structure of a team environment, provided me with the opportunity to learn about college and then go to college.

Without sports, I can confidently say, I would have not gone to college. Through my collegiate experience, I built the academic confidence to excel in and out of the classroom. I continued my education beyond my undergraduate degrees, serving as a research assistant for the John Burns School of Medicine while completing a master of science in Kinesiology. I am currently completing my doctorate degree in Educational Leadership and Management, with an emphasis on Human Resource Development. Without the opportunity to play sports in high school and in college, I would not be where I am today, an active member of our local community who volunteers regularly to help others.

I have seen the challenges and personally experienced the difficulties faced by limitations of the department budget. Becoming resourceful with what we are given to serve our student-athletes, would be an understatement. As a coach, I used car rental coupons on the majority of our road trips just to save money out of our budget. Like many other staff members and coaches, we are very aware of every dollar spent and are as creative as possible to stretch the value of our budgets.

Even with our creative and resourceful ways, there are things that are completely out of our control, specifically travel expenses. For Hawaii to continue to excel at the level they are currently at, or to even do better, we need your help with the passage of SB 83 SD1 to assist in offsetting travel expenses and subsidies costs. When our current student-athletes learn of what its costs to travel and how we must pay other institutions to fly to Hawaii to compete against our teams, they are always bewildered and believe it is unfair.

The benefits athletics has for our young adults are immeasurable. I can recount story after story of how athletics has impacted our student-athletes, far beyond the playing fields, in a similar manner that it has impacted my life. From our local students, inter-island students, mainland students and international students, athletics has a positive impact on their lives. One the best things I get to do regularly is take our student-athletes into the community to do community service. Each month I provide learning tours, "Rainbows for a Day", for local elementary schools. When a young child goes up to a UH student-athlete, they do not care about what sport they play, they are enamored with the fact they are looking up to their hero. These children are inspired to go to college one day and be just like their heroes. Our student-athletes understand their role and know their time is limited as a Rainbow Warrior and Rainbow Wahine. When they connect with children, the moment is priceless for both the child and the student-athlete.

This month, the student-athletes have been taking part of the Big West Charity Coin Drive. The funds they raise will benefit the Hawaii Pacific Chapter of the American Cancer Society (ACS) through the UH Relay for Life event held annually in April. Eleven years ago, the UH Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, decided to organize the first ever UH Relay for Life as their main community service project. The event was completely run by UH student-athletes and athletic department staff and coaches. UH Relay for Life has now evolved into a major campus event run by the Colleges Against Cancer Student group, which I have advised for the past 8 years. Over one million dollars has been raised through UH Relay for Life. An event started by our student-athletes has made a lasting impact for our local family and friends who benefit from services provided by ACS, like the Hope House, that provides lodging for outer island residents in town for treatment. Our student-athletes are excelling at every level possible while learning and giving back to their community.

The support of the state is needed to continue to provide the athletic and development opportunities for current and future generations of student-athletes to excel on and off the fields and to make a difference in each of their lives. SB 83 SD1 provides funds to UH in recognition of the higher travel expenses and subsidies costs faced by the school compared to our peers. SB 83 SD1 will help us to compete more equally and effectively with the leading institutions of higher education who do not have the travel costs that we have.

I support the funding in SB 83 SD1 for the University of Hawaii at Manoa. Respectfully, I request that you approve SB 83 SD1. Thank you for your time and commitment to our UH student-athletes.

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When other college teams come to Hawaii, very often they bring with them an entourage of fans. This promotes Hawaii tourism for those who visit but also for the good will that is generated by their visit and brought back to their hometowns.

Some will counter that athletics should take a back seat to academics, that any funding should go toward academic endeavors, but UH sports have their share of fans—those who may criticize the teams' performance but would be loath to see them gone for good. UH athletics is an integral part of the University experience, and travel for UH teams is essential.

Although we support funding for the UH athletics travel requirements, we request that the funding for UH athletic travel be appropriated out the budget process rather than the Tourism Special Fund. Tourism is Hawaii's largest industry and must continue to be promoted and supported. Funding taken away from the Tourism Special Fund will only hurt the Tourism Authority's ability to promote Hawaii as a visitor destination, since the shortfall in the Tourism Special Fund will have to be made up from budgeted marketing funds to meet other worthy funding commitments from the Tourism Special Fund.

The ILWU supports funding for the UH athletic program travel expenses but urges that a source of funding other than the Tourism Special Fund be considered. Thank you for allowing us to offer our views and concerns.
