In consideration of **SENATE BILL 897 RELATING TO THE KAHO`OLAWE ISLAND RESERVE**

Senate Bill 897 appropriates funds for the 2016-2017 fiscal year to the Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission for the management, restoration, and preservation of the Kaho'olawe island reserve. The Kaho`olawe Island Reserve Commission (KIRC) strongly supports this measure.

When the State of Hawai'i accepted the return of the island of Kaho'olawe in 1994, it accepted the responsibility "to preserve and protect a corner of their island state so that future generations can become familiar with their island's past human and natural heritage. For many Native Hawaiians and others, Kaho`olawe is a special place that has been sanctified by the loss of life in a struggle between traditional values and Western concepts of land use and management" (Restoring a Cultural Treasure, Kaho`olawe Island Conveyance Commission).

As stated in the Federally-mandated Kaho`olawe Island Conveyance Commission (KICC) final report to Congress in 1993, "in the short term, federal funds will provide the bulk of the program support for specific soil conservation projects and related activities. In the longer term, however, state revenues will be needed to continue and enhance those activities initiated with federal funds." For the past 20 years, the initial Federal funding has allowed the KIRC to establish many of its innovative programs that emphasize ancestral and traditional knowledge, provide a cultural approach of respect and connectivity to the environment, and integrate ancient and modern resource management techniques. Those initial funds will run out by 2016 if no other funding source is secured.

With 25% of the island still uncleared of unexploded ordnance and only 10% cleared for intensive use, the KIRC's continuing presence on Kaho'olawe is needed to ensure the protection

of the general public. Without funding, the KIRC will have to terminate on-island operations and close the doors to public access to Kaho`olawe.

Over the past two years, the KIRC in partnership with several community organizations conducted a series of state-wide community gatherings to solicit and document the public's input regarding the future of Kaho`olawe. The resultant community-wide planning document entitled *"I OLA KANALOA!"* represents a foundation to encourage the collective impact of many individuals, organizations, and the community-at-large. This arrangement acknowledges that the power, energy and resources to secure the future of Kaho`olawe is shared and dispersed among its many partners.

The funding being sought in this measure is to provide a bridge to allow the KIRC to develop these community-wide partnerships, establish collaborative enterprises with other state and federal government entities, and launch long-term revenue generation and sustainable funding opportunities supporting the future of Kaho`olawe. The passage of this measure is critical to ensure that the struggle, hard work, dedication and lives given to the island will not be wasted, but forms the foundation for Kaho'olawe's role as the spiritual, cultural and physical *piko* (center) of the people of Hawai`i.

TESTIMONY OF JAN K. YAMANE, ACTING STATE AUDITOR, ON SENATE BILL NO. 897, RELATING TO THE KAHO'OLAWE ISLAND RESERVE COMMISSION

Chair Shimabukuro and Members of the Committees:

I am Jan Yamane, Acting State Auditor. Thank you for the opportunity to offer comments on Senate Bill No. 897, relating to the Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission. This bill would, among other things, appropriate funds to the Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission for the management, restoration, and preservation of the reserve.

In July 2013, we released Report No. 13-06, *Audit of the Kaho'olawe Rehabilitation Trust Fund*, which responded to a request by the 2012 Legislature via Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 63, Senate Draft 1, asking the Auditor to conduct a fiscal audit of the Kaho'olawe Rehabilitation Trust Fund. The Legislature requested that the audit include a determination of whether trust funds are being used in compliance with state laws and any applicable grant agreements, and to effectuate the purposes of the Chapter 6K, HRS, including the performance of duties and responsibilities of the Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission. In our report, we had two findings:

- 1. At its current rate of spending, the Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission will drain the remaining balance of the Kaho'olawe Rehabilitation Trust Fund by 2016, and
- 2. The Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission has not developed a comprehensive and measurable restoration plan, including estimated costs and timeframes for completion.

The following exhibit from our report illustrates the Kaho'olawe Rehabilitation Trust Fund's financial revenue, expenditures, and decreasing trust fund balance for FY1995-FY2012. As you can see, expenditures have outpaced revenues for the past decade.



Our report noted that the commission has been unsuccessful at meeting its fundraising goals and unable to secure long-term funding. Although it has cut its budget, it continues to deplete the trust fund and at its current rate of spending, the trust fund will be completely exhausted by 2016.

While this measure will appropriate needed funds to the depleting trust fund for fiscal year 2016-2017, it does not address the commission's rate of spending and inability to successfully raise funds to preserve the trust. If the Kaho'olawe Rehabilitation Trust Fund requires annual appropriations to continue, it raises the question whether the trust fund is needed or should be repealed. The commission could be supported through general fund appropriations.

Thank you for the opportunity to offer comments on Senate Bill No. 897. I am available for your questions, should you have any.

Please accept this testimony in strong support of state funding for the Kaho`olawe Island Reserve Commission (KIRC). Whether through a share of conveyance tax revenue as proposed by SB 867, or a direct appropriation as proposed by SB 897 and HB 438, support of the KIRC is a state responsibility.

When the state accepted Kaho'olawe back from the U.S. military in 1994, it was recognized that state funding would eventually be needed to maintain and restore the island. As Section 1 notes in each of the above-reference bills, the federally-mandated Kaho'olawe Island Conveyance Commission reported to Congress in 1993 that KIRC's federal trust fund would be used to initiate conservation and other programs, but that state funding was required for the long term.

I was able to travel to Kaho'olawe last month to view the incredible work that the KIRC performs every day – its Restoration Program planting native shrubs and grasses to minimize erosion and restore native ecosystems, its Ocean Program monitoring marine species and the Island Reserve's pristine waters, its Culture Program preserving archaeological sites and promoting traditional Hawaiian practices, and its Operations staff providing all kinds of logistical and maintenance support to these program efforts. The KIRC's annual budget is less than \$3 million; they manage and are steadily restoring an entire island reserve – a former bombing range with 45 square miles of land and 90 square miles of ocean – for less than \$3 million per year; this has to be one of the most efficient government agencies in the state.

The Legislature has rightly recognized the state's responsibility to providing funding for the KIRC, and clearly appreciates the successes that KIRC has achieved. Your careful consideration of these funding measures comes at a critical time, and I respectfully request your support.

Appropriates funds for the 2016-2017 fiscal year to the Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission for the management, restoration, and preservation of the Kaho'olawe island reserve.

TESTIMONY IN OPPOSITION

SB897 should be deferred or defeated for two reasons:

(1) More than \$400 Million was appropriated by the U.S. government to clean up unexploded ordnance on Kaho'olawe; and a trust fund totaling \$44 Million was established for restoration work to be done by KIRC after the island was transferred to the State of Hawaii. However, there has not been a fiscal or management audit for how the money was spent, which individuals or companies were paid how much money to do what work, whether contracts were awarded in compliance with state procurement laws, and whether the work was completed satisfactorily. Such management and fiscal audits should be completed and reported to the legislature before any additional funds are appropriated.

(2) So long as the island of Kaho'olawe is set aside by law to be transferred to a future sovereign Native Hawaiian entity, state government taxpayer dollars should not be spent to maintain or improve it. The Office of Hawaiian Affairs has more than \$650 Million in assets in its "trust fund", and its stated purpose is to provide for "the betterment of Native Hawaiians." OHA is the primary entity pushing to create a Native Hawaiian tribe, and has publicly stated that it plans to turn over all its assets to that tribe. Either this bill should be amended to include a clause rescinding HRS Section 6K-9 and making clear that Kaho'olawe is an unalienable part of the State of Hawaii, or else this bill should be amended to require that all funds for the rehabilitation, improvement, and operation of Kaho'olawe must come from the assets of OHA.

Pursuant to HRS section 6K-9, the management and control of the Kaho'olawe island reserve will be transferred to a sovereign Native Hawaiian entity upon its recognition by the state and federal governments. And indeed, Act 195, Session Laws of 2011, began the process of creating a state-recognized Native Hawaiian tribe with the expectation that once it has been established it will then seek federal recognition. During 2014 the U.S. Department of Interior held hearings in Hawaii and on the mainland to take testimony regarding an Advance Notice of Proposed Rule-Making to change federal law regarding the criteria for recognizing Indian tribes, specifically for the purpose of facilitating federal recognition of the anticipated state-recognized tribe now being created under Act 195.

Does our state legislature really intend to create a Hawaiian tribe and divide the lands and people of Hawaii along racial lines? Will this legislature do anything to protect the 80% of our people who lack a drop of Hawaiian blood, against the rapacious demands of the tribe for land, money, and jurisdictional authority?

Please rescind HRS Section 6K-9, and do not appropriate any money to do what OHA has a responsibility to do. I expect my legislature not to give away the store before negotiations with the Hawaiian tribe have even begun.

Chair Shimabukuro, Vice-Chair Galuteria, and members of the Senate Committee on Hawaiian Affairs, aloha kākou. My name is Davianna Pōmaika'i McGregor. I am a Professor of Ethnic Studies at the University of Hawai'i, Mānoa and I am testifying in STRONG SUPPORT OF SB 897.

I have been a member of the Protect Kaho'olawe 'Ohana for the past thirty years and a supporter of the movement to stop the bombing of the island from its beginning in January 1976. The bombing stopped in October 1990 and the U.S. Congress established the Kaho'olawe Island Conveyance Commission which recommended the termination of all military use of the island and its transfer to the State of Hawai'i to manage as a national cultural treasure. Both Title X and the Memorandum of Understanding which are part of the deed of transfer limit the uses of the island to "(a) grassland or other vegetation; or (b) trail or road; or (c) historical, cultural, or archaeological site; or (d) reservoir; or (e) heliport; or (f) suitable human habitation. The State of Hawai'i passed HRS 6K in 1993, thereby establishing the Kaho'olawe Island Reserve Commission (KIRC) to fulfill the state's responsibility to manage the island as part of the public land trust, for the eventual transfer of the island to the sovereign native Hawaiian entity upon its recognition by the United States and the State of Hawai'i.

Throughout the past twenty-one (21) years, the KIRC has managed the island with funds appropriate by the U.S. Congress for the clean up and restoration of the island. As these original federal funds will all be spent by the end of 2015, it is timely for the Hawai'i state legislature to fulfill the responsibility that it assumed for the island at the time of its transfer in 1994, by appropriating the monies now needed to provide for the ongoing security, management and appropriate uses of the island.

The I Ola Kanaloa 2026 plan projects the expansion of community partnerhsips with the KIRC in helping to fund and carry out twenty-nine (29) projects within eight (8) programmatic areas over the next eleven (11) years. The island of Kanaloa Kaho'olawe is a unique and sacred place that inspired my generation to revive our Native Hawaiian cultural and spiritual customs and practices and assume our responsibilities to Aloha 'Āina. By 2026, the I Ola Kanaloa plan envisions the island as a premier Hawaiian learning center for the refining, mastering and expanding of Hawaiian skills and practices, nurtured by Kanaloa Kaho'olawe. It will also be a model of living sustainably wherein the resources of the island are used in a responsible and sustainable manner using little or no fossil fuels. As in the past, the island will continue to be a place for renewing connections through honoring the natural environment and revitalizing cultural relationships. The achievement of these goals will not only enrich the State of Hawai'i, it will also provide a firm foundation for the emergence of the Hawaiian nation as envisioned by the Hawai'i legislature in Act 195. The monies that would be appropriated by HB 438 will be carefully spent in meaningful ways that will enrich the lives of the people of Hawai'i.
