TESTIMONY OF THE OFFICE OF THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR TO THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

SENATE BILL 980, SENATE DRAFT 1, HOUSE DRAFT 1

Relating to Afterschool Programs

March 25, 2015

Chair Takumi, Vice Chair Ohno, and members of the committee, thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in <u>strong support</u> of Senate Bill 980, Senate Draft 1, House Draft 1. This measure seeks to establish a program that will provide after-school programs in public middle and intermediate schools throughout the state of Hawaii. R.E.A.C.H., which is an acronym for resources for enrichment, athletics, culture and health is an initiative aimed at keeping Hawaii's youth engaged and excited about learning during the after-school hours so they can stay on the right path towards high school graduation and be better prepared for future success. Programs offered will be from three general categories: academic enrichment, arts and culture, and athletics.

The middle school years are a critical time in a child's life where disengagement can start to take hold. The stakes of disengagement are high. Once students disconnect, recruitment and retention programs require stronger, more persistent outreach and more long-term participation. Juvenile crime, drug rehabilitation, counseling and other forms of intervention result in higher costs to taxpayers. The bottom line is that high quality after-school programs keep kids on the path that leads to high school, college, career, and ultimately, a better quality of life. This bill addresses a critical need for Hawaii's middle school students.

This bill establishes new sections under Chapter 352D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to create the R.E.A.C.H. program in the Office of Youth Services in order to provide a standardized framework for after-school programs offered in public middle/intermediate schools. The program would be administered by the Office of Youth Services. Last year, the Legislature provided funding to support the R.E.A.C.H. program for FY15.

Eleven public middle/intermediate schools have thus far benefited from FY15 funding, including one public charter school.

Provisions in the bill allow for participation fees to be established which would serve to supplement the cost of administering and operating the program and enhance the sustainability of R.E.A.C.H. Additionally, the Office of Youth Services is dedicated to creating opportunities for the youth to develop competencies that foster resiliency and enable them to achieve a successful transition to young adulthood. The objectives of the R.E.A.C.H. initiative are wholly aligned with the objectives of the Office of Youth Services. Over the past year, our office has worked collaboratively with the Department of Education (DOE), the Office of Youth Services, and a working group of middle school principals and DOE administrators to develop both the pilot project and the long-term structure for R.E.A.C.H. In addition to the working group, an Advisory Board comprised of well-known community leaders committed to improving outcomes for Hawaii's youth was also established to provide insight, guidance, and support for this important initiative.

In conclusion, we would like to thank the legislature for its support with the pilot project and initial funding for FY15. It is our hope that we can continue to build upon what has been started.

PURPOSE: The purpose of SB 980, SD1, HD1, Relating to Afterschool Programs is to establish the resources for enrichment, athletics, culture and health (R.E.A.C.H.) program in the Office of Youth Services (OYS) to provide a standardized framework and funding for afterschools programs in public middle and intermediate schools. The initiative from the Lieutenant Governor's Office also:

- establishes a special fund to receive fees and other moneys to supplement the costs of administering and operating the program
- · appropriates funds for establishing the program

OFFICE'S POSITION: OYS strongly supports SB 980, SD1, HD1, Relating to Afterschool Programs. There are several common denominators in the lives of our at-risk youth, including but not limited to: a lack of connectedness, a sense of not belonging, and failure in school. These factors all lead to poor decision making – which is evidenced by the fact that middle school aged children represent nearly ½ of all first time juvenile arrests in our state.

Providing quality after school programming for middle schoolers through the R.E.A.C.H. program will address those very issues — relationships, connections and school engagement will positively impact school attendance and success, and is a critical prevention tool in the juvenile justice arena. Therefore, this bill is one of the Keiki Caucus' priorities.

Lieutenant Governor Tsutsui's recognition of how vulnerable our youth are during their middle school years, and his vision for sustainable programming to develop competencies that foster resiliency in our youth to enable them achieve a positive transition to young adulthood is a proactive and necessary approach in ensuring the success of Hawai'i's youth.

Currently, there are 11 middle/intermediate schools statewide receiving R.E.A.C.H funds, including three schools on Oahu, four on Hawaii Island, two on Maui, one on Molokai and one on Kauai. These schools have introduced programming ranging from robotics to band, tutoring to athletics, and cultural programming to health and nutrition – and we are seeing very encouraging results.

Dear Chair Takumi, Vice Chair Ohno, and members of the committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony in *strong support* of Senate Bill 980, Senate Draft 1, House Draft 1.

I am Tom Apple, Professor of Chemistry and former Chancellor of the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa and also President of a non-profit organization called REACH Out Hawai'i which was established a little over a year ago to support the state's R.E.A.C.H. initiative of developing a comprehensive framework for afterschool programs for public middle and intermediate schools throughout the state.

Our mission at REACH Out Hawai'i is to leverage resources from the private and public sector to help build a sustainable funding base for high quality programs that keep our kids engaged in learning so they can succeed in school and in life.

As an active Professor of Chemistry and the former Chancellor of the state's flagship public institution for higher education, I have a personal stake in promoting and supporting R.E.A.C.H. as middle schools are the pipeline to higher education. We are all far too familiar with the need to increase both our high school graduation and college going rates. In order to affect this, we need to place more attention at the middle school level and this bill will achieve this. The need to leverage the power of expanded learning opportunities after school has never been greater as our world has become increasingly complex. We have come to realize that instructional hours alone cannot support all of the learning needs required to adequately prepare Hawai'i's youth not only for higher education, but for a career in the 21st century and a globally competitive job market.

We *strongly support* SB 980, SD 1, HD 1 and respectfully urge the passage of this bill. The bill addresses a critical need for Hawai'i's middle school students.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) <u>SUPPORTS</u> SB980 SD1 HD1, which would establish a Resources for Enrichment, Athletics, Culture and Health (R.E.A.C.H.) Program within the Office of Youth Services.
