SUBJECT: SCR 31 SD1 – SUPPORTING THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE ON AGING'S EFFORTS TO INCORPORATE A NO WRONG DOOR SYSTEM APPROACH INTO THE AGING AND DISABILITY RESOURCE CENTER HAWAII NETWORK

The State Council on Developmental Disabilities (DD) **SUPPORTS SCR 31 SD1.** The No Wrong Door system approach would serve as a one stop single entry process to make it easy for people of all ages, disabilities, and income levels to learn about and obtain home and community-based services in their own homes instead of institutions or congregate settings. The approach addresses the crucial need to weave existing public-funded Long Term Services and Supports' access points into an integrated network and create a blend of funding sources to support the Aging and Disability Resource Center network. Those are important components for Hawaii to engage in order to establish a single statewide system of access to long-term services and supports for all populations.

As a strong supporter of the No Wrong Door system approach, the Council willingly participates in planning meetings; assists in providing education, outreach, training; and disseminating information about No Wrong Door. This approach is an important and timely opportunity for Hawaii to develop a statewide system that will support all individuals with long-term services and support needs so they can lead meaningful lives. The new Federal guidance and rules "require that home and community-based services respond to beneficiary needs and choices; provide strategies to maximize independence; and provide support and coordination necessary for individualized, self-directed, community-supported life."

- 1 EOA's Position: The Executive Office on Aging (EOA), an attached agency to the Department
- 2 of Health, strongly **SUPPORTS** this measure.
- 3 **Purpose and Justification:** The purpose of this resolution is to express the Legislature's
- 4 support of EOA's efforts to expand the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC) into a
- 5 network of State and private agencies to support all ages and populations with disabilities and
- 6 comply with new federal guidelines and rules. In 2014, the state received a planning grant to
- 7 develop a three year plan to incorporate the No Wrong Door approach into the ADRC system. In
- 8 2015, Hawaii was one of five states to receive a three year grant to implement the plan. The
- 9 grant is for \$850,000/year for three years.

1	Our plan is to: 1) improve the coordination of programs, 2) develop curriculum and training for
2	ADRC staff on person-centered counseling, and 3) establish multiple funding sources to sustain
3	the ADRC network.
4	This federal grant should not be confused with the current funding the Legislature is providing to
5	EOA for the ADRC. The state funds to EOA are used by the counties for their staff and
6	operations to support our kupuna. The federal grant will be used by EOA to build the
7	infrastructure to enable the ADRCs to expand services to more populations, develop common
8	tools among the agencies so that referrals will be more coordinated and find alternate sources of
9	funding to sustain the network.
10	We urge your support of SCR 31 SD1. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on

Senate Concurrent Resolution 31, SD1 – Supporting the Executive Office on Aging's Efforts to Incorporate a No Wrong Door System Approach into the Aging and Disability **Resource Center Hawaii Network** 

The Disability and Communication Access Board (DCAB) supports Senate Concurrent Resolution 31, SD1 – Supporting the Executive Office on Aging's Efforts to Incorporate a No Wrong Door System Approach into the Aging and Disability Resource Center Network.

We are aware that at the national level, the Administration for Community Living (ACL) has created the "No Wrong Door" system out of a commitment to older adults and people with disabilities to be able to live where they choose and be able to fully participate in their communities. This philosophy is consistent with that of DCAB. In 2015, we were asked to participate in the planning meetings to assist in providing a multitude of community services, education and outreach to the community to ensure access to needed community services, individual supports and other assistance promoting self-determination, independence, productivity, integration and inclusion to be part of this system.

Since the meetings were initially convened, DCAB has not been included in the planning efforts, however we request to be included in the advisory board. We believe that an integrated statewide system that supports all individuals with disabilities to obtain services in an efficient and effective manner is needed. We have been an established disability-related agency since the late-1960s and have an historic perspective on people with disabilities and the service system in Hawaii.
