Chair Takayama, Vice Chair Yamashita, and Members of the Committee:

The Department of Public Safety (PSD) **supports** Senate Concurrent Resolution (SCR) 33.

SCR 33 requests Hawaii's congressional delegation to assist the State in negotiating with the federal government for the acquisition of the Federal Detention Center, Honolulu (FDC). Acquisition of FDC would provide much needed relief to Hawaii's overcrowded facilities with its 1,200 beds to house Hawaii inmates and detainees.

Since 2001, PSD has leased bed space at FDC to house pretrial and sentenced misdemeanants and currently is allowed to house up to 550 male and female inmates. FDC currently operates well below its capacity of 1,200 beds, with approximately 400 federal inmates and 181 Hawaii inmates. If the State acquired the FDC, PSD could maximize use of the facility while allowing for the continued housing of federal pre-trial detainees and federal inmates serving brief sentences at no cost to the federal Bureau of Prisons.

My name is Kat Brady and I am the Coordinator of Community Alliance on Prisons, a community initiative promoting smart justice policies in Hawai`i for almost two decades.
