A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ESTABLISHING AN ELECTRONIC PROCUREMENT DATABASE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the State is in need of increased transparency and accountability in government contracts, and there is currently neither a method for statewide data collection, nor clear authority of the centralized state procurement office to mandate collection for proper reporting and analysis of important metrics of procurement across the various procurement jurisdictions across the State.

8 The purpose of this Act is to improve the State's 9 procurement process with increased transparency and 10 accountability by strengthening the centralized state 11 procurement office's oversight of all government contracts in 12 the State for information collection and retrieval processes 13 necessary for policy guidance, training, legislative reporting, 14 and general oversight of procurement across the State by:

15 (1) Mandating that the state procurement office establish
16 a statewide procurement database for data collection
17 that shall receive meaningful data on all state



1		procurements from all government entities and that is
2		accessible by all government entities;
3	(2)	Clarifying the centralized role and authority of the
4		state procurement office across the State's
5		procurement jurisdictions to receive contracting
6		information for data collection, review, and policy
7		analysis; and
8	(3)	Mandating statewide procurement oversight and
9		legislative reporting from the state procurement
10		office.
11	SECT	ION 2. Section 103D-107, Hawaii Revised Statues, is
12	amended t	o read as follows:
13	" [+]	<pre>§103D-107[] Compliance audit unit; establishment and</pre>
14	purpose.	(a) There is established a compliance audit unit
15	within th	e [office of the auditor.] state procurement office.
16	The purpo	se of this unit shall be to:
17	(1)	Periodically review and audit procurement practices
18		within government to ensure compliance with this
19		chapter and all applicable rules; and
20	(2)	Advocate competition, fairness, and accountability in
21		the procurement process.



Reports made by this unit shall be a matter of public record. 1 2 This unit shall utilize as part of the review process, a review 3 of records and activities specifically for trends and patterns 4 of occurrence. 5 (b) The office of the auditor shall periodically audit the compliance audit unit, to ensure compliance with this chapter." 6 SECTION 3. Section 103D-108, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 7 8 amended to read as follows: 9 "§103D-108 Compliance audit unit; duties and 10 responsibilities. The compliance audit unit shall: 11 (1) Review and assess applicable innovations in 12 procurement methods or processes in other governmental jurisdictions or as described in national or regional 13 14 publications; 15 (2) Review current or proposed statutes and rules to 16 determine whether they promote fairness, efficiency, 17 and accountability in the procurement process; 18 (3) Review selected contracts awarded pursuant to section 19 103D-304; 20 Conduct studies, research, and analyses, and make (4) 21 reports and recommendations with respect to existing



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1		and new methods of procurement and other matters
2		within the jurisdiction of the policy board;
3	(5)	Establish and maintain a procurement library;
4	(6)	Establish and maintain an electronic database of
5		meaningful statewide procurement contract data;
6		provided that all data on the database shall be made
7		accessible to each governmental entity and selective
8		non-confidential data may be made accessible to the
9		general public to further transparency and
10		accountability, as determined appropriate by the
11		administrator;
12	[(6)]	(7) Report to the appropriate agency and the chief
13		procurement officer stating the areas of noncompliance
14		and recommendations for remedial action; and
15	[(7)]	(8) [Be present at] Participate in legislative
16		hearings and policy board meetings to present the
17		findings of the unit."
18	SECT	ION 4. Section 103D-109, Hawaii Revised Statues, is
19	amended t	o read as follows:
20	" [+]	<pre>§103D-109[] Compliance audit unit; government</pre>
21	officers	and employees to cooperate. The officers and employees



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1 of the State and of each county shall cooperate with this unit 2 and furnish to them such information related to procurement 3 activities as may be called for in connection with the 4 information gathering and research activities of this unit [-,], 5 including by reporting contract data pursuant to requirements 6 and procedures established by the administrator, for inclusion 7 in the database established under subsection 103D-108(6). The 8 information shall be provided in a timely manner pursuant to 9 procedures established by the administrator and shall be free of 10 charge." 11 SECTION 5. Section 103D-205, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 12 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

13 "\$103D-205 Authority and duties of the chief procurement
14 officer. (a) For their respective jurisdictions and unless
15 otherwise specifically provided in this chapter, each chief
16 procurement officer shall serve as the central procurement
17 officer for the officer's respective jurisdiction and:

- 18 (1) Procure or supervise the procurement of all goods,19 services, and construction;
- 20 (2) Exercise general supervision and control over all
 21 inventories of goods;



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1	(3)	Sell, trade, or otherwise dispose of surplus goods;
2	(4)	Establish and maintain programs for the inspection,
3		testing, and acceptance of goods, services, and
4		construction;
5	(5)	Coordinate with the administrator regarding
6		procurement policies, opportunities for statewide
7		innovation implementation, and concerns;
8	(6)	Report procurement contract data pursuant to
9		requirements established by the administrator, in the
10		form and manner prescribed by the state procurement
11		office[+], for inclusion in the database established
12		under subsection 103D-108(6); and
13	(7)	Assist and cooperate with the administrator regarding
14		any compliance review by the administrator pursuant to
15		section 103D-206."
16	SECI	ION 6. Section 103D-206, Hawaii Revised Statues, is
17	amended t	o read as follows:
18	"§10	3D-206 Additional duties of the administrator of the
19	procureme	nt office. In addition to the duties referred to in
20	section 1	.03D-205, the administrator shall:



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1	(1)	Perform periodic review of the procurement practices
2		and procedures of all governmental bodies, in
3		collaboration with the state procurement policy board,
4		for compliance with the procurement code;
5	(2)	Assist, advise, and guide governmental bodies in
6		matters relating to procurement[+], including
7		development and coordination of policies for
8		procurement innovation, transparency, and
9		accountability;
10	(3)	Determine corrective actions; provided that if a
11		procurement officer under the jurisdiction of the
12		administrator of the state procurement office or a
13		chief procurement officer of any of the other state
14		entities under section 103D-203, fails to comply with
15		any determination rendered by the administrator within
16		thirty days from the date of the issuance of the
17		determination, or longer if permitted by the
18		administrator upon request by the procurement officer
19		or a chief procurement officer, the procurement
20		officer or chief procurement officer shall be subject



1		to an administrative fine under section 103D-106, for
2		every day of noncompliance;
3	(4)	Develop and administer a statewide procurement
4		orientation and training program;
5	(5)	Develop, distribute, and maintain a procurement manual
6		for all state procurement officials; [and]
7	(6)	Develop, distribute, and maintain a procurement guide
8		for vendors wishing to do business with the State and
9		its counties [-]; and
10	(7)	Coordinate and serve as a liaison to the policy board
11		and chief procurement officers on policy matters,
12		including reporting of procurement metrics across the
13		State for all rulemaking and legislative initiatives
14		relating to procurement policy."
15	SECT	ION 7. Section 103D-207, Hawaii Revised Statues, is
16	amended t	o read as follows:
17	"[+]	<pre>§103D-207[+] Centralization of procurement authority.</pre>
18	Except as	otherwise provided in sections 103D-208, 103D-209, and
19	103D-210,	all rights, powers, duties, and authority relating to

21 management, control, warehousing, sale, and disposal of goods,

the procurement of goods, services, and construction, and the

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1 services, and construction now vested in, or exercised by, the 2 governmental bodies of the State and counties are hereby 3 transferred to the respective chief procurement officers [-,], who 4 shall coordinate with the administrator for statewide data 5 collection, training, and policy initiatives." 6 SECTION 8. Section 103D-212, Hawaii Revised Statues, is 7 amended to read as follows: 8 "[+] §103D-212[+] Collection of data concerning public 9 procurement. The chief procurement officer and the heads of all 10 purchasing agencies shall cooperate in the preparation of 11 statistical data concerning the procurement, usage, and 12 disposition of all goods, services, and construction, and employ 13 such trained personnel as may be necessary to carry out this 14 function. All using agencies shall furnish such reports as the 15 chief procurement officer and state procurement office may 16 require concerning usage, needs, and stocks on hand, and the 17 chief procurement officer or state procurement office may 18 prescribe forms to be used by the using agencies in 19 requisitioning, ordering, and reporting of goods, services, and 20 construction."



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SECTION 9. Section 103D-326, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 amended to read as follows:

3 "[**-]§103D-326[]] Fiscal responsibility.** (a) Every contract modification, change order, or contract price 4 5 adjustment under a contract shall be subject to prior written 6 certification by the appropriate fiscal officer for funding the 7 project or the contract, as to the effect of the contract 8 modification, change order, or adjustment in contract price on 9 the total project budget or the total contract budget. In the 10 event that the certification of the fiscal officer discloses a 11 resulting increase in the total project budget or the total 12 contract budget, the procurement officer shall not execute or 13 make such contract modification, change order, or adjustment in 14 contract price unless sufficient funds are available therefor, 15 or the scope of the project or contract is adjusted so as to 16 permit the degree of completion that is feasible within the 17 total project budget or total contract budget as it existed 18 prior to the contract modification, change order, or adjustment 19 in contract price under consideration; provided, that with 20 respect to the validity, as to the contractor, of any executed 21 contract modification, change order, or adjustment in contract

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1	price which the contractor has reasonably relied upon, it shall	
2	be presumed that there has been compliance with this section.	
3	(b) Any contract modification, change order, or adjustment	
4	in contract price that would result in the lesser of either:	
5	(1) A fifty per cent increase of the initial contract	
6	price, or	
7	(2) An increase in excess of \$1,000,000 above the initial	
8	contract price,	
9	shall be submitted with associative cost and pricing analysis to	
10	the chief procurement officer for approval, then shall be	
11	submitted to the administrator for notification."	
12	SECTION 10. Section 103D-809, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
13	amended to read as follows:	
14	"[+]§103D-809[+] Review of procurement requirements. The	
15	[chief procurement officer may] administrator shall collect	
16	information concerning the type, cost, quality, and quantity of	
17	commonly used goods, services, or construction being procured or	
18	used by state public procurement units[\div], in coordination with	
19	the chief procurement officer. The chief procurement officer	
20	may also collect and report this information from local public	
21	procurement units. The [chief procurement officer may] <u>state</u>	



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1 procurement office shall make available all such available 2 information to any public procurement unit upon request." 3 SECTION 11. This Act does not affect the rights and duties 4 that matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that 5 were begun before its effective date. 6 SECTION 12. There is appropriated out of the general 7 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 8 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2016-2017 and the 9 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 10 2017-2018 for the state procurement office to establish the 11 statewide electronic procurement database and establish 12 necessary positions pursuant to this Act. 13 SECTION 13. All appropriations, records, equipment, 14 machines, files, supplies, contracts, books, papers, documents, 15 maps, and other personal property heretofore made, used, acquired, or held by the office of the auditor relating to the 16 17 functions transferred to the state procurement agency shall be 18 transferred with the functions to which they relate. 19 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the state 20 procurement office for the purposes of this Act.

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SECTION 14. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

3 SECTION 15. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2017.
