

A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE OFFICE OF THE LONG-TERM CARE OMBUDSMAN PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that in the executive
- 2 office on aging reorganization of June 2015, the long-term care
- 3 ombudsman program was reduced in staff to only the director,
- 4 making Hawaii the only state in the country with a long-term
- 5 care ombudsman program staff of one. In 1995, a time when most
- 6 residents lived in nursing homes, the Institute of Medicine
- 7 recommended a minimum staffing ratio of one full-time paid
- 8 ombudsman for every two thousand long-term care residents.
- 9 Currently, Hawaii has over twelve thousand long-term care
- 10 residents, most of whom live in the community rather than in
- 11 nursing homes, which creates greater challenges. Under the 1995
- 12 Institute of Medicine recommendation, Hawaii should have a
- 13 minimum of six full-time long-term care ombudsmen.
- 14 The legislature further finds that the long-term care
- 15 ombudsman program may utilize volunteers. The long-term care
- 16 ombudsman program has certified close to one hundred eighty

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- 1 volunteers since the volunteer component began in 2001, using
- 2 considerable time and resources for recruitment, training, and
- 3 retention; however, as of 2016, there were only eight ombudsman
- 4 volunteers. Furthermore, volunteers cannot substitute for a
- 5 full-time, highly trained, paid staff position.
- 6 The legislature also finds that in addition to visits to
- 7 long-term care facilities, long-term care ombudsmen respond to a
- 8 multitude of complaints, engage in investigations, and provide
- 9 information, assistance, and referrals to long-term residents
- 10 and their families. As of 2016, there were 1,405 long-term care
- 11 facilities on Oahu, 40 facilities on Kauai, 70 facilities on
- 12 Maui, and 187 facilities on Hawaii, for a total of 1,702
- 13 facilities statewide. The long-term care ombudsman program
- 14 lacks staff to visit each facility on a quarterly basis, let
- 15 alone facilitate resident and family councils, provide more
- 16 community education, and work more closely with neighbor island
- 17 county councils and the area agencies on aging. The legislature
- 18 additionally finds that the long-term care ombudsman program
- 19 requires resources to ensure that the neighbor islands' kupuna
- 20 and their families receive the same equal access to the services

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1 provided by the long-term care ombudsman program as Oahu has 2 received since 1975. 3 The purpose of this Act is to support the long-term care 4 ombudsman program on the island of Oahu and allocate funds for 5 contracted services through the office of the long-term care 6 ombudsman in the counties of Hawaii, Kauai, and Maui. 7 There is appropriated out of the general SECTION 2. 8 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$150,000 or so much 9 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the 10 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 11 2018-2019 for the long-term care ombudsman program to support 12 the long-term care ombudsman program on the island of Oahu and 13 provide funding for contracted services through the office of 14 the long-term care ombudsman in the counties of Hawaii, Kauai, 15 and Maui; provided that the appropriation shall be distributed 16 as follows: 17 (1) Office of the long-term care ombudsman for the city and county of Honolulu 18 \$75,000; 19 (2) Office of the long-term care ombudsman

for the county of Hawaii

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\$25,000;

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1	(3)	Office of the long-term car	re ombudsman
2		for the county of Kauai	\$25,000; and
3	(4)	Office of the long-term car	re ombudsman
4		for the county of Maui	\$25,000.
5	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the executive		
6	office on aging for the purposes of this Act.		
7	SECT	ION 3. This Act shall take	effect on July 1, 2017.
