# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SCHOOL-BASED HEALTH SERVICES.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Hawaii keiki: 2 healthy and ready to learn program is designed to improve access 3 to, and the quality of, school-based health services available 4 to Hawaii's public school students by coordinating and expanding 5 the existing efforts of community partners and resources. 6 partnership program with the University of Hawaii at Manoa 7 school of nursing and dental hygiene supports the department of 8 education in achieving student, school, and system success by 9 providing school health nursing and primary care services to 10 public schools in five complex areas. 11 In 2015, the legislature appropriated general funds to 12 improve access to, and increase the quality of, health services **13** available to Hawaii's public school students. 14 appropriation led to the expansion of the Hawaii keiki program, 15 with five advanced practice registered nurses and five 16 registered nurses serving seven complex areas across three

- 1 islands. During this time, the Hawaii keiki program also
- 2 established five school-based health centers.
- 3 The legislature further finds that the department of
- 4 education is working with other state agencies, partnering
- 5 organizations, and families to improve attendance, behavior, and
- 6 course marks by partnering to coordinate wraparound services
- 7 that address non-school factors that impede student success.
- 8 Further, through the Hawaii keiki program collaboration, the
- 9 departments of health and human services have identified the
- 10 extent of services provided within each department targeted to
- 11 public school children and the need to coordinate internal
- 12 departmental activity and cross departmental efforts to develop
- 13 sustainable school-based health services.
- 14 The legislature additionally finds that chronic
- 15 absenteeism, poor health, and delayed or limited access to
- 16 health care and preventive services continue to hinder students'
- 17 academic success and schools' ability to meet the needs of the
- 18 whole child. The legislature acknowledges that the Hawaii keiki
- 19 program is an effective means by which to continue collaboration
- 20 between health, human services, and education policymakers and
- 21 providers to achieve sustainable comprehensive school-based

- 1 health services in the State to improve the academic and health
- 2 outcomes of Hawaii's public school students. Working with each
- 3 complex area superintendent and school principals, the Hawaii
- 4 keiki program builds and enhances school-based health services
- 5 that reflect the specific needs of the individual complex area
- 6 according to student demographics, staffing, available support
- 7 services, and access to health care within the community,
- 8 including:
- 9 (1) Comprehensive screening for physical and behavioral
- health conditions;
- 11 (2) Referrals to primary and behavioral health care and
- patient-centered medical home services;
- 13 (3) Prevention and control of communicable diseases and
- other health problems; and
- 15 (4) Emergency care for illness or injury.
- 16 The legislature also finds that the expected cost to
- 17 continue and expand the Hawaii keiki program to all fifteen
- 18 department of education complex areas statewide; expand the
- 19 program to allow the Hawaii state public charter school
- 20 commission to launch the program in two public charter schools
- 21 serving disadvantaged keiki; provide access to preventive oral

- 1 health services and establish a pilot oral health screening and
- 2 preventative services program on a neighbor island; enhance data
- 3 collection, sharing, analysis, and reporting; and engage in
- 4 interdepartmental school health coordination, is \$4,000,000
- 5 annually. These funds will additionally establish school health
- 6 services coordinator positions in the department of health and
- 7 the MedQUEST division of the department of human services.
- 8 The purpose of this Act is to formally establish the Hawaii
- 9 keiki: healthy and ready to learn program in statute. To
- 10 ensure the program's success, this Act provides funding to
- 11 expand and sustain the program and establishes school health
- 12 service positions in the departments of health and human
- 13 services to increase coordination and facilitate departmental
- 14 and interdepartmental activities related to comprehensive
- 15 school-based health services.
- 16 SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 17 amended by adding two new sections to be appropriately
- 18 designated and to read as follows:
- 19 "§302A-A Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready to learn
- 20 program. (a) There is established within the department the
- 21 Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready to learn program to provide

- 17 medication; provided that:
- (1) If the student receiving the medication is a minor, a
- 19 parent or guardian requests and authorizes the
- 20 administration of medication;

13	SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general		
14	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much		
15	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the		
16	same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year		
17	2018-2019 for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) school health		
18	services coordinator position within the department of health.		
19	The	sums appropriated shall be expended by the department	
20	of health	for the purposes of this Act.	

1 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 3 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the 4 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 5 2018-2019 for one full-time equivalent (1.0 FTE) school health 6 services coordinator position within the department of human 7 services. 8 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 9 of human services for the purposes of this Act. 10 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general 11 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much 12 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the 13 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 14 2018-2019 to be deposited into the Hawaii keiki: healthy and 15 ready to learn special fund. 16 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the Hawaii keiki: **17** healthy and ready to learn special fund the sum of \$ or

so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018

and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for

fiscal year 2018-2019 to implement, expand, and sustain the

21 Hawaii keiki: healthy and ready to learn program.

- 1 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 2 of education for the purposes of this Act.
- 3 SECTION 9. There is appropriated out of the Hawaii keiki:
- 4 healthy and ready to learn special fund the sum of \$ or
- 5 so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018
- 6 for a one-time allocation for an evidence-based vision screening
- 7 and eye assessment tool appropriate for children in kindergarten
- 8 through grade twelve.
- 9 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 10 education for the purposes of this Act.
- 11 SECTION 10. In codifying the new sections added by section
- 12 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
- 13 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
- 14 the new sections in this Act.
- 15 SECTION 11. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 16 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 17 SECTION 12. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2090.
