A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LOAN REPAYMENT FOR HEALTH CARE PROFESSIONALS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that many Hawaii
- 2 residents are unable to obtain timely and appropriate health
- 3 care due to shortages of primary health care providers in the
- 4 State. These shortages threaten individual health and
- 5 cumulatively affect the State's health care costs. The State's
- 6 rural areas, which have been designated by the federal
- 7 government as medically underserved areas, have been most
- 8 significantly affected by shortages of primary and behavioral
- 9 health care providers.
- 10 The increasingly high cost of education for health care
- 11 professionals binds graduates to a career path focused on
- 12 pursuing an income that makes it possible to repay often
- 13 exorbitant student loans. These career paths most often lead to
- 14 professional practice in highly specialized areas of care in
- 15 urban areas and not to general practice on neighbor islands or
- 16 in rural areas where the need is greatest. The legislature
- 17 finds that counties in the United States with robust primary



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- 1 health care systems have lower costs and improved patient
- 2 outcomes. Recognizing this relationship, many states have made
- 3 the policy decision to dedicate public funds to the development
- 4 of a strong primary health care workforce.
- 5 The only loan repayment program currently available in this
- 6 State is administered by the John A. Burns school of medicine at
- 7 the University of Hawaii at Manoa. This program leverages
- 8 private donations to access matching federal funds through the
- 9 State Loan Repayment Program of the National Health Service
- 10 Corps branch of the Department of Health and Human Services.
- 11 Since September 1, 2012, a total of twenty-five physicians,
- 12 nurse practitioners, and psychologists have received loan
- 13 repayment assistance through the program in exchange for work in
- 14 underserved geographic and practice areas in Hawaii. Currently,
- 15 health care professionals who have benefited from the loan
- 16 repayment program serve in the community in Waianae, Hilo, and
- 17 Wailuku; at health clinics in Kalihi-Palama Health Center, Queen
- 18 Emma Clinic, and Waikiki Health Center; and in public
- 19 institutional settings at the Federal Detention Center, Honolulu
- 20 and Halawa correctional facility.

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- 1 The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds to the
- 2 department of health to fund the Hawaii rural health care
- 3 provider loan repayment program administered through the John A.
- 4 Burns school of medicine to provide loan repayment for
- 5 physicians, physician assistants, and nurse practitioners who
- 6 agree to work in a federally-designated health professional
- 7 shortage area or an area of Hawaii found to be underserved.
- 8 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general
- 9 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 10 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and
- 11 the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
- 12 year 2018-2019 for the Hawaii rural health care provider loan
- 13 repayment program; provided that no funds shall be expended
- 14 unless matched on a dollar-for-dollar basis by funds from a
- 15 private or other public source.
- 16 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 17 of health in coordination with the John A. Burns school of
- 18 medicine of the University of Hawaii at Manoa for the purposes
- 19 of this Act.
- 20 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2090.
