

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE OFFICE OF ELECTIONS TO CONVENE A TASK FORCE ON AUTOMATIC VOTER REGISTRATION.

1	WHEREAS, Hawaii's voter turnout percentage has	
2	significantly declined since statehood in 1959, when turnout	
3	stood at ninety-four percent of registered voters; and	
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5	WHEREAS, the percentage of registered voters in Hawaii who	
6	turn out to vote now ranks among the lowest of the fifty states;	
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9	WHEREAS, voter participation is the hallmark of an effective democracy; and	
10 11	effective democracy; and	
12	WHEREAS, an improved process of automatic voter	
13	registration would be beneficial to the public and reduce any	
14	inconvenience currently experienced; and	
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16	WHEREAS, the Legislature believes that an automatic voter	
17	registration process would increase accuracy and efficiency; and	
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19	WHEREAS, removing barriers to registration for eligible	
20	voters is the first step to increasing voter participation; and	
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22	WHEREAS, automatic voter registration would provide	
23	eligible voters with the opportunity to register to vote when	
24 25	applying for or renewing a driver's license or state identification card unless the eligible voter affirmatively	
25 26	declines to be registered; and	
20 27	decimes to be registered, and	
27 28	WHEREAS, voter registration through a routine and necessary	
29	transaction, such as driver's licensing or renewal, increases	
30	voter registration efficiency and effectiveness and voter	
31	turnout; and	



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1 2 WHEREAS, automatic voter registration utilizes information 3 that the government has already collected; and 4 5 WHEREAS, current federal laws authorize the electronic 6 transfer of voter registration information from the counties and 7 Department of Transportation to election officials and the 8 statewide voter registration system; and 9 10 WHEREAS, nothing in the transfer of data would interfere with any election official's authority or obligation, under 11 state or federal law; and 12 13 WHEREAS, six states and the District of Columbia have 14 already successfully enacted automatic voter registration 15 16 systems; and 17 WHEREAS, in 2016, Oregon implemented an automatic voter 18 registration system, and more than 270,000 eligible voters 19 registered via the system, forty three percent of whom voted in 20 21 the 2016 general election, thus helping Oregon set a new state record for the number of votes cast; and 22 23 WHEREAS, automatic voter registration increases security 24 25 and results in improved accuracy of voter rolls through the use of an encrypted system to transfer data rather than using paper 26 27 forms; and 28 29 WHEREAS, automatic voter registration would produce longterm cost savings for the State, since processing paper voter 30 registration forms costs almost thirty times more than using 31 electronic registration; and 32 33 WHEREAS, innovative efforts have been undertaken in other 34 states to successfully reduce barriers to voting, encourage 35 voter participation, and make voting more convenient; now, 36 37 therefore; now, therefore, 38 39 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 40 of 2017, the Senate concurring, that the Office of Elections is 41 42 requested to convene an automatic voter registration task force 43 to: 44



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Review current data systems used by the Department of (1)1 2 Transportation and the counties to identify collaborative ways to streamline data transfers; 3 4 (2) Review existing federal and state laws and practices 5 regarding voter registration, including the Help 6 7 America Vote Again Act of 2002 and the National Voter Registration Act of 1993, and consider ways to bring 8 the State into compliance with existing federal law 9 and to avail the State of potential funding; 10 11 Determine the feasibility, cost savings, and fiscal (3) 12 impact of implementing automatic voter registration in 13 the State; and 14 15 Determine the feasibility, cost savings, and fiscal (4) 16 impact of implementing automatic permanent absentee 17 18 voter registration upon the application or renewal of 19 a driver's license in the State; and 20 21 (5) Propose legislation that would implement the automatic voter registration process; and 22 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force include: 24 25 26 (1) One representative from the Office of Elections; 27 (2)One representative from the Office of Hawaiian 28 29 Affairs; 30 One representative from each of the offices of the 31 (3)City Clerk for the City and County of Honolulu and the 32 County Clerk for the County of Kauai, County of Maui, 33 34 and County of Hawaii; 35 36 (4) One representative from the Department of 37 Transportation; 38 39 (5) One representative appointed by the Senate President; 40 (6) One representative appointed by the Speaker of the 41 House of Representatives; and 42 43 One representative appointed by the Governor; and 44 (7)HCR116 HD1 JUD REDD 2017 3

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1 2 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all members of the task force shall be registered voters in the State; and 3 4 5 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Office of Elections is requested to convene the first meeting of the task force no 6 7 later than July 1, 2017; and 8 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference 9 10 Bureau is requested to assist the task force as necessary; and 11 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force is requested to 12 submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including 13 proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty 14 15 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2018; and 16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force and the 17 18 Legislative Reference Bureau are requested to be available to 19 provide testimony to the Legislature and for informational briefings; and 20 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force shall cease to 22 23 exist on the day of the adjournment of the Regular Session of 2018; and 24 25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 26 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chief Election 27 Officer, Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of the Office of 28 Hawaiian Affairs, Director of Transportation, Director of the 29 Legislative Reference Bureau, Clerk of the City and County of 30 Honolulu, Clerk of the County of Kauai, Clerk of the County of 31 Maui, and Clerk of the County of Hawaii. 32 33 34 35 36
