HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THAT THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH ESTABLISH AND CONVENE A MEDICATION SYNCHRONIZATION WORKING GROUP TO EXPLORE AND PROPOSE LEGISLATION.

1 WHEREAS, medication synchronization improves patient 2 health, reduces costs to insurers, and promotes efficient workflow in pharmacies by allowing pharmacists and patients to 3 4 work together to synchronize a patient's medications for pick-up 5 on the same day each month; and 6 WHEREAS, studies of more than 6,500 patients enrolled in 7 pilot programs show that medication adherence rates can be 8 9 greatly improved with appointment-based medication synchronization, particularly for patients requiring long-term 10 maintenance medications; and 11 12 13 WHEREAS, synchronization simplifies therapeutic regimens and improves access to care for patients living in rural areas 14 and for patients with limited means of transportation; and 15 16 17 WHEREAS, pharmacists are well-trained to proactively manage a patient's medication-related needs and medication 18 synchronization allows pharmacists to provide medication therapy 19 management and other types of clinical services to patients with 20 21 greater success because pharmacies are easily accessible; and 22 WHEREAS, medication synchronization benefits payers because 23 24 it improves clinical quality by increasing adherence for members, and payers therefore achieve higher stars ratings and 25 Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services bonus and rebate 26 27 payments; and 28 WHEREAS, 19 states, including Washington, Oregon, Nevada, 29 30 Idaho, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Missouri, Louisiana,

1 Kentucky, Michigan, Ohio, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Maine, 2 Vermont, Connecticut, and New Jersey have approved medication 3 synchronization for commercial patients; and 4 5 WHEREAS, of the 19 states that have approved medication 6 synchronization there are 14 states that are poised to pass 7 medication synchronization legislation, with five more states 8 considering legislation in 2017; now, therefore, 9 10 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 11 Twenty-ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2017, the Senate concurring, that the Director of Health is 12 13 requested to establish a medication synchronization working 14 group to suggest legislation to be introduced in the 2018 15 Regular Session; and 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Director of Health is 18 requested to invite two representatives from the retail pharmacy 19 community, one representative from the community pharmacy association, one representative from the health insurance 20 industry, and one representative of the Board of Pharmacy to 21 22 become members of the working group; and 23 24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the medication synchronization 25 working group is requested to: 26 27 Meet regularly to gather information about medication (1)28 synchronization practices across the nation with the goal of formulating a medical synchronization program 29 30 for the State; 31 32 (2) Review and recommend implementation of best practices 33 learned from other jurisdictions and discuss emerging 34 policies and regulations with respect to, but not limited to, 90-day fills, pharmacist dispensing fees, 35 36 and patient copays; 37 (3) Recommend any pharmacy staff education including 38 pharmacist continuing education requirements, as 39 40 necessary; and

(4)Draft proposed legislation to create standards for 1 medication synchronization programs in Hawaii; and 2 3 4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the medication synchronization 5 working group is requested to submit a written report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed 6 7 legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior 8 to the convening of the Regular Session of 2018; and 9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 10 11 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chair of the Senate Committee on Commerce, Consumer Protection, and Health; Chair of 12 the House Committee on Health; Director of Health; and 13 14 Chairperson of the Board of Pharmacy. 15 16 17 OFFERED BY:
