

## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE BOARD OF PRIVATE DETECTIVES AND GUARDS TO REVIEW THE CURRENT LAWS, REGULATIONS, PROCEDURES, AND FEES ASSOCIATED WITH THE REGISTRATION OF SECURITY GUARDS.

WHEREAS, the current laws and administrative rules 1 governing the registration of security guard employees may be 2 overly burdensome and costly for the security guard workforce; 3 4 and 5 WHEREAS, existing administrative rules place a heavy burden 6 on security guards, creating barriers for guards wishing to 7 enter, continue, or return to the profession; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the Board of Private Detectives and Guards charges 10 a \$117 fee for a person to register or renew a registration as a 11 security quard employee for two years, which is a large up-front 12 expense for a person who may be unemployed and trying to find 13 gainful employment as a security quard; and 14 15 WHEREAS, before registering with the Board of Private 16 Detectives and Guards, the applicant must first complete eight 17 hours of classroom instruction by an approved instructor, and an 18 additional four hours of classroom instruction is required each 19 time applicants renew their registration; and 20 21 WHEREAS, prices for training classes are left fully to the 22 discretion of instructors, and there is no statutory or 23 administrative rule framework that sets a maximum or minimum 24 amount that can be charged, thus creating an opportunity for 25 price gouging by instructors; and 26 27 WHEREAS, the high cost of registration and training can 28 cause a large financial strain on both new security guards who 29





have not yet worked a single day on the job, and renewing guards 1 who are unemployed but searching for work; and 2 3 WHEREAS, the costs and fees required for a person to attain 4 and maintain a security guard registration with the State are 5 high in relation to the relatively low wages that security 6 quards are paid; and 7 8 WHEREAS, security guard agencies are often reliant on 9 contracts with third party organizations that can be terminated 10 by the third party at any time, potentially resulting in mass 11 layoffs of security guards; and 12 13 WHEREAS, although some guard agencies will pay for the 14 training and registration fees for prospective employees and 15 employees, these agencies often prohibit the employee from using 16 their guard registration with any other employer as a condition 17 for doing so, thereby preventing the quard employee from taking 18 second part-time jobs and denying them additional supplemental 19 20 income; and 21 WHEREAS, security guards who do not renew their 22 23 registration with the Board of Private Detectives and Guards face immediate forfeiture of their registration rather than 24 25 suspension; and 26 WHEREAS, while a forfeited registration may be restored 27 within one year after the date of forfeiture by filing a renewal 28 application along with required documentation, renewal fees, and 29 a penalty fee, a person who fails to restore a forfeited 30 registration within one year is considered a new applicant and 31 must satisfy all requirements for licensure in effect at the 32 time the person reapplies for registration; and 33 34 WHEREAS, although a security guard can place the 35 registration on an "inactive" status with the Board of Private 36 Detectives and Guards, the employee must still pay fees to the 37 Board to do so, which can constitute a hardship for security 38 guards who are out of work and trying to find gainful 39 employment; now, therefore, 40 41





BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 1 Twenty-ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 2 of 2017, the Senate concurring, that the Board of Private 3 Detectives and Guards is requested to review the current laws, 4 5 administrative rules, and procedures currently governing the 6 registration of security guards, including: 7 8 (1)The policy mandating forfeiture of registration rather than suspension; 9 10 Whether the current registration fees are too high in 11 (2) relation to the median pay of security guards and when 12 compared to the licensing fees of other professions; 13 14 and 15 16 (3) Whether the prices charged by training instructors should be regulated by the Board; and 17 18 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Private Detectives 19 and Guards is requested to study whether security quard agencies 20 21 should be prohibited from denying their employees from taking outside supplemental employment; and 22 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Private Detectives 24 and Guards is requested to submit findings and recommendations, 25 including any proposed legislation or amendments to 26 administrative rules, to the Legislature not later than twenty 27 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2018; and 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 30 31 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, the Director of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, the Division 32 Administrator of the Professional and Vocational Licensing 33 Division, and the Chair of the Board of Private Detectives and 34 Guards. 35 36 37
