

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF BUDGET AND FINANCE TO STUDY THE PER-PUPIL FUNDING SYSTEM FOR PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOLS TO DETERMINE WHETHER THE SYSTEM ENSURES EQUITABLE FUNDING AMONG ALL PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND WHETHER AN ALTERNATIVE SYSTEM MAY ACHIEVE GREATER FUNDING PARITY AND FINANCIAL AND LONG-TERM OPERATIONAL SUSTAINABILITY FOR PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOLS.

1 WHEREAS, Hawaii's public charter schools are a part of the 2 state public education system and contribute to that system as a 3 whole by providing alternative educational options and modeling 4 innovative practices; and

6 WHEREAS, each public charter school is a single state
7 entity, self-governed by a volunteer governing board,
8 independently managed, and primarily dependent on state funding
9 in order to operate; and

WHEREAS, section 302D-28, Hawaii Revised Statutes, mandates 11 that the non-facility general fund per-pupil funding request for 12 public charter school students be the same as the non-facility 13 general fund per-pupil amount to the Department of Education in 14 the most recently approved executive budget recommendation for 15 the Department, but with the caveat that the general fund per-16 pupil request includes only certain general fund cost 17 categories, and excludes other general fund cost categories; and 18 19 WHEREAS, section 302D-28, Hawaii Revised Statutes, also 20 requires the Department of Budget and Finance to ensure that 21 non-facility general fund per-pupil amounts allocated for 22

Department of Education and public charter school students are

equal on an annualized fiscal year basis; and

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WHEREAS, public charter schools receive the majority of 1 2 their funding through this non-facility general fund per-pupil amount; and 3 4 WHEREAS, public charter schools must also meet other 5 6 expenses, including facility costs; and 7 WHEREAS, the ability of public charter schools to receive 8 facilities funding, independent of the per-pupil funding system, 9 is addressed in section 302D-29.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, but 10 this section only requires that the Legislature "consider" 11 providing funding, and does not actually guarantee a stable 12 source of facilities funding for these schools; and 13 14 WHEREAS, the State Public Charter School Commission has 15 warned in its annual reports that financial data from the public 16 charter schools reveal both short-term financial strain as well 17 as long-term operational sustainability challenges; and 18 19 WHEREAS, questions have been raised about whether the 20 current per-pupil funding system provides equitable funding for 21 public charter schools as compared to Department of Education 22 schools, and whether public charter schools should instead 23 exercise their statutory option under section 302D-29, Hawaii 24 Revised Statutes, to either receive allocations in accordance 25 with the weighted student formula adopted by the Board of 26 Education pursuant to section 302A-1303.6, Hawaii Revised 27 Statutes, or to propose an alternative weighted student formula 28 to the Board of Education through their authorizer; and 29 30 WHEREAS, the statutory option under section 302D-29, Hawaii 31 Revised Statutes, is available only if approved by more than a 32 two-thirds vote of the public charter school governing boards; 33 and 34 35 WHEREAS, public charter school governing boards may not 36 have the resources and expertise to analyze whether the current 37 per-pupil funding system under section 302D-28, Hawaii Revised 38 Statutes, weighted student formula adopted by the Board of 39 Education pursuant to section 302A-1303.6, Hawaii Revised 40 Statutes, or an alternative weighted student formula would best 41



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1 lead to financial and long-term operational sustainability; now, 2 therefore,

4 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 5 of 2017, the Senate concurring, that the Department of Budget 6 7 and Finance is requested to conduct a study on the non-facility general fund per-pupil funding system for public charter schools 8 to determine whether the present system ensures equitable 9 funding among all public schools, and whether the weighted 10 student formula adopted by the Board of Education pursuant to 11 section 302A-1303.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, or other 12 alternative weighted student formula funding methodology may 13 achieve greater funding parity and lead to financial and long-14 15 term operational sustainability; and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the study:

- (1) Include an analysis and explanation of all general fund non-facility costs referenced in section 302D-28, Hawaii Revised Statutes;
- (2) Identify and explain all general fund cost categories not currently used by the Department of Budget and Finance to determine the per-pupil funding amount for public charter schools;
- (3) Analyze whether the current per-pupil funding methodology for public charter schools ensures equitable funding among all public schools, using figures dating back to fiscal year 2012-2013, based upon relevant cost categories and actual expenditures made by public charter schools and Department of Education schools;

 37 characteristics that would give them an advantage in
 38 achieving funding parity and financial and long-term
 39 operational sustainability under the weighted student
 40 formula adopted by the Board of Education pursuant to
 41 section 302A-1303.6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and
