A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO NATUROPATHIC MEDICINE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that naturopathic
 2 physicians provide skilled and quality care to patients
 3 throughout the State. Naturopathic physicians also work to
 4 promote integrated health care, such as the use and application
- 5 of hormone therapy and pain management. Although naturopathic
- ${f 6}$ physicians in Hawaii have some prescriptive authority, they are
- 7 unable to prescribe controlled substances. For instance,
- ${f 8}$ testosterone and codeine as well as codeine combination products
- ${f 9}$ are examples of controlled substances that are consistent with
- 10 the practice of naturopathic medicine, but are prohibited from
- 11 being prescribed by naturopathic physicians in Hawaii.
- 12 The legislature further finds that naturopathic physicians
- 13 are known for their expertise in bio-identical hormone
- 14 replacement therapy, including the use of estrogens,
- 15 progesterone, and testosterone. Furthermore, although
- 16 naturopathic care generally involves the use of non-prescription
- 17 natural medications, naturopathic physicians may occasionally

- 1 recommend prescription drugs when appropriate. This includes
- 2 the area of pain management, specifically the relief of mild to
- 3 moderate pain, which may be best achieved through the short-term
- 4 use of codeine and codeine combination products.
- 5 The legislature finds that licensed naturopathic physicians
- 6 in Hawaii should have prescriptive authority for those
- 7 controlled substances that are consistent with the practice of
- 8 naturopathic medicine. The legislature notes that the
- 9 prescription of certain other controlled substances, such as
- 10 narcotic drugs, are not considered consistent with naturopathic
- 11 practice and should not be included in the naturopathic
- 12 formulary. The legislature also notes that controlled
- 13 substances have been included in the prescriptive authority for
- 14 naturopathic physicians in other states, such as Arizona,
- 15 California, Oregon, and Washington.
- 16 The purpose of this Act is to authorize a naturopathic
- 17 physician to prescribe controlled substances consistent with
- 18 naturopathic medical practice.
- 19 SECTION 2. Chapter 455, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 20 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 21 and to read as follows:

3	the feder	al Drug Enforcement Administration, a naturopathic	
4	physician	may register with the department of public safety	
5	pursuant	to section 329-33 and may obtain a current Federal Drug	
6	Enforcement Administration registration."		
7	SECTION 3. Section 329-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
8	amended by amending the definition of "practitioner" to read as		
9	follows:		
10	""Practitioner" means:		
11	(1)	A physician, dentist, veterinarian, scientific	
12		investigator, or other person licensed and registered	
13		under section 329-32 to distribute, dispense, or	
14		conduct research with respect to a controlled	
15		substance in the course of professional practice or	
16		research in this State;	
17	(2)	An advanced practice registered nurse with	
18		prescriptive authority licensed and registered under	
19		section 329-32 to prescribe and administer controlled	
20		substances in the course of professional practice in	
21		this State; [and]

1	(3)	A pharmacy, hospital, or other institution licensed,	
2		registered, or otherwise permitted to distribute,	
3		dispense, conduct research with respect to or to	
4		administer a controlled substance in the course of	
5		professional practice or research in this State $[-]$:

7	(4)	A naturopathic physician licensed pursuant to chapter	
8		<u>455.</u> "	
9	SECTION 4. Chapter 455-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
10	amended as follows:		
11	1. By adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted		
12	and to read:		
13	"Controlled substance" means a scheduled drug as defined		
14	in section 329-1."		
15	2.	By amending the definition of "naturopathic formulary"	
16	to read:		
17	""Na	turopathic formulary" means vitamins, minerals, dietary	
18	supplements, botanical medicines, homeopathic medicines,		
19	hormones, and those legend drugs and controlled substances		
20	consisten	t with naturopathic medical practice[-]; provided that

- 1 the naturopathic formulary shall not include any narcotic drugs,
- 2 as defined in section 329-1."
- 3 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 4 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 5 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2017.

Naturopathic Physicians; Controlled Substances; Naturopathic Formulary; Testosterone; Prescriptive Authority

Description:

Authorizes a naturopathic physician to prescribe controlled substances that are consistent with naturopathic medical practice. Clarifies that narcotic drugs shall not be included within the naturopathic formulary.

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
