A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO NATUROPATHIC MEDICINE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that naturopathic
- 2 physicians provide skilled and quality care to patients
- 3 throughout the State. Naturopathic physicians also work to
- 4 promote integrated health care, such as the use and application
- 5 of hormone therapy. Although naturopathic physicians in Hawaii
- 6 have some prescriptive authority, they are unable to prescribe
- 7 controlled substances. For instance, testosterone is an example
- 8 of a controlled substance that is consistent with the practice
- 9 of naturopathic medicine, but is prohibited from being
- 10 prescribed by naturopathic physicians in Hawaii.
- 11 The legislature further finds that naturopathic physicians
- 12 are known for their expertise in bio-identical hormone
- 13 replacement therapy, including the use of estrogens,
- 14 progesterone, and testosterone. The legislature also finds that
- 15 licensed naturopathic physicians in Hawaii should have
- 16 prescriptive authority for testosterone, as it is a controlled
- 17 substance that is consistent with the practice of naturopathic
- 18 medicine. The legislature notes that the prescription of



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- 1 certain other controlled substances, such as narcotic drugs, are
- 2 not considered consistent with naturopathic practice and should
- 3 not be included in the naturopathic formulary. The legislature
- 4 also notes that controlled substances have been included in the
- 5 prescriptive authority for naturopathic physicians in other
- 6 states, such as Arizona, California, Oregon, and Washington.
- 7 The purpose of this Act is to authorize a naturopathic
- 8 physician to prescribe testosterone consistent with naturopathic
- 9 medical practice.
- 10 SECTION 2. Chapter 455, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 11 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 12 and to read as follows:
- 13 "\$455- Testosterone; authorization. Subject to any
- 14 requirements imposed by the department of public safety and the
- 15 federal Drug Enforcement Administration, a naturopathic
- 16 physician may register with the department of public safety
- 17 pursuant to section 329-33 and may obtain a current Federal Drug
- 18 Enforcement Administration registration to prescribe and
- 19 administer testosterone."

2	amended b	y amending the definition of "practitioner" to read as
3	follows:	
4	""Practitioner" means:	
5	(1)	A physician, dentist, veterinarian, scientific
6		investigator, or other person licensed and registered
7		under section 329-32 to distribute, dispense, or
8		conduct research with respect to a controlled
9		substance in the course of professional practice or
10		research in this State;
11	(2)	An advanced practice registered nurse with
12		prescriptive authority licensed and registered under
13		section 329-32 to prescribe and administer controlled
14		substances in the course of professional practice in
15		this State; [and]
16	(3)	A pharmacy, hospital, or other institution licensed,
17		registered, or otherwise permitted to distribute,
18		dispense, conduct research with respect to or to
19		administer a controlled substance in the course of
20		professional practice or research in this State $[-]$:

and

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- 1 (4) A naturopathic physician licensed pursuant to chapter
 2 455 who is licensed and registered to prescribe and
 3 administer testosterone in the course of professional
 4 practice in this State."
- 5 SECTION 4. Chapter 455-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 6 amended as follows:
- 7 1. By adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted
- 8 and to read:
- 9 ""Testosterone" means a schedule III drug as classified in
- 10 section 329-18."
- 11 2. By amending the definition of "naturopathic formulary"
- 12 to read:
- ""Naturopathic formulary" means vitamins, minerals, dietary
- 14 supplements, botanical medicines, homeopathic medicines,
- 15 hormones, and those legend drugs and testosterone consistent
- 16 with naturopathic medical practice [-]; provided that the
- 17 naturopathic formulary shall not include any narcotic drugs, as
- 18 defined in section 329-1."
- 19 SECTION 5. Section 455-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 20 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:

1	"(a)	In addition to any other actions authorized by law,	
2	the board	shall have the power to deny, revoke, suspend, or	
3	refuse to	renew any license to practice naturopathic medicine	
4	applied f	or or issued by the board in accordance with this	
5	chapter, and to fine or otherwise discipline a licensee for an		
6	cause authorized by law, including but not limited to the		
7	following:		
8	(1)	Failing to meet or maintain the conditions and	
9		requirements necessary to qualify for the issuance of	
10		a license;	
11	(2)	Procuring, or aiding or abetting in procuring, a	
12		criminal abortion;	
13	(3)	Employing any person to solicit patients;	
14	(4)	Obtaining a fee on the assurance that a manifestly	
15		incurable disease can be permanently cured;	
16	(5)	Betraying a patient's confidence;	
17	(6)	Making any untruthful and improbable statement in	
18		advertising one's naturopathic practice or business;	
19	(7)	False, fraudulent, or deceptive advertising;	
20	(8)	Being habituated to the excessive use of drugs or	
21		alcohol; or being addicted to, dependent on, or an	

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1		habitual user of a narcotic, barbiturate, amphetamine,
2		hallucinogen, or other drug having similar effects;
3	(9)	Practicing naturopathic medicine while the ability to
4		practice is impaired by alcohol, drug, physical
5		disability, or mental instability;
6	(10)	Procuring a license through fraud, misrepresentation,
7		or deceit or knowingly permitting an unlicensed person
8		to perform activities requiring a license;
9	(11)	Professional misconduct or gross carelessness or
10		manifest incapacity in the practice of naturopathic
11		medicine;
12	(12)	Conduct or practice contrary to recognized standard of
13		ethics of the naturopathic profession;
14	(13)	Using medical service or treatment which is
15		inappropriate or unnecessary;
16	(14)	Submitting to or filing with the board any notice,
17		statement, or other document required under this
18		chapter which is false or untrue or contains any
19		material misstatement of fact, including any false
20		certification of compliance with the continuing
21		education requirement specified under section 455-8;

1	(15)	Failure to report to the board any disciplinary action
2		taken against the licensee in another jurisdiction
3		within thirty days after the disciplinary action
4		becomes final;
5	(16)	Using the title "physician" without clearly
6		identifying oneself as being a naturopathic physician;
7	(17)	Prescribing, administering, and dispensing
8		naturopathic formulary that are not included in the
9		formulary established by the board under section 455-
10		6; [and]
11	(18)	Violation of chapter 329, the uniform controlled
12		substances act, or any rule adopted thereunder, except
13		as provided in section 329-122; and
14	[(18)]	(19) Violation of any provision of this chapter or
15		rules adopted under this chapter."

18	SECT	ION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2017.
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Report Title:

Naturopathic Physicians; Testosterone; Naturopathic Formulary; Testosterone; Prescriptive Authority

Description:

Authorizes a naturopathic physician to prescribe testosterone that is consistent with naturopathic medical practice. Clarifies that narcotic drugs shall not be included within the naturopathic formulary. (SD1)

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
