A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE PER-PUPIL FUNDING SYSTEM FOR PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOLS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii's public
- 2 charter schools are a part of the state public education system
- 3 and contribute to that system as a whole, by providing
- 4 alternative educational options and modeling innovative
- 5 practices. Each public charter school is a single state entity,
- 6 and primarily dependent on state funding for operational costs.
- 7 The legislature further finds that the public charter
- 8 school system is of particular importance to the Native Hawaiian
- 9 community and the perpetuation of Hawaii's host culture, as
- 10 seventeen of the thirty-four public charter schools are
- 11 Hawaiian-focused or Hawaiian language immersion schools,
- 12 offering educational curricula grounded in Hawaiian cultural
- 13 values, concepts, and language.
- 14 Hawaii's public charter schools receive a majority of their
- 15 funding through a general fund per-pupil allotment. Section
- 16 302D-28, Hawaii Revised Statutes, mandates that non-facility
- 17 general fund per-pupil funding for public charter school



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- 1 students be the same as that for department of education school
- 2 students. The non-facility general fund per-pupil allotment for
- 3 public charter schools is accordingly determined based on the
- 4 total funding allocated to certain programs within the
- 5 department of education, and the projected and verified student
- 6 enrollment rates for department of education and public charter
- 7 schools.
- 8 The legislature finds that questions have been raised
- 9 regarding whether the per-pupil funding system provides equal
- 10 funding for public charter schools as intended under the law,
- 11 including whether all required department of education cost
- 12 categories are appropriately and consistently factored into the
- 13 determination of the per-pupil allotment for public charter
- 14 schools. A potential disparity in per-pupil funding is of
- 15 particular concern, given that public charter schools must also
- 16 meet other expenses, including facility costs, not borne by
- 17 department of education schools, and given the state public
- 18 charter school commission's warning in its annual reports that
- 19 public charter schools may face short-term financial strain as
- 20 well as long-term operational sustainability challenges.

1	The purpose of this Act is to require the legislative
2	reference bureau to conduct a study on the per-pupil funding
3	system, to determine whether the system fulfills its statutory
4	purpose of equalizing operational funding among public schools.
5	SECTION 2. (a) The legislative reference bureau shall
6	conduct a study on the non-facility general fund per-pupil
7	funding system for public charter schools, to determine whether
8	the system fulfills its statutory purpose of equalizing
9	operational funding among the State's public schools. The study
10	shall:
11	(1) Include all general fund non-facility costs described
12	in section 302D-28(a), Hawaii Revised Statutes,
13	including but not limited to school-based budgeting,
14	instructional support, school administration, and
15	school support;
16	(2) Describe all general fund cost categories not
17	considered in the determination of per-pupil funding
18	for public charter schools, except for fringe benefits
19	costs under section 302D-28(b), Hawaii Revised
20	Statutes; and

- 3 (b) The department of education and the state public
 4 charter school commission shall jointly designate specific data
 5 detailing what the present system of funding consists of within
 6 the statutory allocation, to enable the bureau to focus its
 7 study and complete it in a timely manner, and shall provide that
 8 data to the legislative reference bureau, in a format to be
- (c) The department of education, department of budget and finance, state public charter school commission, Hawaii Public Charter School Network, Hawaii Educational Policy Center, and other stakeholder agencies are requested to provide other information and assistance as requested by the legislative reference bureau.

determined by the bureau, by June 30, 2017.

- (d) The legislative reference bureau may enter into
 contracts for services for the purpose of conducting the study.
 Contracts entered into under this subsection shall be exempt
 from the requirements of chapter 103D, Hawaii Revised Statutes.
- (e) The legislative reference bureau shall submit a reportof its findings and recommendations, including any proposed

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- 1 legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior
- 2 to the convening of the regular session of 2019.
- 3 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 4 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$50,000 or so much
- 5 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the
- 6 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 7 2018-2019 for contracts for services necessary to conduct a
- 8 study on the non-facility general fund per-pupil funding system
- 9 for public charter schools.
- 10 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the legislative
- 11 reference bureau for the purposes of this Act.
- 12 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
- 13 provided that section 3 shall take effect on July 1, 2017.

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Report Title:

Description:

Requires the Legislative Reference Bureau to conduct a study on the non-facility general fund per-pupil funding system for public charter schools, to determine whether the system fulfills its statutory purpose of equalizing operational funding among the State's public schools. Authorizes the Legislative Reference Bureau to enter contracts for services to conduct the study. Makes an appropriation. (SD1)

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
