A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HAZING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that hazing is a ritual
- 2 conducted by school groups, sports teams, organizations,
- 3 associations, and places of employment as a means to initiate
- 4 new members into the "sacred circle" of the organization. In
- 5 some cases, these rituals can be life threatening as members of
- 6 the organization conduct physically and emotionally dangerous
- 7 acts onto others who they wish to initiate or control. Many
- 8 states have passed anti-hazing laws and many schools and
- 9 universities have added no-tolerance policies against such
- 10 practices. Knowing what hazing is, how to prevent hazing, and
- 11 the consequences surrounding these acts is just the beginning to
- 12 stopping these practices from occurring.
- 13 The legislature further finds that although many are
- 14 banding together to prevent hazing activities from occurring at
- 15 all levels of academia, including high school and college,
- 16 hazing can occur in organizations and work places beyond
- 17 educational institutions. According to StopHazing.org, forty-

- 1 four states have anti-hazing laws in place. Hawaii is one of
- 2 six states without an anti-hazing law. Hazing can cause
- 3 emotional, academic, professional, and physical damage to the
- 4 person targeted and propagate a culture of bullying and control
- 5 over others. Hawaii should therefore take steps to protect
- 6 students, athletes, and workers from hazing.
- 7 The purpose of this Act is to establish a state anti-hazing
- 8 law.
- 9 SECTION 2. Chapter 711, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 10 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
- 11 and to read as follows:
- 12 "§711- Hazing in the first degree. (a) A person
- 13 commits the offense of hazing in the first degree if the person,
- 14 in the course of another person's initiation into or affiliation
- 15 with any organization or place of employment, intentionally or
- 16 knowingly engages in conduct that creates a substantial risk of
- 17 and results in physical injury to the other person or a third
- 18 person.
- (b) Hazing in the first degree is a misdemeanor."
- 20 SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
