A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MEDICAID.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that homelessness 2 continues to be one of the State's most significant and 3 challenging social problems. According to the 2016 Hawaii 4 statewide homeless point-in-time conducted in January 2016, 5 there are 7,921 homeless individuals in the State, an overall 6 increase of four per cent from 2015. Homeless persons face a 7 myriad of issues, including general health care, mental illness, 8 substance abuse, loss of employment and income, and a lack of 9 affordable housing.

10 The legislature further finds that many people who 11 experience homelessness have high health care needs and costs. 12 In fiscal years 2014 and 2015, The Queen's Medical Center 13 reported treating 3,441 patients who were homeless, including an 14 unsheltered patient who reportedly received treatment 12,271 15 times over two years, which cost The Queen's Medical Center more 16 than \$5,000,000 per year. For many of these individuals with 17 complex health conditions, housing instability can be a 18 significant barrier to regular health care access, which results 2017-1279 SB7 SD1 SMA.doc 1 Page 2

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1 in excessive use of expensive emergency department, inpatient 2 treatment, and crisis services. By recognizing the importance 3 of housing stability within the practice of health care for 4 homeless individuals, and exploring creative and innovative 5 solutions to address homeless individuals' health care needs 6 through housing stability from traditional and non-traditional 7 resources, the State may be able to recover the costs that 8 homeless individuals incur over their lifetime.

9 The legislature recognizes that the department of human 10 services and the department of health have piloted efforts to 11 target supportive housing services for a small cohort of 12 chronically homeless individuals through the Hawaii pathways 13 project. The Hawaii pathways project has demonstrated early 14 success in meeting the housing and health care needs of 15 chronically homeless individuals, and the department of human 16 services is working to expand supportive housing services 17 through an amendment of the state 1115 medicaid waiver.

18 The purpose of this Act is to support current efforts being 19 made by the department of human services and to require the 20 department to report to the legislature in regard to its

Description:

Requires the department of human services, in collaboration with the department of health, to review the progress of the Hawaii pathways project pilot and continue to pursue efforts to utilize medicaid to provide supportive housing services for chronically homeless individuals. Provides considerations for the department in planning for the expansion of supportive housing services provided through medicaid managed care plans. Requires the department to report to the legislature. Effective 7/1/2050. (SD1)
