A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO MEDICAID.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that homelessness
- 2 continues to be one of the State's most significant and
- 3 challenging social problems. According to the 2016 Hawaii
- 4 statewide homeless point-in-time conducted in January 2016,
- 5 there are 7,921 homeless individuals in the State, an overall
- 6 increase of four per cent from 2015. Homeless persons face a
- 7 myriad of issues, including general health care, mental illness,
- 8 substance abuse, loss of employment and income, and a lack of
- 9 affordable housing.
- 10 The legislature further finds that many people who
- 11 experience homelessness have high health care needs and costs.
- 12 In fiscal years 2014 and 2015, The Queen's Medical Center
- 13 reported treating 3,441 patients who were homeless, including an
- 14 unsheltered patient who reportedly received treatment 12,271
- 15 times over two years, which cost The Queen's Medical Center more
- 16 than \$5,000,000 per year. For many of these individuals with
- 17 complex health conditions, housing instability can be a

- 1 significant barrier to regular health care access, which results
- 2 in excessive use of expensive emergency department, inpatient
- 3 treatment, and crisis services. By recognizing the importance
- 4 of housing stability within the practice of health care for
- 5 homeless individuals, and exploring creative and innovative
- 6 solutions to address homeless individuals' health care needs
- 7 through housing stability from traditional and non-traditional
- 8 resources, the State may be able to recover the costs that
- 9 homeless individuals incur over their lifetime.
- 10 The legislature recognizes that the department of human
- 11 services and the department of health have piloted efforts to
- 12 target supportive housing services for a small cohort of
- 13 chronically homeless individuals through the Hawaii pathways
- 14 project. The Hawaii pathways project has demonstrated early
- 15 success in meeting the housing and health care needs of
- 16 chronically homeless individuals, and the department of human
- 17 services is working to expand supportive housing services
- 18 through an amendment of the state 1115 medicaid waiver.
- 19 The purpose of this Act is to support current efforts being
- 20 made by the department of human services and to require the
- 21 department to report to the legislature in regard to its

1 progress in expanding supportive housing services for a broader 2 population of chronically homeless individuals. 3 (a) The department of human services, in SECTION 2. 4 collaboration with the department of health, shall review the progress of the Hawaii pathways project pilot and continue to 5 6 pursue efforts to utilize medicaid to provide supportive housing 7 services for chronically homeless individuals. 8 In planning for the expansion of supportive housing 9 services provided through medicaid managed care plans, the department of human services shall consider the following: 10 Benefit eligibility, including criteria related to: 11 (1·) 12 (A) Health conditions; 13 (B) Housing status; and 14 (C) Current or potential system costs; 15 (2) Supportive housing services, including but not limited 16 to: 17 (A) Outreach and engagement; (B) Housing search assistance; 18 19 (C) Tenancy rights and responsibilities education; 20 Eviction prevention; (D) 21 (E) Service plan development;

- 2 report shall include:
- 3 (1) The status of the proposed amendment to expand the
- 4 state 1115 medicaid waiver;
- 5 (2) A description of supportive housing services to be
- 6 provided to the chronically homeless population; and
- 7 (3) Proposed eligibility criteria to qualify for
- 8 supportive housing services.
- 9 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 10 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 11 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 for the
- 12 purposes of this Act; provided that no funds appropriated under
- 13 this Act shall be expended unless matched dollar-for-dollar with
- 14 federal funds.
- 15 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 16 human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 17 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.

Report Title:

Supportive Housing Services; Medicaid; Homelessness; Department of Human Services; Department of Health; Appropriation

Description:

Requires the department of human services, in collaboration with the department of health, to review the progress of the Hawaii pathways project pilot and continue to pursue efforts to utilize medicaid to provide supportive housing services for chronically homeless individuals. Provides considerations for the department in planning for the expansion of supportive housing services provided through medicaid managed care plans. Requires the department to report to the legislature. Makes an appropriation. Effective 7/1/2050. (SD2)

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
