A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HIGHER EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaiian is an
 official language of the State, and the legislature has a unique
 responsibility to assure that opportunities are available to use
 and study the Hawaiian language. Over the past three decades,
 the legislature has carried out this responsibility through
 forming the basis of the current system of preschool through
 doctoral level education in Hawaiian.

Leadership from the legislature began in 1986 with removal 8 of a barrier to use Hawaiian as a medium of education. Shortly 9 thereafter, the legislature mandated the creation of a Hawaiian 10 language center to produce Hawaiian medium educational materials 11 12 and teacher support and a bachelor's degree administered through Then, in 1997, the legislature required that a 13 Hawaiian. Hawaiian language college be built that include additional 14 degrees related to Hawaiian. Before the legislature took 15 16 action, less than fifty children in the State were proficient in Today, U.S. Census data indicates Hawaiian is the 17 Hawaiian.



largest non-English language spoken in Hawaii among children
 ages five to seventeen, many of whom include over three thousand
 students from preschool through twelfth grade that are enrolled
 in schools that predominantly teach Hawaiian language and
 culture.

6 The legislature finds that S.R. No. 97, S.D. 1, regular session 2015 initiated the creation of a working group to 7 consider restructuring the Hawaiian language college to best 8 9 serve the needs of the State, and to examine the expansion of 10 the Hawaiian language instruction throughout the University of Hawaii system and the role of the Hawaiian language college in 11 such systemwide expansion. One of the issues presented to the 12 working group was that the existing structure of the University 13 14 of Hawaii system, which mirrors the structure of English language medium sized institutions of higher education, is not 15 optimal for a state with two official languages. The working 16 group submitted a report with recommendations to the 17 legislature, including the creation of an indigenous university 18 college model to assist with streamlining and maximizing the use 19 of scarce financial, human, and time resources. 20

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1 The legislature recognizes that 2017 represents the 2 twentieth anniversary of its passage of legislation mandating 3 the establishment of the Hawaiian language college, which 4 provided key support for Hawaiian language medium education. 5 The recently constructed building of the Hawaiian language 6 college provides an opportunity for the college to expand its 7 services and reach, and to establish itself as an international 8 leader and innovator in indigenous language medium education. 9 The legislature also recognizes, however, that in order to 10 continue addressing the challenges of revitalizing the Hawaiian language and expanding its reach, the Hawaiian language college 11 must be granted greater governing autonomy. 12

13 The purpose of this Act is to create the Hawaiian language 14 university college and transfer the University of Hawaii at Hilo 15 Hawaiian language college's rights, duties, powers, and 16 functions to the Hawaiian language university while maintaining 17 some shared functions between the two entities, thus 18 establishing an indigenous university college model for Ka Haka 19 'Ula o Ke'elikōlani.

20 SECTION 2. Chapter 304A, part IV, subpart C, Hawaii
21 Revised Statutes, is amended to read as follows:



1	"C. Hawaiian Language <u>University</u> College
2	[+]§304A-1301[]] Hawaiian language <u>university</u> college;
3	establishment. (a) There shall be a Hawaiian language
4	university college [at] that shall be an autonomous entity
5	within the University of Hawaii system; provided that it shall
6	share courses, facilities, students, administrators, faculty,
7	and other resources with the University of Hawaii at Hilo[. The
8	college shall provide a Hawaiian liberal education program
9	providing education primarily through the Hawaiian language.] to
10	establish a distinctively indigenous university college model.
11	(b) The Hawaiian language university college shall be
12	internally administered primarily through the Hawaiian language,
13	operate year round, and offer and administer a variety of
14	programs and qualifications. The programs of the university
15	college shall be offered primarily through the Hawaiian language
16	and may be offered worldwide and on through electronic means.
17	[+]§304A-1302[+] Functions. In addition to providing a
18	quality education primarily through the medium of the Hawaiian
19	language, the Hawaiian language <u>university</u> college shall:
20	(1) Provide an indigenous and minority language outreach
21	program to involve indigenous and minority language



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1		scholars and to maintain and develop the program's
2		Polynesian language database;
3	(2)	Provide a Hawaiian medium teacher training program
4		incorporating Nawahiokalani'opu'u school and other
5		schools, as appropriate, as laboratory schools; [and]
6	(3)	Maintain a Hawaiian language support center with
7		educational specialists in the areas of research,
8		curriculum development, assessment development and
9		implementation, dictionary and other reference
10		material development, language development, archival
11		work, and educational technology $[-,]_{\underline{i}}$
12	(4)	Provide a specially facilitated general education,
13	-	dual enrollment, and shared courses and programs
14		pathways through the medium of Hawaiian language to
15		serve students on state high school and college
16		campuses, using technology as appropriate;
17	(5)	Develop, pilot, and disseminate other distinctive
18		pathways, procedures, and rules that provide for the
19		support and use of the Hawaiian language and other
20		endangered languages, including use of such language
21		in government functions; and



1	(6) Have the authority to develop agreements of
2	cooperation and reciprocity with other educational
3	entities, including agreements with other University
4	of Hawaii campuses, to meet the requirements of
5	section 304A-1301."
6	SECTION 3. All rights, powers, functions, and duties of
7	the Hawaiian language college at the University of Hawaii at
8	Hilo are transferred to the Hawaiian language university college
9	established by section 2 of this Act.
10	All employees who occupy civil service positions and whose
11	functions are transferred to the Hawaiian language university
12	college by this Act shall retain their civil service status,
13	whether permanent or temporary. Employees shall be transferred
14	without loss of salary, seniority except as prescribed by
15	applicable collective bargaining agreements, retention points,
16	prior service credit, vacation and sick leave credits previously
17	earned, and other rights, benefits, and privileges, in
18	accordance with state personnel laws and this Act; provided that
19	the employees possess the minimum qualifications and public
20	employment requirements for the class or position to which they
21	are transferred or appointed; provided further that subsequent



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changes in status may be made pursuant to applicable civil
 service and compensation laws.

Any employee who, prior to this Act, was exempt from civil 3 4 service and is transferred as a consequence of this Act may retain the employee's exempt status, but shall not be appointed 5 to a civil service position as a consequence of this Act. Any 6 7 exempt employee who is transferred by this Act shall not suffer any loss of prior service credit, vacation or sick leave credits 8 previously earned, or other employee benefits or privileges as a 9 consequence of this Act; provided that the employees possess 10 11 legal and public employment requirements for the position to which transferred or appointed; provided further that subsequent 12 changes in status may be made pursuant to applicable employment 13 and compensation laws. The president of the faculty senate of 14 15 the Hawaiian language university college may prescribe the duties and qualifications of these employees and fix their 16 salaries without regard to chapter 76, Hawaii Revised Statutes. 17 18 SECTION 4. The Hawaiian language university college established pursuant to section 2 of this Act shall be 19 20 considered the same entity as the Hawaiian language college of 21 the University of Hawaii at Hilo for the purposes of receiving



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any grants, awards, or funding that has been awarded to the
 Hawaiian language college of the University of Hawaii at Hilo
 prior to the effective date of this Act.

SECTION 5. By the end of the 2017-2018 academic year, the 4 5 faculty senate of the Hawaiian language university college established pursuant to section 2 of this Act and the chancellor 6 7 of the University of Hawaii at Hilo shall enter into a 8 memorandum of agreement determining the details of the shared 9 operations and administration between the Hawaiian language 10 university college and the University of Hawaii at Hilo. The memorandum of agreement may be amended as agreed upon by the 11 12 faculty senate of the Hawaiian language university college and the chancellor of the University of Hawaii at Hilo. 13

14 Upon execution of the memorandum of agreement, the Hawaiian 15 language university college shall give priority attention to 16 programs and qualifications that directly serve and provide 17 resources to preschool through high school students being 18 educated through Hawaiian, as well as their parents and other 19 adults affiliated with schooling through Hawaiian.

20 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed21 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.



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SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

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Report Title:

Hawaiian Language College; University of Hawaii at Hilo; Hawaiian Language University College

Description:

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Establishes the Hawaiian language university college as an autonomous entity within the University of Hawaii system to be located at the University of Hawaii at Hilo. Implements an indigenous university college model by transferring the University of Hawaii at Hilo Hawaiian language college's rights, duties, powers, and functions to the Hawaiian language university college. Mandates the Hawaiian language university college and University of Hawaii at Hilo to enter into a memorandum of agreement by the end of the 2017-2018 academic year to establish shared operations and administration.

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
