# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HIGHER EDUCATION.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaiian is an
2	official language of the State, and the legislature has a unique
3	responsibility to assure that opportunities are available to use
4	and study the Hawaiian language. Over the past three decades,

- ${f 5}$  the legislature has carried out this responsibility by forming
- 6 the basis of the State's Hawaiian language medium pathway
- 7 parallel to the long standing English medium pathway of
- 8 preschool through doctoral level education.
- 9 These legislative efforts began in 1986 with removal of a
- 10 barrier to use Hawaiian as the medium of education. Shortly
- 11 thereafter in 1989, the legislature mandated the creation of a
- 12 Hawaiian language center at the University of Hawaii at Hilo, in
- 13 association with its existing Hawaiian language medium
- 14 bachelor's degree, to produce Hawaiian language medium
- 15 educational materials and teacher support. In 1997, the
- 16 legislature required that a Hawaiian language college be
- 17 established at the University of Hawaii at Hilo, building on the
- 18 existing degree and Hawaiian language center, to expand the 2017-1265 SB848 SD1 SMA.doc



- 1 University of Hawaii at Hilo's Hawaiian language medium
- 2 programming, including teacher education, preschool through
- 3 twelfth grade laboratory school programming, graduate education,
- 4 and indigenous language outreach. Before the legislature took
- 5 action, less than fifty children in the State were proficient in
- 6 Hawaiian. Today, U.S. Census data indicates Hawaiian is the
- 7 largest non-English language spoken in Hawaii among children
- 8 ages five to seventeen. Many of these children are part of the
- 9 preschool through twelfth grade Hawaiian medium programs
- 10 currently educating over three thousand students annually.
- 11 The legislature finds that in response to S.R. No. 97,
- 12 S.D. 1, regular session 2015, the Office of the President of the
- 13 Hawaiian language college, and a working group contributed to a
- 14 report that considered the restructuring of the Hawaiian
- 15 language college and examined the expansion of Hawaiian language
- 16 instruction throughout the University of Hawaii system. One of
- 17 the issues presented to the working group was that the existing
- 18 structure of the University of Hawaii system is not optimal for
- 19 a state whose official languages are English and Hawaiian. The
- 20 report provided to the legislature, and made available to the
- 21 public, delves into the data and trends in the teaching of the

- 1 Hawaiian language and through the offering and use of Hawaiian
- 2 language in the University of Hawaii system and beyond. The
- 3 report also references some of the challenges and barriers to
- 4 expanding these efforts as well as potential solutions to these
- 5 challenges. A noteworthy reference in the report is the
- 6 barriers the Hawaiian language college has encountered in
- 7 instituting general education courses through the medium of
- 8 Hawaiian. The report also highlights the underlying
- 9 contradictions throughout the University of Hawaii system in
- 10 relation to advancing strategic directions toward a Hawaiian
- 11 language planning vision. Relative to these barriers, the
- 12 report also acknowledges international tertiary education models
- 13 that have successfully overcome similar challenges.
- 14 The legislature recognizes that 2017 represents the
- 15 twentieth anniversary of its passage of legislation establishing
- 16 the Hawaiian language college. Since its inception, the
- 17 Hawaiian language college has not only provided key support for
- 18 Hawaiian language medium education throughout the State but has
- 19 also become a national resource for Native American language
- 20 revitalization and has initiated international collaborations in
- 21 pursuit of global indigenous language excellence. The continued

- 1 need for, and interest in, the programs and support provided by
- 2 the Hawaiian language college is evidenced in part by the
- 3 continued growth in Hawaiian language course enrollment at the
- 4 college, despite decreasing overall enrollment numbers for the
- 5 University of Hawaii system. The driving focus fueling the
- 6 Hawaiian language college's commitment to provide these much-
- 7 needed programs that are impacting indigenous language
- 8 initiatives here and abroad is the desire to establish a high-
- 9 functioning Hawaiian medium pathway of education alongside the
- 10 State's current, dominant, English medium pathway. In
- 11 recognition of thirty years of legislative policy supporting the
- 12 revitalization of Hawaiian language as well as the Hawaiian
- 13 language college's noted progress in creating new and
- 14 strengthened pathways to further the normalization of this
- 15 official language of the State, the legislature seeks to support
- 16 expanded innovative approaches to the development of a highly-
- 17 functioning Hawaiian medium pathway of education.
- 18 Accordingly, the purpose of this Act is to:
- 19 (1) Expand the Hawaiian language college's functions;

1	(2)	Establish a five-year pilot project in pursuit of		
2		innovative strategies and approaches for the		
3		development of a Hawaiian medium pathway; and		
4	(3)	Provide for an implementation plan to expand Hawaiian		
5		language instruction throughout the University of		
6		Hawaii system as recommended by the working group		
7		created by S.R. No. 97, S.D. 1, regular session 2015.		
8	SECT	ION 2. Section 304A-1301, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is		
9	amended to read as follows:			
10	"[+]	§304A-1301[+] Hawaiian language college;		
11	establish	ment. (a) There shall be a Hawaiian language college		
12	at the Un	iversity of Hawaii at Hilo. The college shall provide		
13	a Hawaiia	n liberal education program providing education		
14	primarily	through the Hawaiian language.		
15	(b)	The Hawaiian language college shall be internally		
16	administe	red primarily through the Hawaiian language, operate		
17	year roun	d, and offer and administer a variety of programs and		
18	qualifica	tions. The programs of the college shall be offered		
19	primarily	through the Hawaiian language and may be offered		
20	worldwide	and through electronic means."		

1	SECT.	ION 3. Section 304A-1302, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended to	o read as follows:
3	"[+];	§304A-1302[] Functions. In addition to providing a
4	quality e	ducation primarily through the medium of the Hawaiian
5	language,	the Hawaiian language college shall:
6	(1)	Provide an indigenous and minority language outreach
7		program to involve indigenous and minority language
8		scholars and to maintain and develop the program's
9		Polynesian language database;
10	(2)	Provide a Hawaiian medium teacher training program
11		incorporating Nawahiokalani'opu'u school and other
12		schools, as appropriate, as laboratory schools; [and]
13	(3)	Maintain a Hawaiian language support center with
14		educational specialists in the areas of research,
15		curriculum development, assessment development,
16		reference materials development including
17		dictionaries, language development, archival work, and
18		educational technology[-];
19	(4)	Provide a specially facilitated general education,
20		dual enrollment, liberal studies, and shared courses
21		and programs pathways through the medium of Hawaiian

1		language to serve students, using technology as	
2		appropriate;	
3	(5)	Develop, pilot, and disseminate other distinctive	
4		pathways, procedures, and rules that provide for the	
5		support and use of the Hawaiian language and other	
6		endangered languages, including use of such language	
7		in government functions;	
8	(6)	Provide for national Native American language medium	
9		education research and support in partnership with the	
10		national coalition of Native American language schools	
11		and programs, and other entities as appropriate; and	
12	<u>(7)</u>	Enter into agreements of cooperation and reciprocity	
13		with other entities to meet the requirements of this	
14		section and section 304A-1301."	
15	SECT	ION 4. The Hawaiian language college at the University	
16	of Hawaii	at Hilo shall serve as an educational incubator for	
17	the development of new ideas, practices, and processes relative		
18	to Hawaiian language medium education and other indigenous and		
19	minority languages by engaging in a five-year pilot project.		
20	This pilo	t project shall implement innovative strategies and	
21	approache	s for the development and approval of Hawaiian language	

- 1 medium general education programs and coursework, building on
- 2 international models that address indigenous and minority
- 3 official languages as the operational medium of education. The
- 4 pilot project shall serve as a possible model for replication
- 5 for other purposes in Hawaii. The pilot project shall operate
- 6 under the jurisdiction of the president of the University of
- 7 Hawaii, assisted by the chancellor of the University of Hawaii
- 8 at Hilo, while using shared resources and features of the
- 9 University of Hawaii at Hilo as the President deems appropriate.
- 10 SECTION 5. The director of the Hawaiian language college
- 11 at the University of Hawaii at Hilo shall join with the
- 12 president of the University of Hawaii and the working group
- 13 created by S.R. No. 97, S.D. 1, regular session 2015, with
- 14 additional members as deemed appropriate by the president of the
- 15 University of Hawaii, to develop an implementation plan to
- 16 address the system wide Hawaiian language goals indicated in the
- 17 report generated by the working group created by S.R. No. 97,
- 18 S.D. 1, regular session 2015. Once completed, the
- 19 implementation plan shall be submitted to the legislature.
- 20 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general
- 21 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much

- 1 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the
- 2 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 3 2018-2019 for the current operations of the Hawaiian language
- 4 college at the University of Hawaii at Hilo.
- 5 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the University
- 6 of Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.
- 7 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general
- 8 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 9 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the
- 10 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 11 2018-2019 for the Hawaiian language medium general education
- 12 coursework pilot project established pursuant to section 4 of
- 13 this Act.
- 14 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the University
- 15 of Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.
- 16 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general
- 17 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much
- 18 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2017-2018 and the
- 19 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 20 2018-2019 for development of an implementation plan for Hawaiian

- 1 language instruction throughout the University of Hawaii system
- 2 pursuant to section 5 of this Act.
- 3 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the University
- 4 of Hawaii for the purposes of this Act.
- 5 SECTION 9. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 6 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 7 SECTION 10. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2017.
