SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A SEXUAL ABUSE PREVENTION EDUCATION TASK FORCE.

WHEREAS, sexual abuse remains a serious and ongoing threat to the safety, health, and well-being of children and young people in the State of Hawaii; and

WHEREAS, although programs and Department of Education-approved curricula currently exist in the State of Hawaii to train school teachers and staff and to provide sexual abuse prevention education to students, implementation is not consistent system wide and resources for the provision of training and education is limited; and

WHEREAS, some students in Hawaii do not receive regular, consistent child abuse prevention education, and some parents are not informed about child sexual abuse topics; and

WHEREAS, many school teachers and staff do not receive sufficient training on talking to students about child sexual abuse prevention or on the effects of child sexual abuse on children, handling sexual abuse disclosures, and mandated reporting; and

WHEREAS, laws requiring that public school systems implement a program of regular, consistent sexual abuse prevention education for students, teacher and staff training, and parental involvement have passed in twenty-six other states and the territory of Guam, have been introduced in the legislatures of sixteen other states, and represent a national trend in safety, health, and well-being education; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-ninth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2017, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of

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(6) Resources needed to implement a system wide program for child sexual abuse prevention education; and

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(7) Updates to law or policy that would assist in the implementation of a statewide program for child sexual abuse prevention education; and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force, with the assistance of the Department of Education, is requested to submit a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2018, and a follow-up report, including any additional proposed legislation, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2019; and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force be dissolved on June 30, 2019; and

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chair of the Board of Education, Superintendent of Education, Director of Health, Director of Human Services, Attorney General, Director of the Executive Office on Early Learning, Executive Director of the Hawaii Youth Services Network, Executive Director of the Hawaii Children's Action Network, Executive Director of the Sex Abuse Treatment Center, Senate President, Speaker of the House of Representatives, and Executive Director of the State Public Charter School Commission.

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
