RELATING TO HOMELESSNESS.

POSITION: The Governor's Coordinator on Homelessness appreciates the intent of this measure, as it seeks to pilot new strategies to address the complex issue of homelessness, but expresses concern regarding the potential adverse impact on priorities identified in the Executive Budget. In addition, while Section 2 of the bill requires the Coordinator to develop and administer the work-for-a-day pilot program, the Coordinator does not currently have the staff or capacity to directly administer contracts for services. If this measure proceeds further, the Coordinator suggests the measure be amended to place responsibility within a more appropriate agency in the Executive Branch that could oversee the proposed services.

PURPOSE: The purpose of the bill is to establish a three-year Work-for-a-Day Pilot Program that provides homeless individuals with work opportunities and connects them with service providers. The bill requires the Governor's Coordinator on Homelessness, or the Coordinator's designee, to develop and administer a pilot program. The bill also appropriates an unspecified amount of general funds to the Department of Human Services (DHS) to implement the pilot program.

While the role of the Coordinator is to establish and coordinate State policy to address homelessness, the Coordinator is not responsible for the direct administration and implementation of homeless programs, including the direct contracting of services. The implementation and execution of programs is generally handled by programs within Executive Branch agencies that have the capacity to procure and oversee direct program development.

The Coordinator notes that the Hawaii Community Development Authority (HCDA) currently funds a job training program that employs residents of the Next Step homeless shelter for janitorial and trash removal services in Kakaako Makai. The existing HCDA program is similar to the pilot program described in this bill and provides homeless persons with direct employment, on-the-job training, and a connection to shelter and other appropriate homeless services. In addition to the HCDA program, some homeless service providers offer similar employment training programs that are intended to develop job skills and promote civic responsibility.

DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS) appreciates the intent of this bill as it offers a different strategy that aligns with the State's objectives related to homelessness. However, DHS has concerns about the fiscal implications and the impact it may have on the priorities established in the Governor's Executive budget.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: The purpose of the bill is to assist homeless individuals in finding jobs by requiring the Governor's Coordinator on Homelessness to establish a pilot program connecting homeless individuals who are willing to work with job opportunities.

There are a number of existing programs that provide job training and opportunities available to homeless clients with children. Programs such as SEE Hawaii Work, (<u>http://humanservices.hawaii.gov/see/</u>), assist families with children who receive Temporary Assistance For Needy Families (TAONF)/Temporary Assistance for Other Needy Families (TAONF) financial benefits, and the Employment and Training Program provides additional services for TANF/TAONF recipients who also receive Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits.

Programs such as the City and County of Honolulu's rent to work program are targeted specifically for homeless persons. These programs support homeless households in developing

essential job skills, as well as assisting these households to increase their income through employment opportunities.

Dear Chair Johanson, Vice Chair Holt, and Members of the Committee on Labor & Public Employment:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support of HB 1281 HD 1, which appropriates funds for a three-year Work-for-a-Day Pilot Program that provides homeless individuals with work opportunities and connects them with service providers.

This program is modeled after a homeless work program first implemented in Albuquerque, New Mexico, to give people experiencing homelessness a chance to earn money by helping clean up the city. Since the inception of the Albuquerque program in 2015, 1,175 day jobs have been given to 401 unduplicated persons, cleaning 292 city blocks and removing 105,101 pounds of litter. In addition, the program has connected 190+ people various employment opportunities through Albuquerque's employment services office. Also, the program has connected 136+ people with behavioral health and substance abuse services, and has placed 20 people into permanent supportive housing.

In light of the success of the program, the City of Albuquerque has increased the funds appropriated to the program in order to increase its impact in combatting homelessness. Similar programs have also been started in Chicago, Tucson, and Anchorage. HB 1281 would appropriate \$300,000 for fiscal year 2017-18 to pilot a similar program in Hawai'i. Given our high homelessness rate—the nation's highest—the program would offer a necessary and effective tool in our arsenal for attacking a homelessness problem we are struggling to gain ground on.

This program is an effective measure towards ending homelessness by reducing the stigma around homelessness, and giving those experiencing homelessness an opportunity to earn cash and access services that can connect them with housing, treatment, and other employment opportunities. Adopting the program in Hawai'i has the potential to be a relatively inexpensive, but effective step towards helping those on the margins onto their feet and bringing them back into the fold.

Thank you very much for hearing and considering this important bill to help end homelessness.
