Dear Chair Takumi and Vice Chair Har, and Committee Members:

The Hawaii Department of Education (Department) supports the intent of H.B. 1379, which authorizes teachers to voluntarily promote community-sponsored after-school programs. For students and parents who may not be aware of after-school offerings provided, and for teachers who may wish to see students participating in these activities for their learning and growth, this bill would allow for Department staff to help drive awareness and excitement for after-school programs.

The Department recommends amendments to clarify that H.B. 1379 is not intended to put teachers and staff in a position of potentially violating the State Ethics Code and Board of Education (BOE) Policy 303.12 on Commercialism. Utilizing State resources to promote private initiatives (these may be initiatives by organizations who will generate for-profit revenues from student participation in after-school programs); and potentially favoring certain organizations or events over others who are not granted the same permission could be problematic. In addition, the BOE Policy 303.12 on Commercialism does not allow commercial advertising of a corporate or private business without the establishment of a sponsorship agreement. Finally, the implementation of this legislation should ensure there are no expectations of responsibility for distribution placed on principals.

We respectfully suggest the following amendments:

- Page 1, line 13: change "any employee" to "An employee"
- Page 2, line 2: remove "and"
- Page 2, line 4: add "; and" after "employee"
- Page 2, line 5: insert "(3) Such promotion does not violate any board policy or provision of chapter 84 relating to the State code of ethics."

Chair Takumi and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii State Teachers Association **<u>supports HB 1379</u>**, relating to after-school programs.

Teachers often provide information to students about community organizations and events, especially those that impact children. For example, teachers may pass along information related to the American Youth Soccer Organization or Little League Baseball and Softball.

Unfortunately, at some schools, teachers have been prohibited from passing along information about after-school programs because of complaints that such programs can be affiliated with religious organization. While we do not believe that it is appropriate for religious groups to use schools to proselytize or, worse, spread discriminatory theological messages, we note that this bill does not compel teachers to pass long information with which they disagree. Moreover, this measure places responsibility on principals to ensure that after-school information disseminated to students comports with the Department of Education's mission and Board of Education policies, which include an explicit ban on sponsorship of religious observances and activities (BOE Policy 900-3).

To make our schools the centers of our communities, the Hawaii State Teachers Association asks your committee to <u>**support**</u> this bill.
