House Bill No. 1381 - Relating to Elevator Mechanics

The Honorable Aaron Ling Johanson, Chair, Daniel Holt, Vice-Chair, and Esteemed Members of the House Committee On Labor and Public Employment

HB 1381 proposes to amend the current statutes that govern the licensing of elevator mechanics within the State of Hawaii. It has been numerous years since the statute has been updated and during this same period technology has advanced exponentially. In order for elevator mechanics to keep pace with this technology they must show and exhibit continued competence in their craft. Not only does this hone the skillset of the elevator mechanic, but it will necessitate the elevator mechanic to stay current with the latest codes and technologies.

The International Union of Elevator Constructors, Local 126, represents the men and women installing, repairing, and maintaining all elevators, escalators, and other vertical transportation in the State of Hawaii. The Elevator Constructor is a highly skilled craft with some of the most stringent and extensive education within the elevator industry and the construction industry as a whole. However, the current State of Hawaii licensing requirements do not coincide with the standards and level of technology that are currently being introduced and installed.

The proposed amendments to Chapter 448H, Hawaii Revised Statutes, are meant to strengthen the licensing law and discourage unlicensed activity by adding continued competency requirements, increasing and defining the qualifications to become licensed, registering apprentices (which we are currently working on with the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations), adding a fee to register as an apprentice and a yearly fee to maintain the apprentice's registration, clarifying an elevator mechanic's scope of work, and better defining the powers and duties of the elevator mechanic's licensing board.

Some of the mechanisms are already in place. For instance, apprenticeship registration is currently done through the Professional and Vocational Licensing Division of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs and through the Workforce Development Division of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations.

Licensing is in place for the safety and protection of the consumer. Strengthening the elevator mechanic's licensing laws can only serve to benefit our industry as a whole by raising the competency of elevator mechanics which in turn will provide a better and safer product to the riding public. When it comes to safety there is no compromise and for these reasons the International Union of Elevator Constructors, Local 126, is in **strong support** of HB 1381.

Re: H.B. No. 1381 Relating to Elevator Mechanics

I. OVERVIEW OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

This bill adds four new sections [Examination; Apprentice Registration; License Renewals and Scope of Work for Elevator Mechanics] to chapter 448H, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), which will result in concurrent registration of elevator mechanic apprentices with the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA) and DLIR's Registered Apprenticeship program.

The Department <u>supports</u> the intent of the bill but has concerns about the language and potential issues affecting implementation.

II. CURRENT LAW

The current law defines an apprentice elevator mechanic as any person who is in training to acquire the skill to become an elevator mechanic and who is required to work for at least four years under the supervision of an elevator mechanic duly licensed under section 448H-6, HRS. The law does not require concurrent registration of the apprentice with DCCA and DLIR's Registered Apprenticeship Program, which has led to discrepancies for some individuals in either qualifying for licensure or completing their apprenticeship program.

III. COMMENTS ON THE HOUSE BILL

This measure would help ensure consistency between DCCA licensing requirements and DLIR's Registered Apprenticeship Program and would facilitate attainment of DCCA licensing upon an individual's completion of their Registered Apprenticeship Program.

DLIR <u>supports</u> the intent of this bill and is willing to work with the International Union of Elevator Constructors, Local 126 staff and DCCA on the mechanics and language of the bill to address any issues and concerns of the parties involved if the bill continues to move through the legislative process.
