TESTIMONY TO THE SENATE COMMITTEES ON JUDICIARY AND LABOR, AND WAYS AND MEANS

House Bill 1401, HD1 - Relating to Elections

The Disability and Communication Access Board (DCAB) supports on House Bill 1401, HD1 Relating to Elections which enacts voting by for all elections statewide commencing in 2020; repeals and amends provisions relating to polling places, including absentee polling places; establishes voter service centers to accommodate personal delivery of ballots; and appropriates funds. Our comments relate to voters with disabilities, and how to make appropriate references to said voters throughout the bill. There have been several lawsuits on the Mainland related to voting being a fundamental right of individuals with disabilities, and inherent in that right is the ability to cast a ballot independently and privately.

Our concerns with the bill are as follows on:

- 1. Page 2, line 7, the phrase "voter with special needs" should be changed to read "voters with disabilities;"
- Page 7, lines 8–14 in referencing that a ballot "be forwarded by electronic transmission," there
 are final rules promulgated in 2017 related to Section 508 of the Rehabilitation Act that requires
 electronic transmissions to be accessible to individuals with disabilities. Therefore, any ballot
 transmitted electronically must comply with Section 508 requirements;
- 3. Page 12, lines 16–19 the definition for "Electronic transmission" should include that the transmission will comply with Section 508;
- Page 13, lines 10–13 should include reference to the Americans with Disabilities Act with an indication that the polling site and its elements must be physically accessible to all voters, including people with disabilities;
- 5. Page 34, lines 3–5 reword to read "Any person designated to assist a voter with a disability, while the person is assisting the voter;" and
- 6. Page 36, lines 15-18 should also include a reference to a voter with a disability requesting assistance. A voter may not need a person's help, but may request an assistive device. That voter should be directed to the Voter Assistance Official who can offer a device such as a magnifier, pen grip or a signature guide.

We defer to the Office of Elections regarding the appropriation necessary to implement this measure.
