1 Fiscal Implications: None

Department Testimony: This bill seeks to expand the scope of services of Hawaii pharmacists 2 permitting them to furnish specific medications and services that support better public health 3 outcomes. These may be furnished in accordance with written policies, procedures, protocols or 4 standing orders developed collaboratively with health professionals. The furnishing pharmacists 5 6 must have received appropriate training required by these policies, procedures, protocols or standing orders and approved by bodies or agencies listed in the bill. The Department notes the 7 8 public health value of this bill to improve immunizations, smoking cessation, access to naloxone and epi-pens, and family planning. We appreciate the intent of H.B. 1406 and are providing 9 comments and recommendations. 10

The Department is pleased to see reference to HRS section 461-11.4, which assures that
 for adolescents ages 14–17 years the medical home needs to be involved in vaccine
 administration (specifically ordering/prescription and then reporting back).

1	2)	The new wording (c[ii]) seems to only allow influenza vaccination for adolescents; our
2		preference would be to use the same wording as the previous section, e(ii), which allows
3		for administration of any of the recommended adolescent vaccines.
4	3)	We recommend adding a requirement to document <i>adult</i> vaccinations in the department's
5		immunization registry with a record to be provided to the vaccinated individual, similar
6		to what is in HRS section 461-11.4 pertaining to this.
7	4)	We have concerns about pharmacists ordering and performing an undefined range of
8		laboratory tests independent of the patient's primary care provider or health care delivery
9		team.
10	5)	We have concerns regarding pharmacists ordering travel medications independent of the
11		patient's primary care provider or health care delivery team. If these include
12		medications, such as antibiotics and anti-malarial drugs, a medical history is needed and
13		possibly access to the patient's EHR to determine appropriate medications and dosage,
14		and to document medications prescribed.
15	6)	Remove "State or local health department programs" from the approval process for
16		pharmacist trainings.
17	7)	The policies, procedures, protocols and standing orders appear to be only for individual
18		pharmacists. Consideration should be given to the possibility of having them also with

Chair Belatti, Vice Chair Kobayashi, and members of the Committee:

My name is Carolyn Ma, and I am the Dean for the UH Hilo Daniel K. Inouye College of Pharmacy (DKICP). The college fully supports this bill that will expand certain areas of pharmacy practice for registered pharmacists.

Pharmacists are considered the drug therapy experts among health care professions. Training of pharmacists includes foundational sciences (2-4 years) with advanced professional years of study (4 years) that include extensive training in pharmacology, medicinal chemistry, disease pathophysiology and drug therapeutics. In relation to HB 1406, the DKICP curriculum certifies, via the American Pharmacists Association (APHA), training in immunization administration (first year) and smoking cessation (2nd year). Students are expected to apply these skills in their experiential rotation courses throughout the rest of their training and also in numerous community health screening events. Courses in toxicology, pain management, opioid abuse syndrome, contraception, reproductive pharmacology and women's health, and pediatrics are taught in the 3rd professional year. Education is provided throughout the four year professional curriculum on medication assessment and therapeutic recommendations via related laboratory tests and subjective/objective findings related to disease and drug therapy. A similar curriculum is presented in all U.S. accredited (ACPE) colleges of pharmacy.

Successful completion of the curriculum results in the terminal degree, the Doctor of Pharmacy (PharmD). Graduates are then eligible to sit for the national licensing exam (NABPLEX). Successful passing score of the NABPLEX, allows an individual to practice as a Registered Pharmacist (RPh) who is then regulated by the Dept. of Commerce and Consumer Affairs (DCCA) through a state Board of Pharmacy.

In addition, many pharmacy school graduates will continue on to post-graduate residency programs for further clinical training in general pharmacy practice as well as in specialty areas that include but are not limited to ambulatory care, community pharmacy, oncology, nutrition, nuclear medicine, psychiatry and mental health, and critical care medicine. Specialty practice pharmacists may also be board certified by the Board of Pharmacy Specialties, an autonomous division of the APHA. This extensive education fully supports the additions outlined in the bill in Chapter 461, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

Pharmacists are the most accessible community health care professionals and work with health care colleagues in a number of different practice areas such as in acute care hospitals, ambulatory care clinics and long term care facilities. Health care colleagues such as physicians, nurses, psychologists, naturopaths, dieticians, public health professionals rely on pharmacists as a vital source of drug therapy expertise and as partners in providing safe, effective and cost efficient drug therapy management for best practice patient care.

We submit this testimony on behalf of Walgreen Co. ("Walgreens"). Walgreens operates stores at more than 8,200 locations in all 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico. In Hawaii, Walgreens now has 20 stores on the islands of Oahu, Maui, and Hawaii.

Walgreens **strongly supports** H.B. 1406, which expands the definition of "practice of pharmacy" to include furnishing life-saving medications such as Naloxone and Epi-pens, furnishing hormonal contraception and smoking cessation therapies, administering immunizations for bacterial and viral infections like the flu, pneumonia and hepatitis A, and ordering and performing laboratory tests to determine appropriate medication uses and outcomes.

Walgreens believes that pharmacists should be permitted to practice at the top of their training. In Hawaii, registered pharmacists now undergo a six-year doctorate program that includes education assessment training and a one-year pharmacy internship. Pharmacists today routinely provide direct patient care based on scope of practice regulations, and deliver care beyond the traditional practice of dispensing prescription medications. In addition to dispensing medications, pharmacists now provide additional services such as immunizations, wellness screenings, routine laboratory tests, and routine drug therapy-related patient assessment procedures. Dear Chair Au Belatti, Vice Chair Kobayashi, and Members of the Committee:

The Hawaii Medical Service Association (HMSA) appreciates the opportunity to testify on HB 1406, amends the current definition of "practice of pharmacy." HMSA has serious concerns with this Bill, and we offer comments.

This Bill and HB 156, which also is on this morning's Committee agenda, deal with a pharmacist's scope of practice. These measures seek to increase the pharmacist's scope of practice to include services offered by healthcare providers and to allow pharmacists to be comparably reimbursed for those services.

HMSA recognizes clinical pharmacists deliver direct patient care and as such serve a valuable role in our healthcare system. With this responsibility comes the need for additional training such as accredited pharmacy residency programs. While HMSA supports the benefits that extended scope clinical pharmacists can bring to patient care, we remain concerned that the ability to ensure rigorous credentialing and verification of proper training in order to protect patient safety are not in this proposed statute, nor in HB 1406, nor in the current infrastructure of our regulatory bodies.

We recently met with pharmacists to better understand the scope of additional services they would like to assume. We remain committed to working with the pharmacist community to seek consensus as to how we can more fully engage pharmacists in our network of providers of healthcare services.

Having said that, we wish to bring to the attention of the Committee concerns we have specific to HB 1406:

• The amendment to the current definition of "practice of pharmacy" removes the requirement that certain medical interventions by pharmacist be performed "..in accordance with written policies, procedures, or protocols developed collaboratively by health professionals, including physicians and surgeons, pharmacists, and registered nurses...." This removes oversight by the healthcare facility, health care service, or pharmacy with which the pharmacist is associated.



- This bill makes pharmacists to be providers in and of themselves, instead of practitioners "in concurrence with a 'health care facility' and 'health care service' as defined in section 323D-2. Most existing relationships between HMSA and pharmacists is governed by contracts with the "pharmacy" rather than the individual pharmacist.
- If the pharmacist is to be considered a provider, the appropriate training and certification and/or licensing must be specified in statute.
- . HMSA is undergoing the transformation of our payment system to providers, moving away from the fee-for-service model. Reimbursement to pharmacists could fall outside the payment transformation model resulting in higher cost to our member.

Given these concerns, we suggest the Committee may wish to consider deferring this measure in lieu of a workgroup to include pharmacists, providers, and plans to more fully examine the issues related to expanding the pharmacist scope of practice.

Comments: I agree with modernizing the scope of the practice of pharmacy. Immunization has been a huge leap forward for both pharmacy and the public. This has been evidenced in the recent outbreak of Hepatitis A here in Hawaii. In addition, with President Obama signing CARA and Governor Ige signing the Naloxone bill to combat the opioid epidemic, the public needs the pharmacists to be able to furnish Naloxone without a prescription similar to getting a flu shot. Naloxone is a safe drug even if accidently injected in someone who may not overdosing on an opioid. Similarly, EpiPens are live saving injections where time is of the essence. A little known fact about Epipens is that they have a short shelf life, meaning they can expire before being used in an emergency. It would be highly unsafe for someone who has severe allergies to be carrying around an expired Epipen because their provider may not want to renew the prescription until they are seen.
