1 **Fiscal Implications:** None for Department of Health.

2 **Department Testimony:** The Department of Health supports HB1547, acknowledging the

3 benefits to public input that would be enabled through safe, stable, and secure internet-based

4 telecommunications access, but reserves comment on the appropriation.

5 The normalization of remote testimony technology in the Legislature is an important symbolic

6 and substantive step towards wider acceptance of *telehealth*, which relies on similar technology.

7 Telehealth is a strategic priority for the Department of Health that connects health providers with

8 patients, particularly in rural and underserved areas.

9 Most frequently, telehealth is accomplished over broadband internet networks through high

10 definition video on computers, smartphones, or dedicated medical carts and may involve remote

11 telemetry (blood pressure, heart rate, etc.). Paitent acceptance is growing, and often there are no

12 other choices except to delay treatment or fly patients inter-island. The Legislature has recently

13 endorsed telehealth through legislation requiring equivalent reimbursement for telehealth visits

14 and face-to-face provider visits and other reforms – see Act 226 Session Laws of Hawaii 2016,

and Act 159 Session Laws of Hawaii 2014.

Chair Kobayashi, Vice Chair Mizuno, and Members of the Committee:

I am Todd Nacapuy, State Chief Information Officer (CIO), testifying in **support** of House Bill No. 1547, Relating to Remote Testimony, which establishes a remote testimony task force to develop procedures to make available remote testimony technology throughout the State that enables the public to testify remotely via the Internet during legislative proceedings.

We look forward to collaborating with the Legislature to encourage active citizen participation in the government process by providing options to use current communication technologies.

For example, the State's Office 365 enterprise license agreement includes many tools and enhanced resources such as Skype for Business and Skype for Meeting Broadcast, which provides a high-quality video streaming solution that allows viewers to interact via built-in collaborative tools. Supporting up to 10,000 viewers at any one time, it is device agnostic, and participants can join from nearly anywhere on almost any device, as long as they have an Internet connection.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on this bill. The Office of Information Practices ("OIP") takes no position on the substance of this bill, which would establish a Remote Testimony Task Force to develop procedures to enable members of the public to testify to the Legislature via the internet. OIP is testifying to seek clarification of why the proposed task force is exempted (at bill page 2, lines 16-19) from the Sunshine Law and the rest of chapter 92, HRS, and from the Uniform Information Practices Act ("UIPA"), chapter 92F, HRS.

The exemption would mean that the proposed task force would have no obligation to allow the public to attend its meetings or to accept public testimony on the issues it is considering, and no obligation to respond to any record requests even with a denial. Further, since the exemption is to all of chapter 92, not just part I, the Sunshine Law, the task force would apparently be exempt from the provisions relating to boards' general powers, statewide copy charges, and other miscellaneous matters. It is not clear why this level of secrecy would be necessary for a group whose express purpose is to develop procedures to enable the public to testify remotely via the internet and thus increase public access to legislative proceedings, a topic likely to be of public interest and one on which public input would be valuable. **OIP respectfully suggests that this Committee consider whether the exemptions are appropriate and either delete them or explain in a** Committee report why they are necessary. **OIP** further suggests that if the exemptions are left in, they should be rephrased as follows: "The remote testimony task force shall be exempt from part I of chapter 92. Records of the remote testimony task force shall be exempt from public disclosure under chapter 92F."

H.B. 1547 - RELATING TO REMOTE TESTIMONY

The Hawaii Government Employees Association, AFSCME Local 152, AFL-CIO supports the purpose and intent of H.B. 1547 which establishes a task force to make remote testimony technology available for the public to testify during legislative proceedings.

Due to the constrictive and fast-paced legislative timetable, it is often a severe financial hardship for neighbor island residents to actively participate in our democratic process. For example, when the Legislature was considering the privatization of the Maui Region of the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation, employees had to take time off of work, purchase airline tickets – often with only 48-hours notice, and arrange ground transportation to attend a hearing. Many of our members chose to expend their valuable time and money to share their expertise and ensure their voices were heard, but we firmly believe many more would have taken advantage of remote testimony technology. We are confident that this same situation is all too familiar for too many neighbor island residents, regardless of the issue at hand. The creation of this task force is the first step toward ensuring access no matter where a Hawaii resident resides.
