BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. There is appropriated out of the general
2	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$79,644 or so much

4	permanent full-time equivalent (2.00 FTE) positions in the
5	disability compensation division of the department of labor and
6	industrial relations, as follows:

TO CHAIRPERSON JOHANSON, VICE CHAIR HOLT, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in strong support of H.B. 211.

The purpose of H.B. 211, is to appropriate funds for two full-time equivalent positions in the Disability Compensation Division ("DCD") of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations ("DLIR").

The Department of Human Resources Development ("DHRD") has a fiduciary duty to administer the State's self-insured workers' compensation program and its expenditure of public funds.

DHRD believes that an additional hearings officer, with appropriation medical and legal training, and an office assistant for the DCD would markedly improve the DLIR's administration of workers' compensation claims in this State. The Hawaii Insurers Council is a non-profit trade association of property and casualty insurance companies licensed to do business in Hawaii. Member companies underwrite approximately forty percent of all property and casualty insurance premiums in the state.

STATEMENT OF THE ILWU LOCAL 142 ON H.B. 211 RELATING TO WORKERS' COMPENSATION

The ILWU Local 142 supports H.B. 211, which appropriates funds for two FTE positions in the Disability Compensation Division of the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations.

The Disability Compensation Division has been short-staffed for several years. The hiring of the additional two positions will first, ensure that hearings are held in a more timely manner on the west side of the Big Island, and second, that there will be greater clerical support to help improve the efficiency of processing workers compensation cases on Oahu.

However, the real concern is the trend by employers to challenge compensation for injured workers, resulting in injured workers left in limbo waiting for medical treatment to help them return to gainful employment or being denied monetary compensation that would allow them to survive while they are not able to work.

The workers' compensation law was intended to be a no-fault law that provides compensation to workers who are injured in the course of their employment. In exchange, workers are prohibited from filing legal action against their employers. Yet, in recent years, employers have been using the tactic of denying liability in order to conduct an "investigation" of the claim, which often means hiring so-called independent medical examiners who are paid by the employer or the employer's insurance carrier and may not be entirely "independent" or unbiased.

The workers' compensation system requires a thorough evaluation and assessment to ensure that the original intent of the law is enforced and that injured workers are provided benefits and services to allow them to return to work. Delays that ultimately result in workers injured on the job no longer being gainfully employed and thus having to rely on government assistance is a gross injustice.

By allowing the additional staff positions provided in H.B. 211, the Department of Labor will be more able to effectively address the "inequality" within the workers compensation system, and administer the law as it was originally intended.

The ILWU urges passage of H.B. 211. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on this matter.

I. OVERVIEW OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

This proposal seeks to appropriate for FY 2017-2018 one hearings officer III position in the Kona office of DLIR and one office assistant IV position in the Department's Disability Compensation Division's (DCD) Honolulu office.

The department <u>supports</u> this measure that will help restore the capacity to conduct workers' compensation (WC) hearings in a timely manner in the Kona office and will further increase the ability of DCD to service claims processing in a timely manner. DLIR's support is contingent upon whether its passage negatively affects the priorities identified in the Governor's Executive Budget request.

II. CURRENT LAW

The Division is responsible for providing economic security and stability for Hawaii's workforce through education, enforcement, and adjudication of the WC, TDI, and PHC laws. To this end, the division's hearings branch is tasked with conducting necessary hearings to ensure parties are provided with the statutory and necessary benefits in compliance with the WC laws and ensuring the decisions are issued to the parties in a timely manner and in accordance with statutory guidelines.

The Kona office lost one of its two hearings officer positions during the Reduction-

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in- Force (RIF) in 2009, leaving that office with only one hearings officer to adjudicate the claim disputes in West Hawaii. Consequently, the Kona office is suffering delays in scheduling hearings causing inconvenience to all parties involved, delays in processing decisions within the 60 days mandated by section 386-86, HRS, and delays in processing and reviewing stipulations and settlement agreements.

III. COMMENTS ON THE HOUSE BILL

The department supports this measure that will help restore the capacity to conduct timely workers' compensation (WC) hearings in the Kona office, and will further increase the ability of the Division to effectively service WC claims processing in Honolulu as long as its passage does not adversely affect the priorities identified in the Governor's Executive Budget request.

The estimated cost to fund the two positions is \$90,646. The cost differential from the amount cited in the bill (\$79,644) results from bargaining unit increases effective January 1, 2017, and the startup office costs that are necessary with newly created positions. The cost breakdown follows:
