## TESTIMONY OF SCOTT E. ENRIGHT CHAIRPERSON, BOARD OF AGRICULTURE

Chairperson Takumi and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to testify on House Bill No. 255. The purpose of this bill is to establish the farm to school grant program to provide grants to farmers participating in the Hawaii farm to school program by creating the farm to school grant program special fund with appropriations. The Department of Agriculture (DOA) supports this measure provided it does not impact the department's priorities submitted in the Executive Budget.

Act 218 (SLH 2015) established a Farm to School Program within DOA, directing the Farm to School Coordinator to "address the issues of supply, demand, procurement, and consumption of Hawaii-grown foods in state facilities" (HRS §141-11(b)). One of the five goals of the program is to "[e]nrich the local food system through the support and increase of local food procurement for the State's public schools and other institutions" HRS §141-11(a)(3). Through the Farm to School Coordinator, the Department has collaborated with stakeholders in the Lieutenant Governor's Advisory Group, as well as working directly with the State Procurement Office, Department of Education (DOE), Hawaii Child Nutrition Program, Department of Health, farmers, distributors, and nonprofit entities, and it is apparent that Hawaii farmers interested in



producing food for our schools need assistance to comply with the prerequisite purchasing demands of state contracting.

The DOE demands Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) Certification in order to purchase directly from farmers. DOA supports DOE's risk assessment to mandate a certification in compliance with the directives of the Food and Drug Administration's Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA). However, DOA has noted through outreach that few farms have GAP certification necessary to bid for a State contract, identifying GAP Certification as a hurdle that farmers interested in selling Hawaii-grown products to the State need assistance on. Farmers need assistance through State resources to meet certain requirements in providing local food to Hawaii's keiki and this program seeks to do just that.

We note that a similar bill, SB807, also establishes a Farm to School Grant Program, though lists administration with HDOA with a 0.5 FTE Grant Administrator, instead of this measure's administration listed with DOE.

### RELATING TO LOCALLY GROWN FOOD

House Bill No. 255 establishes a farm to school grant program within the Department of Education (DOE) and the Farm to School Grant Program Special Fund to be administered by the DOE. The bill provides that the DOE is to coordinate with the Department of Agriculture to ensure that the grant program assists famers participating in the Hawaii Farm to School Program under Section 141-11, HRS, by providing grants for purposes that include complying with requirements of the Food and Drug Administration Food Safety Modernization Act and harmonizing the price at which famers must sell their products with the price at which the DOE can afford to buy the products.

The bill authorizes the deposit of appropriations made by the Legislature into the special fund. Moneys in the special fund are to be used for the purposes of the farm to school grant program. In addition, the bill makes an appropriation of \$2 million in FY 18 and FY 19 to be deposited into the special fund to be expended by DOE for the purposes of the bill.

The Department of Budget and Finance, as a matter of general policy, does not support the creation of any special fund which does not meet the requirements of Section 37-52.3 of the HRS. Special funds should: 1) serve a need that cannot be implemented under the general fund appropriation process; 2) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries of the program; 3) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 4) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. In regards to House Bill No. 255, it is uncertain if there is a clear link between the program and the sources of revenue and if the special fund will be self-sustaining.

Aloha Chair Takumi, Vice Chair Har, and Members of the Committee:

I am Randy Cabral, President of the Hawaii Farm Bureau (HFB). Organized since 1948, the HFB is comprised of 1,900 farm family members statewide, and serves as Hawaii's voice of agriculture to protect, advocate and advance the social, economic and educational interests of our diverse agricultural community.

**The Hawaii Farm Bureau supports HB 255**, establishes the farm to school grant program to provide grants to farmers participating in the Hawaii farm to school program and creates the farm to school grant program special fund.

HFB strongly supports increased use of locally grown agricultural products, fruits, vegetables, meats, dairy and poultry products in our schools and other public institutions. This will truly be a significant step towards increasing our levels of self- sufficiency

Many formal and informal studies have been done addressing farm to school programs. Our farmers and ranchers have tried to work with the procurement system and can speak to the shortcomings of the system. For example, supplying a school or schools within a geographic area is feasible, but providing to the entire school system is not. We need to focus on working with the procurement system to make institutional markets accessible while considering the capacity of farmers and ranchers in Hawaii. Assistance to farmers on how to navigate the system should be a priority.

HFB appreciates the support by the legislature in our past efforts to help Hawaii's farmers achieve compliance with the FDA Food Safety and Modernization Act. As the actual rule has been rolled out by FDA the immensity of the task is becoming evident. The final details are still not clear as the agency themselves have finished articulating the details of the measure but training sessions have been delayed. However, basic requirements about water treatment and refrigeration are clear. This will mean changes on many of our farms. Cooperative efforts will be important to ensure affordability. The Department

will play a key role in not only facilitating training with the University and other partners but also identifying implementation measures needed.

HFB respectfully requests your support in moving this measure forward to ensure that our farmers that are participating in the farm to school program are able to comply with FSMA.
