HOUSE BILL NO. 256 RELATING TO COFFEE LABELING

Chairperson Creagan and Members of the Committee:

Thank for the opportunity to testify on House Bill No. 256, relating to coffee labeling. This bill expands mandatory labeling requirements to include a listing of all non-Hawaiian origin coffees be listed on the label and increase the minimum content requirement for roasted and instant coffee. The Department offers comments on this measure.

Hawaii-grown coffee blends have created new market positions and a standardized labeling criterion has improved consumer confidence in the blended product. The approach to labeling proposed is based on truth-in labeling and requires greater disclosure in the information presented to consumers of these coffee blends. However, listing of all non-Hawaiian origin coffee in order of predominance in the blended product may not be feasible for coffee roasters for they may from time to time change the blend formulation of the non-Hawaiian coffee being used.

While the requirement to increase the minimum Hawaii-grown coffee content in Hawaii-grown coffee blends will increase the Hawaii-grown coffee content, it will also increase the overall cost to the consumer.

The department supports the Hawaii coffee industry and the use of unique geographic coffee growing regions to market, advertise and sell Hawaii-grown coffee. While the department can enforce grading and labeling of green Hawaii-grown coffee, the department cannot determine the content or origin of a coffee blend once it is roasted.

Dear Representative Creagan and Members of the House Committee on Agriculture,

LBD Coffee, LLC, (LBD) a value added agricultural producer in Hawaii, makes the following comments regarding HB256.

LBD has been involved with the roasting and selling of 100% Kona coffee for over 23 years. It is a disgrace what has been allowed to occur under the watchful eye of the Hawaii Department of Agriculture, Consumer Protection, State Legislature, and various coffee trade organizations that do not support the farmers. The continued blatant abuse of the Kona name, and all geographic names in Hawaii continues to destroy farms in our state. The State of Hawaii has never enforced or prosecuted anyone for the misbranding, or counterfeiting of Kona coffee.

This bill, or any other without commodity tracking and enforcement, does nothing to end the abuse of the Kona name. If you are serious about protecting Kona coffee, or any other geographic name in Hawaii you should first investigate and prosecute those who are already cheating the existing laws.

In 1995, Coffee Times, an independent magazine owned by LBD Coffee, ran several stories alleging the abuse and counterfeiting of Kona coffee. It was not until our publishing of these stories, and the wide spread publicity created by our cartoon that a federal agency stepped in to investigate. The owner, Michael Norton of Kona Kai Farms, was found guilty of fraud, and tax evasion and sentenced to federal prison as a result of the counterfeiting scheme. The state of Hawaii played no part in the investigation, and ignored the outcry from its own farmers. Since that time the State of Hawaii has continued to do nothing to enforce its laws, and the abuse continues!

Do you have any idea how easy it is to counterfeit and sell Kona coffee? Probably not, and it happens routinely.

So, perhaps you might consider allocating money to hire an actual business person to oversee, and put back in place a strict coffee certification and grading system that would also track the production, and

There are also new sensing tools in the industry that have the ability to identify the origin of any roasted coffee. Perhaps I could enlighten you, or the bureaucrats who are charged with enforcing the current labeling laws.

I also find it hard to swallow that the State of Hawaii is pouring money into a seed to sale tracking system for a medicinal marijuana program that is soon to fail, and doing nothing in regards to certifying, tracking or enforcing current labeling laws. Kona coffee is a legitimate industry that has been around for nearly 185 years and generates 75 million dollars annually with over 2000 acres farmed. Those numbers could be much higher if the Kona brand was protected and the laws enforced.

It's all quite shameful, and the legislature should recognize that no new labeling law will control or even curtail the abuse without tracking and enforcement.

Thank you for considering my comments. I will now turn my attention back to the bills that threaten the existence of our locally farmed and produced Kauai cigars!

I am very concerned that so-called Kona Coffee blends, containing only 10% Kona coffee and 90% foreign beans, damage our reputation for producing worldclass, fine coffee. I also strongly support that the Origin of all Coffee is clearly identified.

Kona Coffee is Kona Coffee; all other Coffee comes from SOMEWHERE, and that somewhere should be identified. That is the regulation for all products that we buy in the Grocery Store, from Cereal on down.

The argument that "Coffee is Coffee" does not hold water: Why point out that it's partially "Kona Coffee" if "coffee is coffee"? The argument that it is "a trade secret" is not valid either, because such origins as Africa, Vietnam, Latin America, etc. are general enough to obscure the origin of coffee beyond its general area. Maybe the blenders can put "foreign origin" before they list Kona Coffee?

For far too long, the "10% Kona Blend" has degraded the income levels of Coffee Farmers that sell 100% Kona Coffee. For far too long, the "10% Kona Blend" has degraded the reputation of Kona Coffee among people who do not notice the 10% distinction. 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Dear Chair Creagan and Members of the House Agriculture Committee:

On behalf of the more than 300 members of the Kona Coffee Farmers Association I am submitting this written testimony in STRONG SUPPORT of HB256.

For more than 25 years Hawaii coffee farmers have suffered economic losses and the reputations of Hawaii coffee have been damaged because State law permits the use of Hawaii coffee names on packages containing 90% foreign-grown coffee.

In 2007 the Legislature made a factual finding that existing coffee labeling law "causes consumer fraud" and "degrades" the name of Hawaii-grown coffee (SCR No. 102, SD1, HD1); and a distinguished economist has issued a preliminary study concluding that millions of dollars each year are lost by Hawaii coffee farmers because of this "consumer fraud". (M. Feldman, "Economic Effects of Blending Kona Coffee", 2010.)

HB256 will address these problems by requiring (1) a minimum of 51% genuine content in Hawaii Coffee Blends and (2) identification on the label of the origin of imported coffees in the packages.

These 2 straightforward changes have been requested in formal resolutions adopted by the Hawaii County Council (Resolution No. 501-14), the 2016 Hawaii County Democratic Convention (BUS/AG 2016-01), and the 2016 State Democratic Convention (BUS/AG 2016-03). As these resolutions recognize, Hawaii needs to protect the economic interests of its farmers and the reputation and integrity of their crops—and for this reason HB256 is included in the Hawaii Democratic Party's 2017 Package of Legislative Priorities.

In December, Governor Ige called for Hawaii to double its food production by the year 2020, which would mean that 20 percent of its food would be produced locally, with collaboration and assistance for the State's small farmer community as an important part of moving toward food sustainability. (Civil Beat, 12/16/16) A key element in achieving food sustainability is the protection of the identity and reputation of the State's agricultural products and economic viability for Hawaii's farmers.

Hawaii's business press has recognized the problem of unfair and dishonest honest labeling and the adverse effect on Hawaii agricultural products: "The Hawaii brand is so powerful that companies with little or no connection to the state continue to use it. Hawaiian Punch and Hawaiian Sweet Maui Onion Potato Chips, for example, do not contain any ingredients that originate in the state. Global restaurant chain Trader Vic's, which features the "Original Mai Tai, has roots in California. <u>Perhaps most troubling is the use of Kona coffee on products with</u> <u>as little as 10 percent of its beans from the region.</u>" (emphasis added, Hawaii Business, August 2016.)

Similarly, this past August Slow Food USA named "Pure Kona Coffee" to its "Ark of Taste" based on its finding that "deceptive labeling practices have put Pure Kona Coffee at risk of extinction. Every year, millions of pounds of "Kona Blends" are sold to consumers, containing

up to 90% foreign-grown coffee. This labeling undermines the economic future of the coffee farmers, and dilutes the rich flavor of Pure Kona Coffee."

For all of these regions, coffee farmers from Kona and other regions of Hawaii ask for your support and urge the passage of HB256.

Greenwell Farms is a coffee farming, processing, and marketing company in Kona, Hawaii. We export Kona Coffee to locations in Europe, across the Mainland, USA, and all around the Pacific Rim. For decades, we have relied upon the coffee produced by many farmers in North and South Kona to supply us with the highest quality coffee.

We do NOT support the passage of HB256. The current labeling laws have been in place now for over 25 years and the industry markets here in Hawaii, and to some degree across the USA, have evolved under the current rules.

We feel that the impact of such a change as that stated in HB256 should not be initiated until a comprehensive marketing study is completed to accurately assess the impacts on all the markets of Hawaiian coffees. A comprehensive marketing study will require coordination between members of the industry and the public sector in order to develop meaningful and acceptable measurements.

Further, we suggest that simply increasing the percentage of Hawaii coffee in a blend does not necessarily increase the quality of the coffee experience for consumers. We believe that any changes to the laws governing our industry should be focused on the quality of coffee sold under Hawaii origin names.

Chair Creagan, Vice Chair DeCoite, and members of the House Committee on Agriculture:

Hawaii Coffee Company (HCC) **opposes** HB 256, which would prohibit using Hawaii geographic origins of coffee that contains less than 51% coffee by weight from that geographic origin.

HCC has been in the coffee roasting business since 2000 and today is the world's largest roaster of Kona Coffee. Our 100 plus employees at our plant in Kalihi and other locations around the state, including in Captain Cook, the heart of the South Kona coffee district, earn a livelihood milling, roasting, packing, distributing, and retailing coffee. We have a major retail presence throughout Hawaii, are a leading provider of coffee to Hawaii hotels and restaurants as well as an exporter of our products around the globe.

HCC supports consumer choice and providing clear consumer-oriented labeling so customers can make an informed choice as to what coffee they are purchasing. This bill's preamble states that "it is inherently deceptive and misleading to label coffee as a geographically identified blend such as 'Hamakua Blend', 'Ka'u Blend', or 'Kona Blend'..."

This bill is wrong – it isn't misleading to use these names under state law, <u>it is illegal</u>. Rather, under current law and administrative rules no coffee sold or marketed in Hawaii with an origin designation can simply state "Kona Blend". Each bag must state the specific percentage, by weight, such as "10% Kona Coffee Blend". In short, the rules as extremely prescriptive, it must state the percentage than the origin, then the words "coffee" and "blend". Give the consumer credit – they know what they are purchasing. The Legislature and the State Department of Agriculture did a good job years ago by providing this very clear way of disclosure.

There is a market and profit to be made with 100% origin specific coffee offerings, many roasters, including us, do this; there is also a market and profit to be made producing 10% or higher blends, many roasters, such as HCC, also do this.

HB 256 should be shelved and let's put our energy and focus on much more critical aspects of the coffee industry where consensus can be reached. Mahalo for the opportunity to provide this testimony.

Comments: As committee co-chair of Agriculture & Intergovernmental Affairs for the Wai'anae Coast Neighborhood Board, I strongly support this legislation. Our agricultural community and consumers would benefit from being able to directly access this farm product for economic and health reasons. Fresh, unprocessed whole milk is a highly nutritious food that is even considered medicinal for weak and ill people, and it can quickly nourish them back to health. According to the "Report of Michigan Fresh Unprocessed Whole Milk Workgroup" from the State of Michigan Dept of Agriculture in 2012, there are at least 20 naturally occurring intrinsic enzymes contained in fresh milk that do not occur in pasteurized, homogenized milk. These enzymes "are specialized proteins produced in cells that link, break-up, or accelerate chemical reactions" in the body (pg. 17). Additionally, fresh unprocessed whole milk contains extrinsic enzymes made by beneficial microorganisms that "participate in the breakdown of milk components to enable utilization by the microorganisms, but they also participate in the process of bio-availability (absorption of nutrients) in the intestinal tract" (pg. 18). Fresh, unprocessed whole milk (FUWM) contains immune system enhancers that activate white blood cells which attack pathogens, and it stimulates the production of antibodies. FUWM not only consists of antibacterial components, but it also supports beneficial microorganisms which are vital to cultivating the digestive tract. The Michigan Dept of Agriculture report not only demonstrated the nutritional benefits of FUWM, but it also outlined how the nutritional properties of milk change with pasteurization and homogenization. With the heat pasteurization, proteins are significantly denatured (pg. 22). Pasteurization affects the color, taste, and structure of carbohydrates to go through the Maillard reaction, an oxidation chemical reaction that may result in free radicals (cell damage and aging components). "The milk fat globule is the most drastically altered by the combination of pastuerization and homogenization" as the heating process breaks down the membranes of these molecules (pg. 23) Mineral absorption is diminished through pasteurization due to the changing of the molecules they are bound to. Many of our imported "ultra-pasteurized" milk products have even more nutritional deficiencies due to the increased temperature and time of the pasteurization process. Thus, these pasturized/homogenized milk products are not suitable as a high quality health food with healing properties. Allowing for the farm direct sales of fresh, unprocessed whole milk or through a herd share program would provide an economic boost to farmers in Hawai'i and provide health conscious consumers with a superior food product to enhance their nutrition.
