HOUSE BILL NO. 452 RELATING TO AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS

Chairperson Creagan and Members of the Committee:

Thank for the opportunity to testify on House Bill 452, which proposes to require the department to enforce all agricultural products labeled and advertised as "organic" and are sold in the state be certified by a qualified certifier pursuant to the federal National Organic Program (NOP). The department offers comments.

It will be very difficult or nearly impossible for the department to verify if imported agricultural products are truly organic. The USDA NOP allows states to oversee regulatory enforcement responsibilities, but only within its boundaries. The state must submit for approval to the USDA its proposed state organic program, including statutory authorities, and program description. Within six months of the receipt of the submission, the USDA will notify the state whether approval has been granted.

Currently, the state of California is the only state in the nation which oversees and enforces the USDA organic regulations, within California. This program requires organic operations to register annually, and includes spot checks of the registered organic businesses at various points in the supply chain, and sampling and testing for pesticide residues.

Dear Chair Creagan, Vice Chair Decoite and Members of the Committee,

My name is Dr. Ashley Lukens and I am the Director of the Hawai'i Center for Food Safety (CFS). CFS is a nationwide public interest, sustainable agriculture nonprofit organization whose mission centers on furthering the public's right to know how their food is produced and the impacts these production practices have on human health and the environment. We have over 820,000 farmer and consumer members across the country, including nearing 11,000 in Hawai'i. On behalf of CFS and our members, I thank you for the opportunity to speak to you today regarding this important bill.

I am writing in strong opposition to HB452 which states that no agricultural product that is sold in the State shall be labeled, advertised, or otherwise represented to be organic unless the farm or handling facility that produced or processed the product has been certified by a qualified certifying agent pursuant to the National Organic Program. While the bill seems to uphold the National Organic Program on its face, in practice it sets up inconsistent standards that penalize small farmers and create redundant regulation that would discourage organic food production.

HB452 makes it a violation for anyone to claim that their agricultural product is organic unless certified by the National Organic Program. However, the National Organic Program actually allows small organic farmers (those whose annual sales are below \$5000) to advertise and label their products as organic without having to be certified. HB452 would hurt small organic producers by eliminating that provision. The exemption is critical for small farms and small farmers who may not yet afford the certification and record keeping requirements who nonetheless follow organic production principles. The bill must be rejected for creating a penalty for small farmers that do not exist under the National Organic Program.

As for farmers who make more than \$5000, the requirement that they be certified organic in order to use the organic claim is essentially already in existence under the National Organic Program, so the bill is simply redundant, and subjects farmers to double penalty by different governmental entities. As such it should be seen as nothing more than an attack on the growing organic farming community in our State.

The bill also suffers from other inconsistencies by setting a penalty that is different from the

National Organic Program, and also provides a different definition of "agricultural product" than the definition under federal law.

If challenged, a court will likely find the bill to be unlawful, in violation of the National Organic Program. The federal regulations implementing the National Organic Program makes clear that a State may administer its own State Organic Program by meeting the requirements of federal law and must be approved by the USDA prior to implementation. HB452 creates an inconsistent standards and definitions. and different penalties as compared to the National Organic Program, without previous approval from the USDA as required by federal law. It is an unlawful state scheme that is overly burdensome on organic farmers.

As we addressed last year with our state's landmark organic tax credit bill, Organic agriculture has a huge role to play in addressing some of the most pressing issues of our time – economic revitalization, climate change, public health, and environmental protection. Organic foods and products are a strong emerging market in Hawai'i, and the sector is valued at over \$6 million. The growing demand for locally grown, certified-organic produce and products in Hawai'i greatly exceeds supply, and Hawai'i farmers face numerous barriers that deter them from entering the organic sector. These include the financial and paperwork requirements associated with obtaining and maintaining organic certification and higher costs for organic materials, such as fertilizer, which can be double that of conventional farming. The state should only support this industry, and by eliminating an important small farmer protection provision, this bill would make it harder for small farmers to sell their products as organic.

Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony, and I am happy to provide further analysis or respond to any follow-up questions from the Committee.

My name is Tom Grande. My wife and I grow tropical fruits and flowers in Waimanalo. I strongly oppose the adoption of HB 452. As drafted, HB 452 conflicts with and is in violation of the Organic Food Production Act of 1990 as it relates to the small farmer exemption.

Under the Organic Foods Production Act, small farmers whose gross annual organic sales are less than \$5,000, may market products as "organic" if they comply with all regulations as outlined in 7 CFR §§ 205.200-205.299 of the USDA organic standards. 7 CFR §205.101(a); 7 CFR § 205.102. "The exemption is primarily designed for those producers who market their product directly to consumers....[and] who grow and process produce and other agricultural products for sale at farmers markets and roadside stands to consumers within their communities." 80552 Federal Register/Vol. 65, No. 246/Thursday, December 21, 2000/Rules and Regulations.

HB 452 is defective and in violation of the Organic Foods Production Act because it would prevent small farmers from marketing their produce as "organic."

Aloha Chairman Creagan, Vice-Chair DeCoite and members of this committee:

My name is Karen Cobeen and I live on Hawaii Island with my husband and adult disabled son.

It has been my experience that there is currently considerable confusion as to what constitutes "organic" in the State of Hawaii. Many products are labeled organic or natural with no identifiable certification or markings that such a claim is true. In addition, as I attend local farmers markets here on the Big Island, the people in the stands claim their product is organic, when I know with certainty they are not.

My family owned and operated one of the first "certified" organic farms in the State of Washington. We had to prove we were organic and penalties were stiff. There was considerable information available to organic farmers. There were surprise visits and inspections of our farm and formal sworn statements we had to make as to our organic practices and status.

Creating a Hawaii certification program is critical for the credibility of agriculture or other products. I commend this effort. However, this endeavor outlined in this bill does not seem adequate to the task. I do not recommend a "board" of people whose motives may be unclear. I do recommend an actual department in the state Dept of Agriculture whose actions are accountable.

Many states have proven, efficient and effective state certification programs. For just this type of program, I would recommend also contacting some of those states on their experiences. Let's not reinvent the wheel and then make a mess of it.

For these reasons, I strongly support this bill with the recommendations noted here.

Dear Chair Gabbard, Vice Chair Riviere and members of the committee,

I am writing to urge your strong support of SB 29. This bill aims to protect Hawai'i's keiki from the impacts of large-scale agricultural pesticide use by establishing buffer zones around sensitive areas like schools, hospitals, nursing homes and waterways.

I am deeply concerned with the effects of pesticide application and pesticide drift on our keiki health while at school. There are at least 27 schools in Hawai'i within a mile of commercial agricultural operations that apply large volumes of restricted-use pesticides. The American Academy of Pediatrics finds there to be a significantly increased health risk for children exposed to pesticides, and additional precautions must be taken to protect them from unintended exposure.

It is critical that the state take action to reduce childhood pesticide exposure because toxic exposure to pesticides during fetal, neonatal, and infant life can disrupt critical developmental processes. Early life pesticide exposure has been linked to long-term health effects including cancer, decreased cognitive function, behavior problems, birth defects and other adverse birth outcomes, and asthma.

Despite this danger, Hawai'l is one of 19 states that does not have legislation on the books regulating the application of pesticides around schools. The 9th Circuit Court of Appeals has ruled that under Hawai'i law, counties and municipalities do not have the authority to regulate pesticide use. The authority to ensure local protection rests with the State. It is clear that it is the State's responsibility to step up and protect our keiki and our environment from toxic pesticide use.

I urge you to support SB 29 and protect our keiki.
