Re: H.B. 484, Relating to Taxation

The Department of Taxation (Department) appreciates the intent of H.B. 484 and provides the following comments for your consideration.

H.B. 484 adds helicopters as a qualifying "aircraft" for the aircraft service and maintenance facility exemption from general excise tax (GET) exemption codified at section 237-24.9, Hawaii Revised Statutes. The measure is effective upon approval.

The Department notes that the preamble in Section 1 seems to discuss exemption from GET in a broader scope than what this measure proposes. This measure, if enacted, would only additionally exempt amounts received for the service of helicopters and the construction of maintenance facilities at which helicopters are serviced.

Finally, if the Committee wishes to advance this measure, the Department requests that the measure apply to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2017 to allow sufficient time for form and instruction changes.

BILL NUMBER: HB 484; SB 769 (Identical)

INTRODUCED BY: HB by ONISHI, AQUINO, CHOY, CREAGAN, MORIKAWA, NAKASHIMA, OHNO, TODD, Brower, Keohokalole, Quinlan, Yamashita; SB by WAKAI

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: The stated purpose of the bill is to create equity among the types of available aircraft by exempting helicopters from the GET. There already is an exemption recognized in the GET, and the bill as drafted does not achieve its stated purpose. To achieve equity, a different approach is needed.

BRIEF SUMMARY: Amends the definition of "aircraft" in HRS section 237-24.9 to include a helicopter.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Upon approval.

STAFF COMMENTS: Before the 1980's, the State attempted to tax air carriers of all kinds under the public service company tax. However, there is a federal statute (now 49 U.S.C. §40116) preventing States from imposing taxes against the gross income from transportation by air of passengers or cargo. The State contended that it wasn't prevented from imposing the tax, and the U.S. Supreme Court disagreed in a unanimous opinion. *Aloha Airlines v. Director of Taxation*, 464 U.S. 7 (1983).

Then, the Department of Taxation issued Tax Information Release 89-10, acknowledging that the transportation of persons or cargo by helicopter aircraft, including sightseeing tours, is exempt from the GET.

The provision being amended by this bill relates to another exemption entirely. Back in 1997, Continental Airlines was considering building a \$24 million jet maintenance hangar close to the Honolulu International Airport. To lure the project away from Guam and Saipan, our lawmakers at the time offered incentives, including a GET exemption. The exemption applied to servicing and maintenance of aircraft, or from the construction of an aircraft service and maintenance facility. But "aircraft," as used in the exemption statute, was and still is restricted to aircraft with two or more jet engines. Small carriers with propeller planes don't qualify, raising some questions about whether this exemption helps the industry fairly. Is it simply a reflection of the economic realities – namely that the big planes can fly elsewhere to have the maintenance work done, while smaller aircraft are effectively trapped here? A better approach may be to have the exemption apply (or be repealed) across the board; the current structure leaves the impression that big business skates by where small business is left behind.

Chairman Aquino and members of the House Transportation Committee, thank you for the opportunity to speak in support of HB 484 that would create parity among the aircraft being used in Hawaii by amending our current aviation excise tax statute. My name is Gregg Lundberg, I am proud to serve as President of Blue Hawaiian Helicopters. Blue Hawaiian is Hawaii's first air tour operator, founded in 1985, and is the only air tour operator to offer tours and employ Hawaiian residents on Oahu, Kauai, Maui and the Big Island. Blue Hawaiian contributes millions of dollars to Hawaii's tourism industry, over just the last 12 months Blue Hawaii has provided tours of our beautiful state to over 225,000 visitors from more than 70 countries around the world. Our tours are a once in a lifetime experience for passengers young and old of all different abilities, and are an environmentally low-impact way to see the unique wonders of our islands such that we protect our delicate ecosystems. For us at Blue Hawaiian, "good enough is never enough," and we take it upon ourselves to invest in aircraft, maintenance and safety programs that keep our pilots and passengers safe and deliver the best possible experience. Blue Hawaiian has been a proud recipient of the FAA Certificate of Excellence, Diamond Award each year since 1998. Each of our aircraft is equipped with state-of-the-art Garmin Terrain Avoidance visualization technology to give our pilots greater visibility and awareness, and we have invested in our own Flight Training Device to keep our excellent pilots fine-tuning their skills and abilities.
