A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC PREKINDERGARTEN PROGRAMS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the State has made 2 steady progress in investing in early learning over the years. 3 The legislature further finds that Hawaii's youngest children 4 can benefit from early learning programs before they enter 5 kindergarten at age five. Act 109, Session Laws of Hawaii 2015, 6 set forth the history of early learning in the State of Hawaii 7 and statutorily created the public prekindergarten program. Act 8 109 also authorized charter schools to use their available 9 classrooms for public preschool programs.

10 The legislature additionally finds that in 2014, the Hawaii 11 state public charter school commission applied for and received 12 a federal grant from the United States Department of Education 13 to establish prekindergarten classrooms in charter schools. The 14 award provided a four year grant with funding for the first 15 three years. There are six prekindergarten classrooms currently 16 operating in charter schools. Twelve additional classrooms will 17 be added beginning in the 2017-2018 school year.

The State Public Charter School Commission appreciates the opportunity to submit this testimony in support of HB 500 – Relating to Public Prekindergarten Programs

HB 500 will allow the executive office on early learning to enter into a memorandum of understanding with the Hawaii state public charter school commission to administer the charter school prekindergarten classrooms. This will sustain the 18 high quality prekindergarten programs in charter schools currently funded by the federal Preschool Development Grant beginning school year 2018-2019.

This MOU with the executive office on early learning (EOEL) will ensure that quality measures will continue to align with those of the public pre-K programs in its jurisdiction.

In the federal grant from the United States Department of Education to establish 18 prekindergarten classrooms in charter schools, the Early Learning Advisory Board (ELAB) was charged with defining sustainability plans once the federal grant ended. A sub-committee work group has been working on such plans for the past year in partnership with the State Public Charter School Commission. A combination of factors has made this work more urgent: first, federal funding was secured for only three years of the four-year grant time frame; and, second, the change in administration in Washington, D.C. has raised questions about the viability of the fourth year funding.

Currently, the State Public Charter School Commission is in Year Two of the grant with six schools implementing prekindergarten programs. Currently 116 children are enrolled. Providing the funding to sustain this high quality prekindergarten program means that potentially 360 children and families across the state of Hawaii will benefit from high quality preschool experiences. This nearly doubles the number of children enrolled in public pre-K programs in Hawaii.

Another important aspect of **HB 500** is its expanded support to working families. **HB 500** includes families with four-year-old children whose income is three hundred fifty percent or less of the federal poverty guideline, rather than the current two hundred percent income requirement. This change will increase access to high quality prekindergarten programs for children and families who may be living in remote, rural areas of our state.

Testimony from a mother of a student currently attending the Kualapu'u Public Charter School prekindergarten program urges support for this program: "Please keep our pre-K program. It's an excellent program, excellent teacher and an administrator who is behind it 100% and with a community that needs it. We are a small community, and we don't have many options. So, please, please continue to fund the pre-K. We are very invested."

Another mom from our prekindergarten program at Na Wai Ola Public charter in Volcano, Hawaii shared: "It's amazing! She's gone from shy, timid and very enclosed to just freespirited. She talks to people and makes friends. For me personally as a mom, to see your child bloom... she used to keep to herself. Now, she's goes out and she wants to learn. She wants to go to school. To see her just share what she learned throughout the school day and bring it home and say, 'I want to show you (be)cause this is what I learned in class.' The whole family is a part of her learning. It's something special."

For these reasons, the Hawaii State Public Charter School Commission respectfully requests that the committee pass this bill.

Chair Takumi and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General provides the following comments.

The purposes of this bill are to: (1) require the Executive Office on Early Learning to enter into a memorandum of understanding with the Hawaii State Public Charter School Commission to administer charter school prekindergarten classrooms; and (2) appropriate moneys to continue funding of public prekindergarten classrooms.

Article V, section 1, of the Hawaii Constitution states, "[t]he executive power of the State shall be vested in a governor." Article III, section 1, grants the Legislature with the legislative power of the State. "The separation of powers doctrine is not expressly set forth in any single constitutional provision, but like the federal government, Hawaii's government is one in which the sovereign power is divided and allocated among three co-equal branches." <u>Hawaii Insurers Council v. Lingle</u>, 120 Haw. 51, 69 (2008) (internal citations omitted). "The doctrine provides that a department . . . may not exercise powers not so constitutionally granted, which from their essential nature, do not fall within its division of governmental functions, unless such powers are properly incidental to the performance by it of its own appropriate functions." <u>Id</u>. at 70. The power to enter into agreements and to carry out the purpose of the state agency rests with the executive branch.

The Director of the Executive Office on Early Learning is responsible for "[c]ontracting for services that may be necessary for the purposes of this section Testimony of the Department of the Attorney General Twenty-Ninth Legislature, 2017 Page 2 of 2

[section 302L-1.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes], including through master contracts with other state agencies receiving federal and state funds for programs and services for early learning, and purchase of service agreements with appropriate agencies." Section 302L-1.5(c)(7), Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS). The Hawaii State Public Charter School Commission, as the statewide authorizer, "[has] the power to make and execute contracts and all other instruments necessary or convenient for the exercise of its duties and functions under this chapter [chapter 302D, Hawaii Revised Statutes.]" Section 302D-5(c), HRS. This bill requires two state agencies, both of which have the authority to enter into contracts to carry out the purposes of their respective statutes, to enter into an agreement to administer charter school prekindergarten classrooms. Consequently, the bill encroaches into the internal management and operation of two executive branch agencies.

We respectfully recommend amending the provision that requires the Executive Office on Early Learning to enter into a memorandum of understanding with the Hawaii State Public Charter School Commission, to rather allow the two agencies to enter into a memorandum of understanding.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment Committee will recommend to the Board of Trustees a position of <u>SUPPORT</u> on HB500, which provides funding to continue and expand the public prekindergarten program for public charter school students. This measure helps to ensure continuation of a program that benefits young learners, and increases their likelihood of success in school and the larger community.

In any given year, there are about 17,000 four-year-old children in Hawai'i, and approximately half enter kindergarten without having attended preschool. Not surprisingly, a significant majority of public school kindergarten teachers report that their students are not ready for school. Encouraging greater preschool attendance may substantially increase our children's chances of success in kindergarten and beyond: when provided with the opportunity for high-quality early childhood education, research has shown that children are more likely to succeed in kindergarten, reach higher levels of educational attainment, and contribute meaningfully to society, among other positive achievements.

In 2014, OHA wrote a letter to the U.S. Department of Education (USDOE), in support of the State's successful application to the USDOE's Preschool Development Grants Program. The State's application proposed to improve kindergarten readiness with an ambitious yet achievable plan, to expand access to high-quality preschool classrooms in high-need communities through a charter school prekindergarten program. This measure will ensure funding for the continuation and expansion of the charter school prekindergarten program, which currently supports preschool classrooms in six charter schools, four of which are Hawaiian-focused or Hawaiian language immersion schools. OHA understands that the State plans to establish additional preschool classrooms in at least 12 additional public charter schools, three of which are Hawaiian-focused or Hawaiian language immersion schools.

OHA has been a strong supporter of Hawai'i's public charter schools, many of which provide a culturally-grounded education for Native Hawaiian and other children. Seventeen of the thirty-four public charter schools in Hawai'i are Hawaiian-focused or Hawaiian language immersion charter schools, in which OHA has invested over \$15,000,000 since FY 2006 (School Year 2005-2006). OHA has made this investment

because research has shown that Hawaiian students exposed to culturally-driven educational strategies have a stronger sense of socio-emotional well-being, deeper engagement with their schools, and a stronger commitment to civic activities in their community, factors which are directly tied to greater academic achievement.

This bill's proposed funding for preschool classrooms will allow a greater number of preschool-aged children, including Native Hawaiian students, to access the advantages of early childhood education. Therefore, OHA urges the Committee to **PASS** HB500.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony on behalf of Hawaii's Early Childhood Action Strategy, a public private collaborative that recognizes the strength of communities and works across sectors to increase the number of young children in Hawaii who are born healthy, developing on track, ready for school when they enter kindergarten, and proficient learners by third grade.

Action Strategy supports the passage of HB500 because public charter prekindergarten (PreK) programs are an important component of an effective, comprehensive early childhood system.

Hawaii's charter school PreK program is supported by a federal grant from the US Department of Education. Unfortunately, those federal grant funds may no longer be available for fiscal years 2017-2018 and 2018-2019. State funding is needed to continue the public charter school PreK program during those years and to accomplish the original vision for the program, which includes offering the program in a total of 18 classrooms starting in the 2017-2018 school year.

HB500 provides that the funds will be administered by the Executive Office of Early Learning (EOEL), which will enter into a partnership with the Hawaii State Public Charter School Commission for this purpose. EOEL is well-positioned for this task and the purpose of that office includes overseeing PreK programs in public schools.

Dear Chair Takumi, Vice Chair Har and Committee Members:

My name is Robert G. Peters and I currently serve as the Chair of the Early Learning Advisory Board (ELAB). Thank you for this opportunity to offer testimony on behalf of the ELAB in support of HB 500, Relating to Public Prekindergarten Programs. This bill requires the Executive Office on Early Learning (EOEL) to enter into a memorandum of understanding with the State Charter School Commission to administer the charter school pre-kindergarten classrooms and appropriates funding to continue the 18 charter school prekindergarten classrooms beginning with the 2018-19 school year

An MOU with the EOEL establishing it as the administering body of the charter school prekindergarten classrooms is a necessary to ensure that quality measures align with those of the public pre-K program currently under its jurisdiction.

In the federal grant from the United States Department of Education to establish pre-kindergarten classrooms in charter schools, the ELAB was charged with defining sustainability plans once the federal grant ended. A sub-committee work group has been working on such plans for the past year. A combination of factors has made this work more urgent: first, federal funding was secured for only 3 years of the 4-year grant time frame; and, second, the change in administration in Washington has raised questions about the viability of fourth year funding which seemed more promising prior to the election.

This is year two of the grant and 6 classrooms are up-and-running; an additional 12 will be launched this next year. Already, testimonials from families indicate the value of the program despite the few children being served. Currently 120 children are enrolled and by the start of school year 2017-18, another 240 children will be served, which almost doubles the number of children enrolled in public pre-K in our State. The possibility of not continuing the 18 classrooms because of a lack of funding would be a disservice to our *keiki* and their families. And of critical importance is that the schools in which these pre-K classrooms are being opened are located in areas of limited-to-no access to high quality early childhood programs and schools report very few have preschool experienced prior to Kindergarten.

Thank you for the opportunity to offer testimony in support of HB 500.

TITLE OF BILL: HB 500 RELATING TO PUBLIC PREKINDERGARTEN PROGRAMS

Honorable Chair, Roy Takumi, Vice Chair, Takashi Ohno and Committee members

I am writing in support of HB 500 Relating to Relating to Public Prekindergarten Programs

I appreciate the forward thinking of our state lawmakers. Supporting early learning is a long term investment in the well-being of our state. HB 500 asks for the Executive Office of Early Learning to enter into a memorandum of understanding with the Hawaii State Public Charter School Commission over the administration and funding of the prekindergarten program initiated when Hawaii received a U.S. DOE Preschool Development Grant in 2014. A memorandum of understanding could enhance the coordination between the state and federal initiatives and help to maintain momentum in early learning during a time when there is uncertainty about continued federal funding.

The funds requested to continue this initiative (\$2,900,000 per. year) are substantial. While entering into an MOU the program will facilitate a coordination and consolidation of efforts across these sectors, it will also create more oversight responsibility for the Executive Office of Early Learning at a time when the EOEL is still trying to recover critical infrastructure positions that were lost in the transition from the Abecrombie to the Ige administration. Therefore, I suggest that provisions be included in the bill that enable the EOEL to successfully provide oversight for the program.

I also hope that the funding and expansion of the federally funded program will not compete with funding and expansion of other state initiatives such as the current state funded PreK program, support for FCILs, and Preschool Open Doors programs. The funding of each option needs to be part of an overall approach to creating a coordinated early learning system that serves the needs of families with children birth through 8-years-olds. The legislature must also allow provisions for a shared professional development infrastructure to support the workforce needed to ensure quality of services across all programs.

I support increased funding of early learning programs for young children with thoughtful coordination and infrastructure to ensure that we maximize the impact of public investments.

I am a Teacher at a community-based preschool serving Native Hawaiian families in the Ko'olaupoko district and I strongly support this bill. As an educator, a graduate student and a Native Hawaiian, I see the value in and important role of charter schools, particularly for our children who do not fit the sometimes, narrow learning environment public schools provide. By extending funding to prekindergarten programs, more children can become school ready. Research has shown that quality education is critical for life-long success outcomes and overall economic success per the National Conference of State Legislators 2016 report:

"Continuing positive long-term effects of high-quality early childhood care and education on low-income 3- and 4-year-olds. Overall, the study recently documented a return to society of more than \$17 for every dollar invested in the early care and education program, primarily because of the large continuing effect on the reduction of male crime. These new figures are a dramatic increase in long-term returns." Highlights from the study's major findings include:

- Economic/Workforce: More of the group who received high-quality early education than the nonprogram group were employed at age 40 (76 percent vs. 62 percent).
- Education: More of the group who received high-quality early education, particularly females, graduated from high school than the non-program group.
- Crime Prevention: The group who received high-quality early education had significantly fewer arrests than the non-program group (36 percent vs. 55 percent were arrested five times or more).
