Chair Keith-Agaran and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General (the "Department") submits comments.

The purpose of this bill is to establish class C felony offenses for an assault against a utility worker that causes serious or substantial bodily injury or an assault against a utility worker with a dangerous instrument that causes bodily injury.

While the Department appreciates the intent of this bill, this bill creates class C felony offenses that are already covered by the existing offenses of Assault in the First Degree, a class B felony offense, and Assault in the Second Degree, a class C felony offense. The proposed offenses are intended to only protect utility workers engaged in the performance of their duties, but the existing offenses have no such limitation, and therefore require proof of fewer facts.

On page 2 of the bill, from lines 9-19, the proposed offenses are set out as follows:

- (1) A person commits the offense of assault against a utility worker, if the person:
 - Intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causes serious or substantial bodily injury to a utility worker who is engaged in the lawful performance of the utility worker's duties; or
 - (b) Intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causes bodily injury with a dangerous instrument to a utility worker who is engaged in the lawful performance of the utility worker's duties.

The following provisions show how the proposed offenses are already covered under existing law.

Section 707-710, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), provides:

A person commits the offense of assault in the first degree if the person intentionally or knowingly causes serious bodily injury to another person.

Section 707-711(1)(b), HRS, provides:

A person commits the offense of assault in the second degree if the person recklessly causes serious bodily injury to another.

Section 707-711(1)(a), HRS, provides:

A person commits the offense of assault in the second degree if the person intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causes substantial bodily injury to another.

Section 707-711(1)(d), HRS, provides:

A person commits the offense of assault in the second degree if the person intentionally or knowingly causes bodily injury to another with a dangerous instrument.

Chair Keith-Agaran, Vice Chair Rhoads and Members of the Committee,

The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local Union 1260, AFL-CIO (IBEW1260), represents more than 3500 members working in the utility, outside construction, cable, telecom and maintenance industries throughout the State of Hawaii and respectfully offers the following testimony in <u>STRONG SUPPORT</u> of House Bill 796 (HB796).

Our members, employed by the Hawaiian Electric Companies (HECO, MECO, HELCO) and Kauai Island Utility Cooperative (KIUC) are often put in situations, as part of their jobs, that could and sometimes do lead to confrontation between an employee and customer. This includes line workers working to restore/repair power lines, meter readers in the field ensuring customers are properly charged for electrical service, field service representatives and trouble-crews performing service connects/disconnects, customer billing representatives who accept payments and others working directly with or around customers.

Passage of HB796 helps to ensure these workers who often work in dangerous conditions, on dangerous systems, can perform their duties without the outside distraction of potential violence, ultimately allowing the best possible service to all customers of Hawaii's utility companies.

The **International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local Union 1186** represents over 4,000 members working in electrical construction, telecommunications, and with Oceanic Cable. Our members include civil service employees at Pearl Harbor, Hickam, Kaneohe, and military facilities throughout Hawaii. IBEW Local 1186 also represents over 120 signatory electrical contracting companies that perform most of the electrical work in our state.
