HB 849 – RELATING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII ACCOUNTING AND FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

Chair Woodson, Vice Chair Hashem and Members of the Committee on Higher Education:

Thank you for this opportunity to testify. The University of Hawai'i (UH) **supports** HB 849, Relating to the University of Hawaii Accounting and Financial Management System. This bill reinstates the authority of UH to maintain a separate accounting and financial management system that is compatible with the State of Hawai'i accounting and financial system.

UH updated its financial system to the Kuali Financial System (KFS) at the start of Fiscal Year 2013, on July 1, 2012. KFS is a comprehensive financial software package that was developed and is supported by a consortium of universities that use an open source and partner enhanced process. Thus, it serves the needs of UH's reporting, regulatory, and accreditation requirements, while also allowing for compatibility with external partners, such as the State Department of Accounting and General Services (DAGS).

Because KFS is an open source project, there are no large license fees similar to off-the-shelf vended products, and the only costs are the physical hardware costs and the personnel to support the software systems. Over twenty other schools have also implemented KFS, including Cornell University, Indiana University, Michigan State University, University of Connecticut, University of Maryland, Colorado State University, University of Arizona, University of California at Irvine, University of California at Davis, and the University of Southern California.
