On behalf of our 20,000 members and supporters throughout the state, the Sierra Club of Hawai'i strongly supports HB 891 HD1, which would require the Department of Agriculture (DOA) and office of the governor to develop a strategic plan to double local food production and exports by 2020.

Our State Constitution mandates that we "conserve and protect agricultural lands, promote diversified agriculture, [and] increase agricultural self-sufficiency.¹ As the bill points out, studies have shown that by even replacing 10% of the food we currently import with locally grown food, Hawai'i would realize significant benefits to its economy.² In addition to the more than 2,300 jobs that would be created, the State would generate around \$6 million in state tax revenues alone.³

By establishing a strategic plan to assist the State in reaching its 2020 goal of doubling local food production, HB 891 HD1 is directly aligned with the State's constitutional duty and will greatly benefit the people of Hawai'i . Further, any decrease in the amount of food and agriculture products being imported into Hawai'i would substantially benefit our beautiful natural environment by reducing our carbon footprint, while simultaneously decreasing our risk to harmful invasive species introductions.⁴

For the reasons mentioned above, we urge you to support HB 891 HD1. Thank you very much for this opportunity to provide testimony on this important issue.

Ulupono believes that self-sufficiency is essential to our future prosperity and will help shape a future where economic progress and mission-focused impact can work hand in hand.

Ulupono <u>strongly supports</u> **HB 891 HD 1**, which develops a strategic plan to double local food production by 2020, because it aligns with our goal of creating more locally produced food.

Ulupono is supportive of the Governor's plan to double local food production by 2020. However, to meet such an ambitious goal, it is important to have a strategic plan to help the industry, funders, policymakers, and the public. If everyone is using similar metrics and are on the same page, it will help to provide guidance so organizations like Ulupono can be more effective at aligning our actions.
