HB 950 Relating to Higher Education

Aloha Chair Kaniela Ing, and Vice Chair Cedric Asuega Gates and members of the committee(s):

My name is Jonathan K. Kamakawiwo'ole Osorio, interim dean of the Hawai'inuiākea School of Hawaiian Knowledge and lately Professor of Hawaiian Studies at the University of Hawai'i Mānoa. Although I believe that such a university will eventually emerge in Hawai'i, I do not believe that it should go forward without extensive consultation and collaboration between all of the campuses in the University of Hawai'i system and indeed with all the private schools, immersion schools and public charter schools that offer education in part or fully in the Hawaiian language.

The lack of consultation, or even notice of this project is troubling and so are some of the assumptions presented in the language of this bill. For example:

The recently constructed building of the Hawaiian language college provides an opportunity for the college to expand its services and reach, and to establish itself as an international leader and innovator in indigenous language medium education. The legislature also recognizes, however, that in order to continue addressing the challenges of revitalizing the Hawaiian language and expanding its reach, the Hawaiian language college must be granted greater governing autonomy.

In the interest of good policy we would prefer this bill reference the numbers of undergraduate and graduate students historically and currently enrolled at Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani as well as the numbers of Native Hawaiian Students enrolled at UH Hilo. Were our school to make a similar bid to be the Hawaiian language university with similar claims to autonomy and leadership in the field, we would not only provide those numbers, we would not presume to move forward without cooperation and agreement from all of the colleges and campuses in Hawai'i.

But strictly from how one constructs an argument, the above statement makes no sense. What challenges specifically are addressed by recognizing one campus as the university for Hawaiian and Indigenous languages? Is Hilo challenged by the diverse approaches to language instruction and curriculum development that have emerged on the different campus and in the different schools? What I see is an assertion without any evidence or foundation and I cannot believe that the state legislature would consent to a plan that contains so vague an assumption about the "problems" that are being addressed and how Ka Haka 'Ula is positioned to meet them.

It has been pointed out by the former dean of Hawai'inuiākea, when a similar bill to this one was introduced in 2016, that Ka Haka'ula has generally not participated in system-wide attempts to articulate our curriculum, or to collaborate with the CCs and other colleges in dealing with issues like immersion education and indigenous learning. It is certainly their right to be independent. But independence is not the same thing as leadership in the field, which we believe cannot emerge without engagement and collaboration.

There is simply no argument to be made at this time that any one institution should be given the resources and the autonomy to determine the conduct and success of Hawaiian language instruction in the future, and when that time comes there will absolutely need to be robust agreement and genuine consensus among the faculty of all of the centers of higher education in Hawai'i, as well as a fairly strong articulation of faith from the secondary and primary schools that will be served by this as well.

HB 950 - RELATING TO HIGHER EDUCATION.

Chair Ing, Vice Chair Gates and Members of the Committee.

At this time the University of Hawai'i opposes HB 950, which would establish the University of Hawai'i at Hilo College of Hawaiian Language as an autonomous university college.

There is no doubt that the UH Hilo College of Hawaiian Language has contributed greatly to the revitalization of the Hawaiian language, the establishment of immersion instruction in Hawaiian at the K-12 level, and the development of curricula and instructors of the Hawaiian language at all levels of education in our state. The faculty in the College are to be honored for their accomplishments. They are among the key pioneers who have educated a generation of instructors who now make it possible for students at all levels to learn and learn through the Hawaiian language

Through this bill the Legislature would be directing an internal reorganization of the University to alter the relationship of the College of Hawaiian Language with the rest of the University of Hawai'i at Hilo and the entire UH System. It would separate the College and its faculty from its colleagues on its campus and throughout the UH System by making it an autonomous university college of the UH System, a designation that is unclear and unprecedented.

The University of Hawai'i does not see the need to separate the College as a university college to accomplish the goals of this Bill, which are objectives not only of the UH Hilo College of Hawaiian Language but of the entire University System and its ten accredited campuses. The proponents of this separation have been asked to clearly articulate the barriers they see to progress that this significant structural change is intended to overcome. So far there have been no such specific barriers identified, much less barriers that cannot be overcome.

At the same time, there appear to be disadvantages should the Legislature decide to assign a single new autonomous university with these responsibilities of the entire UH System and the

State. For example, if we share a goal to teach more general education courses in Hawaiian, it would be most effective and efficient and appropriate to engage the Hawaiian-speaking subject matter faculty of all ten UH campuses rather than just the Hawaiian language faculty of the UH Hilo College of Hawaiian Language. A critical task to advance the teaching of the Hawaiian language is to create pathways that articulate Hawaiian language instruction throughout all ten UH campuses and with the public and private school systems. This bill would increase separation rather than advance collaboration and would make it harder to find common purpose within and across our campuses, colleges, schools, and the broader community. More generally, we believe the substantial work before the state to normalize the Hawaiian language within Hawai'i can best be advanced with all our campuses, faculty, staff and students, many of whom are engaged in partnerships with education and government at many levels to advance understanding, utilization and appreciation of the Hawaiian language across our islands.

S.R. No. 97 S.D. 1 of the 2015 legislative session established a working group to consider both the restructuring of the College of Hawaiian Language and to examine the expansion of Hawaiian language instruction throughout the University of Hawai'i system. The report of the working group reflects its discussions of expanding instruction in the Hawaiian language throughout the University of Hawai'i System, and it concluded with a recommendation that the group continue its work in 2016 to develop an implementation plan for expansion.

The report also includes a recommendation by the College of Hawaiian Language to establish itself as a university within a university. This was not a recommendation from the broader Hawaiian language community across the University system or the University itself. But this is only part of the working group report addressed by HB 950. We believe it is premature to consider this bill until the appropriate consultation has taken place with the broader university-wide Hawaiian language constituency. I have asked the proponents of this separation to discuss their recommendations with Hawai'i Papa O Ke Ao, the UH systemwide group that provides leadership on how to advance the mission we have embraced to be a foremost indigenous-serving university. This consultation has not yet taken place and Hawai'i Papa O Ke Ao does not support this bill at this time either.

The report of the SR 97 working group recognizes that expanding instruction through the Hawaiian language is a complex process requiring collaboration and common purpose across all 10 campuses, their colleges, and the schools in the state who prepare students for study at the University. The entire university system is committed to expanding instruction in and through Hawaiian at UH and in the state and does not see this as the responsibility of just a single new autonomous unit.

We recommend deferring action on this bill until the University of Hawai'i campuses, programs and stakeholders, including Hawai'i Papa O Ke Ao, can develop a shared recommendation on how to best expand instruction of and through Hawaiian in our state and advance the broader purposes called for in the Constitution.

Aloha Representative Ing and the members of the House Committee Ocean, Marine Resources, & Hawaiian Affairs,

My name is Dr. Keiki Kawai'ae'a. I am the Director of Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani College of Hawaiian Language. On behalf of the Hawaiian Language College I want to express our appreciation for the past support given by the legislature in supporting the revitalization of the Hawaiian language and request that HB 950 be passed.

This year makes the 30<sup>th</sup> year of the Hawaiian Immersion Program in public education and the 20<sup>th</sup> year of the Hawaiian language college. The many strides forward towards the revitalization of the Hawaiian language have been made through an educational platform. Currently, we have over 3,000 students enrolled in Hawaiian medium-immersion schools P-12. In addition, an estimated 13,500 students are enrolled in various Hawaiian language coursework in both public and private education, which includes higher education at roughly 2,000 students. The engagement of both lower and higher education works together to raise the vitality of the Hawaiian language in our home, schools, communities and workforce.

Schools, colleges and universities throughout Hawai'i have benefited from the concentrated focus in Hilo to provide a steady source of curriculum materials, modern lexicon development, and primary Hawaiian language sources for the state. Perhaps some of your own offices use those resources such as the Ulukau Electronic Library with its Hawaiian Dictionary feature on wehewehe.org. Ulukau has over 20 million hits a year.

We see the numbers of Hawaiian language families increasing across the state. On Hawai'i Island alone, the Hawaiian language ranks number one among the non-English home languages and fifth in the state. Yet, with all that has been done - much more needs to be accomplished if

we are to serve the Hawaiian language needs of all Hawai'i's people. Demands for support from the schools, community and students continue with only basic resources from the university to address those needs.

What then is the next step? The University College model exists in 13 countries including the U.S. This model works well for small colleges that have a district responsibility within the larger University system. The legislature has entrusted our college at UH Hilo with shouldering an important constitutional responsibility relating to use of the Hawaiian language in Hawai'i's P-20 educational system. The work of the college is part of a larger state system that has the potential as the only state education system in the country to work innovatively as a highly functioning system both in lower and higher education and across the two educational levels because it is part of a larger state system.

Hawai'i has received national and international recognition for the work that has resulted from your trust in us. Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani College consistent receives requests from other indigenous languages across the U.S. and internationally asking for assistance using the Hawai'i model for indigenous language revitalization. Not only have we made strides forward towards revitalizing and renormalizing Hawaiian, our work has served as a shining beacon of hope for other indigenous languages across the globe.

In the coming decade we will be facing additional challenges as the generation that began the Hawaiian Renaissance and Hawaiian language efforts through the state move closer to retirement and the few remaining Native Hawaiian speakers from that era pass. HB950 direct us to act now - to plan ways to meet the challenges and take our state to an even higher level of language revitalization success and acclaim through the restructuring of Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani College as a "University College."

We see possibilities through this bill that will allow new innovations for Hawaiian language as a stronger P-25 Hawaiian medium system. This opportunity will allow the college to engage in new areas of Hawaiian language support for students, families, and communities including further expansion of Hawaiian language into the workforce. With all of the progress made we are only half way through the journey that will ensure sustainability of 'ōlelo Hawai'i for the future generations. We ask for your strong support for HB950.

# HB950 RELATING TO HIGHER EDUCATION: STRONG SUPPORT

Aloha Chair Ing and Members of the House Committee on Ocean, Marine Resources and Hawaiian Affairs:

My name is Dr. Kēhaulani 'Aipia-Peters. I am the Chair of the Public Charter School Board of Ke Kula 'O Nāwahīokalani-'ōpu'u, the largest Native American language medium/immersion school in the country. We have three campuses: Puna; Wai'anae; and Waimea, Hawai'i.

I want to express the strong support for HB 950. The Nāwahī 'ohana and many others have greatly benefited from Ka Haka 'Ula, but much more needs to be done. We do not have the luxury of importing external university-produced human and material resources for Hawaiian. HB 950 will allow the fine work of Ka Haka 'Ula to move to a higher level by overcoming current UH system barriers that prevent maximum impact and cooperation to serve a unique need.

The teacher shortage for schools taught through Hawaiian is very severe with approximately 20% of teachers uncertified compared to 4% overall in the DOE/charter system. There is a general lack of understanding of what it takes to develop high-level proficiency in Hawaiian to become a successful Hawaiian immersion teacher. We need HB 950 in order to develop full Hawaiian proficiency including the use of Hawaiian in content areas such as the social sciences, sciences, and mathematics. This means creating an actual Hawaiian medium university college as exists in other areas with two official languages.

Hawaiian immersion schools are also severely underserved relative to the national and state movement to provide college level coursework at the high school level. The Advanced Placement (AP) courses and national examinations are in English as are the vast number of "dual credit" courses offered. We cannot address AP through Hawaiian, but we can use Ka Haka 'Ula to develop dual credit through Hawaiian. They have experimented with some such courses with us at Nāwahī, but we have been stymied by structural barriers in the UH system that prevent such courses from being regularly offered and spread throughout the state by electronic and other means. HB950 is very important in this regard.

In HRS 304A-1302 Nāwahī is specified as a laboratory school site for the College. We currently serve as a training ground for the majority of teachers certified through Hawaiian and often begin initiatives that later spread to other schools. There is much potential in P-20 Hawaiian immersion education to improve academic achievement in our state. Since its first senior class in 1999, Nāwahī has had a 100% high school graduation rate with over 85% going directly on to college for a population of approximately 70% free and reduced lunch students. Recent data from Hawai'i P-20 show Hawaiian immersion students as a whole performing above their peers.

We are growing at a very high rate and cannot wait longer for barriers to Ka Haka 'Ula support for us to be removed. In the past five years, when the overall K-12 enrollment of the DOE and charters has decreased, Nāwahī's has increased by 67.1% to 458. In addition we have 115 preschool children integrated into our Nāwahī campuses through cooperation with the 'Aha Pūnana Leo. I strongly urge passage of HB 950.

### FACULTY SENATE SUPPORT FOR HB 950 ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR KEKOA HARMAN PRESIDENT, KA HAKA 'ULA O KE'ELIKŌLANI SENATE

E ka Lunaho'omalu Ing a me nā Lālā o ke Kōmike o ka Hale i Pili i ka Moana, Kumuwaiwai Kai, a me nā Kuleana Hawai'i, aloha. My name is Kekoa Harman. I am the President of the Faculty Senate of Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani, the Hawaiian language college mandated in HRS 304A-1301-1302. I testify for the strong support of the faculty of Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani for HB 950 and strongly urge passage of the bill.

I want to begin for the faculty by stating how important legislative attention has been to the revitalization of the Hawaiian language and to express appreciation for what has been done over decades by the legislature. The many visitors we receive annually from different American Indian tribes, Alaska Native villages, and Native American Pacific Islander territories have not had the same level sort of policy support and look to Hawai'i for innovations and leadership. We would not be in such a position if the legislature has not acted with the foresight that it has.

Our Faculty Senate met on January 27, 2017 and passed a resolution in support of HB 950. That action builds on our earlier resolution supporting restructuring the College held on December 18, 2015, which was part of our participation in responding to SR 97 D1 from the 2015 legislature. We also held a Ka Haka 'Ula stakeholders meeting open to students, faculty, staff and community members on November 13, 2015 which also produced a statement in support of restructuring. Additionally, we have shared concerns over structural barriers with UH Hilo campus administrators and UH system administrators for many years, but those barriers have remained. HB 950 provides a pathway to overcoming many of those barriers.

Our faculty, students, and community partners have accomplished much with the special structure of a Hawaiian language college provided us by the legislature twenty years ago. We began that new structure with a freeze on access to any new general funds that lasted four years, yet we moved forward using our own strengths and grant support from other entities. Prior to the legislative mandate to transform us into a Hawaiian language college, the standard university structure had long listed attention to the Hawaiian language and culture in strategic plans and vision statements, but the reality was that the Hawaiian language did not move forward as a priority. Within the standard structure the priorities were other fields of study that were well established nationally.

Restructuring as a college produced many important initiatives, among them being: 1.) a targeted Hawaiian immersion teacher training and licensing program; 2.) an M.A. in Hawaiian language and literature; 3.) an M.A. in indigenous teacher education; 4.) a Ph.D. in Hawaiian and Indigenous Language and Culture Revitalization; 5.) a Hawaiian medium laboratory school program; 6), the Ulukau electronic Hawaiian library; 7); the first Hawaiian English bilingual museum; and 8) pathways for participation in our work by other indigenous peoples through our incorporated Linguistics program and initiatives such as the Mokuola Center.

While the college structure allowed for must progress, further restructuring as a university college will allow us to meet crucial and rapidly growing needs statewide. We are anxious to begin. The Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani Faculty Senate is solidly behind HB 950. I strongly urge its passage.

#### SUPPORT HB 950/SB 848 TESTIMONY FROM CHAMORU STUDIES AND SPECIAL PROJECTS DIVISION GUAM DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

Hafa Adai members of the Hawai'i State Legislature. My name is Rufina Mendiola. I head the Division of Chamoru Studies and Special Projects of the Guam Department of Education. I also teach Chamoru Language at the University of Guam. I write to attest the importance of the work of the State of Hawai'i's special University resource Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani to our work here in Guam in revitalizing our Chamoru language. I am sure that the benefits of the restructuring proposed for Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani in HB 950/SB 848 will further strengthen the mutual support presently occurring between Hawai'i and Guam to provide a quality education to our young people while maitaining our unique Pacific Island languages and identities.

Over the past few years, and especially this past year 2016, Chamoru language revitalization efforts have greatly benefited from work with Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani. Those connections began through correspondence, then a visit by some in our Division to Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani and its laboratory school Nāwahīokalani'ōpu'u. This then lead to a joint effort to connect further through enrollment of one of our staff in their language revitalization Ph.D. This past year we brought at different times two of the senior faculty of Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani to Guam to learn more about our work and interact with education adminstrators here and with the broader Chamoru community.

As a result of those interactions here in Guam that spanned the full P-20 spectrum and which included direct testimony regarding our work from Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani faculty with expertise in language revitalization, the Guam Department of Education Board of Education approved establishment of a Chamoru immersion program to begin this fall. Furthermore, the Legislature of Guam appropriated funds to begin Chamoru medium preschool education on the model of the Pūnana Leo Hawaiian language preschool operated at the Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani P-12 laboratory school site Nāwahīokalani'ōpu'u.

We will be sending a Chamoru delegation to the He 'Ōlelo Ola conference held by Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani at the end of February, 2017 and also expect a separate visit from the President of the University of Guam to Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani and Nāwahīokalani'ōpu'u as well.

We have also been very impressed by the manner in which those from Ka Haka 'Ula O Ke'elikōlani have sought to learn from our successes here in Guam and assist us in spreading best practice that we have developed to Hawai'i and elsewhere. We are planning on working with them to find ways to better share our total public school system teaching of Chamoru to all students in elementary, middle and high school with Hawai'i and Native American communities. We understand from our colleagues at Ka Haka 'Ula that we have the most comprehensive such K-12 program in an indigenous language in the country.

I and others here teaching Chamoru are very supportive of HB 950 and SB 848 and see the proposed restructuring as a means us in Guam to work better with Hawai'i. Si Yu'os Ma'ase'.

Re: HB 950 RELATING TO HIGHER EDUCATION.

Establishes the Hawaiian language university college as an autonomous entity within the University of Hawaii system to be located at the University of Hawaii at Hilo. Implements an indigenous university college model by transferring the University of Hawaii at Hilo Hawaiian language college's rights, duties, powers, and functions to the Hawaiian language university college. Mandates the Hawaiian language university college and University of Hawaii at Hilo to enter into a memorandum of agreement by the end of the 2017-2018 academic year to establish shared operations and administration.

**TESTIMONY IN OPPOSITION** 

This bill tells the mo'olelo (story) of how a small program of Hawaiian language instruction has ballooned into an empire over the years with its own separate building, and now seeks to become an administratively separate institution. No longer happy to be a mere "college" inside the University of Hawaii at Hilo, the Hawaiian language program seeks to become an autonomous university unto itself and even to exercise authority over the use of Hawaiian language throughout all departments of the State government. Such megalomania! An old horror movie comes to mind: "The Monster that Devoured Cleveland."

U.S. Census data show that the most rapidly increasing ethnic group in Hawaii is Filipino, whose population in Hawaii is now larger than the ethnic Japanese due to large-scale immigration from the Philippines. There are probably a larger number of children whose primary language at home is either llocano or Tagalog, than the number whose primary language is Hawaiian. However, politically activist ethnic Hawaiian parents whose children are enrolled in Hawaiian language immersion programs take pride in telling the Census Bureau their aspiration that their children's primary language is Hawaiian (although that is doubtful); while Filipino immigrant parents seeking to assimilate to America might tell the Census Bureau their aspiration that their children's primary language is English (although in fact it is probably llocano or Tagalog).

There is no doubt that the most widely spoken language in Hawaii is English, both as the primary language at home and as the second language acquired by immigrants seeking assimilation for themselves and their children. Should that fact be used to justify not only a separate building for the English Department but also an administratively separate, autonomous University of English? How absurd is that concept!

The University of Hawaii has numerous departments devoted to teaching particular languages along with their respective literatures and

cultures. In addition to the languages of Hawaii's largest ethnic groups such as Filipino, Japanese, Chinese, and Korean, UH also teaches German, French, Spanish, etc. for students who wish to broaden their cultural awareness, do academic research in original sources, or prepare for careers in businesses operating internationally. Should the Japanese or German Department become an administratively separate, autonomous University of Japanese or German?

This bill HB950 is part of a much larger, and very dangerous, agenda of racial separatism and ethnic nationalism in Hawaii which seeks either to divide the lands and people of Hawaii along racial lines by creating a federally recognized Hawaiian tribe, or else to rip the 50th star off the flag and make Hawaii once again an independent nation.

A similar bill to rip apart the K-12 public school system along racial lines, SB2919, was actually introduced in the legislative session of 2002. It proposed to break off the Hawaiian-focus K-12 charter schools to create an autonomous Native Hawaiian race-based "public" school system. Mahalo nui for this opportunity to present testimony. I stand in strong opposition of House Bill 950 which seeks to create a Hawaiian language university college and transfer the University of Hawaii at Hilo Hawaiian language college's rights, duties, powers, and functions to a Hawaiian language university college.

Although the University of Hawaii at Hilo (UH-Hilo) offers Hawaiian language instructions and Hawaiian immersion education instructions, it is <u>not</u> the only university program offering instruction about and/or in the Hawaiian language.

- Kawaihuelani Center for Hawaiian Language, and Kamakauokalani Center for Hawaiian Studies at the University of Hawaii at Manoa offers undergraduate and graduate degrees in the Hawaiian Language and Hawaiian Studies.
  - Students learn Hawaiian language and culture then go on to engage in the language and culture as they progress through their programs of study.
- The College of Education at the University of Hawaii at Manoa offers graduate degrees in Hawaiian Language (Secondary), and Hawaiian Immersion (K-12) with teacher licensure.
  - Teacher candidates enter the teacher preparation programs with at least four (4) years of Hawaiian language education.
  - Hawaiian immersion teacher preparation programs places teacher candidates in Hawaiian immersion primary and/or secondary school settings where teacher candidates engage with school aged children in Hawaiian as the language of instruction.
- The University of Hawaii at West Oahu offers an undergraduate degree in the Hawaiian Language and Hawaiian Studies.
- The Community Colleges offer Hawaiian Studies Associate of Arts degrees carving pathways for students to further their education in a four (4) higher educational setting.

Lastly, we are still fortunate to have <u>one</u> native speaking community left in the <u>world</u> who continues to use Hawaiian as its main language of communication on a daily basis. There is a real concern that House Bill 950 could bring about a rapid change to Hawaiian without the need for input from this community, or concern for the effects that future language policy may have over them, the last community of native speakers.

The effort to normalize the Hawaiian language is a collective effort that is being addressed by the University of Hawaii at Manoa, West-Oahu, Hilo, our community colleges, our public and private schools, our communities, and it is definitely alive in homes. The Hawaiian language is not a creation of a school but is the voice of the people, and of Hawaii.

Again, I am strong opposition to HB950, and I thank you for your consideration of my testimony.
