#### COMMENTS:

The Consumer Advocate shares the legislature's concerns with potential cost impacts that customers must face related to their energy rates and bills. The Consumer Advocate notes that Hawaii has already adopted renewable portfolio standards benchmarks that target 100% by the year 2045.

Thus, the proposed resolution appears to be generally consistent with Hawaii's renewable portfolio standards objectives by encouraging the replacement of fossil fuels with renewable energy. The Consumer Advocate believes it is important, however, to ensure that fossil fuels are replaced by <u>cost-effective</u> renewable energy. It should be made clear that Hawaii is not encouraging the adoption of renewable energy at any cost; otherwise, Hawaii and its residents could face energy bills that are unnecessarily high. If energy bills increase because of the adoption of cost-ineffective renewable energy, this will result in adverse impacts on Hawaii's residents and businesses and, ultimately, the state's economy. Modification of the proposed resolution to make clear that Hawaii seeks cost-effective renewable energy would be consistent with Hawaii Revised Statute 269-92.
