SB 1013 RELATING TO TRANSPORTATION.

This bill proposes to allow the State Department of Transportation Highways Division to collect an equitable compensation from franchise utility companies for the use of the state right of way.

What this bill will do is take 50% of the tax that the counties collect as a franchise fee and decrease revenues for the Counties to operate and maintain our individual County roadway systems.

If the State Department of Transportation finds that they need to charge the electric companies a similar fee they could do that in such a way as to not take it from the Counties. I note that the State does not charge GET on electric bills, that's one place they could start.

Therefore, I strongly oppose the passage of this bill.

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This bill proposes to allow the State Department of Transportation Highways Division to collect an equitable compensation from franchise utility companies for the use of the state right of way.

This bill proposes to take 50% of the tax that the counties collect as a franchise fee and decrease revenues for the Counties to operate and maintain our individual County roadway systems. This revenue source has already been decreasing the last few years as the utility revenues continue to decline. There is already not enough funding to fix our 956 miles of roadways.

If the State Department of Transportation finds that they need to charge the electric companies a similar fee they could do that in such a way as to not take it from the Counties, such as increase the entire amount or percentage so that the counties would not collect any less than they are today.

We also noted that line 18 on page 1 through line 6 on page 2 were removed from the original statute. We believe that this inadvertently removes the calculation and therefore the mechanism to tax the utility companies.

Therefore, I strongly oppose the passage of this bill.
