In consideration of SENATE BILL 1240 RELATING TO AQUATIC LIFE

Senate Bill 1240 proposes to place a moratorium on aquarium fish permits until a definition of sustainable and sustainable practices and limits are proposed to the legislature and enacted. The Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) appreciates the intent of this measure to sustainably manage marine resources and offers the following comments. Further, the Department strongly opposes one provision of this measure and offers an amendment.

The Department has required commercial aquarium collectors to report monthly fishing effort information under Section 189-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), for over forty years. The Department has also collected extensive underwater visual survey data on the status of reef fishes along the Kona Coast of West Hawai'i Island for over fifteen years. A report of these surveys was submitted to the 2015 Legislature in compliance with Section 188F-5, HRS. The data indicates that the aquarium fishery is currently operating at a level that does not indicate significant population declines or major shifts in species diversity in areas where collecting is occurring.

The West Hawai'i Aquarium Project (WHAP) has been monitoring West Hawai'i reefs since 1999 and a number of long-term studies extend over multiple decades. Over 16 years of monitoring, a total of 70 survey divers have conducted over 6,700 transects for the WHAP project in addition to hundreds of other surveys for related projects. Fifteen years after closure, the population of Yellow Tang has increased 64.5% in the closed areas while its abundance in the open areas has not declined significantly. Overall Yellow Tang abundance in the 30'-60' depth range over the entire West Hawai'i coast has increased 58% (over 1.3 million fish) from 1999/2000 to 2012-2013 to a current population of 3.6 million fish.

The Department notes SECTION (c) (2) of this bill as written could be interpreted to entirely negate the Department's ability to effectively manage Hawai'i's fisheries. We presume this measure is only intended to address aquarium fishing, and not to restrict the Department's ability to manage the taking of fish. The Department strongly opposes this provision as written. The Department respectfully offers a suggested amendment as follows:

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(c) This Act shall not prohibit:
....
(2) The taking of fish or other aquatic life for human
consumption or for sale for human consumption,
including the taking of fish for bait; and

RE: SUPPORT for SB1240, Relating to Aquatic Life

The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) and Humane Society International (HSI), support SB1240 which would, if enacted, place a moratorium on issuance of aquarium fish collection permits until a definition of "sustainable," a policy for "sustainable collection practices," and collection limits, are proposed to the legislature and enacted. We sincerely thank the Committee for addressing this important matter that affects the lives of more than 700,000 animals per year. The bill also answers the call of the majority of Hawaii residents who, as shown in a <u>poll</u>, cited environmental concerns as the main reason for wanting to ban the collection of coral reef wildlife for the aquarium trade.

In 1998, a Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) State of the Reefs report listed the collection of fish for the aquarium trade as a major cause of coral reef degradation in Hawaii (DLNR, 1998). Since then, numerous studies have documented substantial population declines of between 45 to 90 percent in certain reef fish species heavily targeted by the trade on Oahu and Hawaii Island (UH Hilo/DAR, 1998; Tissot and Hallacher, 2003; DAR/HCRI-RP, 2007; DLNR/DAR 2010; DLNR/DAR 2015; Grabowsky, in prep).

In 2000, approximately 32% of West Hawaii reefs were closed to collection of fish for the aquarium trade. In these closed areas, studies have since shown population size increases for some, but not all, of the top 10 targeted species (DLNR/DAR 2010; DLNR/DAR 2015). In stark contrast, these same studies confirm that fish population sizes are significantly diminished in the 68% of West Hawaii reefs that remain open to aquarium trade collection. Moreover, since the areas were closed, the number of fish collected for the aquarium trade in West Hawaii has steadily increased and has now reached enormous proportions; to wit, at least 3.5 times more fish are taken in West Hawaii than are taken from the entire Great Barrier Reef, which comprises an area that is 21 times greater than Hawaii's entire land mass (The State of Queensland, 2011).

This increased, and increasing, collection pressure on the 68% of West Hawaii reefs that remain open to aquarium trade collection shows no sign of slowing down and poses a serious threat to the health of fish populations and the coral reef itself.

Aquarium fish catch reports since 1976 demonstrate the depletion by the aquarium trade of the most heavily targeted fish species. For example, five butterflyfish species were among the top ten fishes targeted by the trade in 1976. In 2008, DLNR's Division of Aquatic Resources (DAR) reported that butterflyfish abundance on some parts of West Hawaii had declined by an average of 70 percent, and the teardrop butterflyfish, formerly among the top ten, had declined by 90 percent (DAR, 2008). By 2014, just one of these five butterflyfishes still held a spot among the top ten most captured fishes: the forcepsfish / longnose butterflyfish, though reported catch had declined by 83 percent since 1976. Indeed, between 1980 and 2014, catch of these five butterflyfish species declined by a startling 74 percent; this is an indication of severe unsustainable take for the aquarium trade.

A second compelling example of catch reports documenting fish population changes comes from leeward Oahu where yellow tang populations collapsed in the 1980s as a result of hurricanes and over-collection (Walsh et al., 2004). While yellow tang catch began to inch up about a decade ago, it is still 75 percent lower than before the crash (Walsh et al., 2004; DLNR, 2013).

Yet despite the foregoing evidence, those who oppose measures and rules aimed at restoring and protecting Hawaii's coral reefs, and protecting them from the collection of animals for the aquarium trade, claim that such collection "sustainable."

In fisheries management terms, "sustainable" typically refers to "maximum sustainable yield" (MSY), which is the highest possible annual catch that can be sustained by a species over time. In some cases, populations may be reduced by up to 80 percent and the catch may still be considered "sustainable." But this terminology does not take into account the role of the species in its ecosystem and negative impact on ecosystem function when populations of one or more species are reduced to such an extent. In complex ecosystems such as coral reefs, the reduction of a population of one fish—such as an herbivore that plays an important role in keeping algae from covering coral—can have negative, cascading effects on the function and resiliency of the entire reef ecosystem. This, in turn, will not only negatively impact the coral reef ecosystem but the people who rely on that ecosystem.

Indeed, Hawaii's aquarium fishery exploits nearshore, shallow coral reefs. Areas impacted by this trade are literally extensions of the human communities adjacent to them and may be no more than a stone's throw away. Community members and other stakeholders are intimately linked to these reefs and derive numerous socio-economic benefits from them (HCRI-NOAA, 2008). The diminished fish populations and degraded reefs that result from the collection for the aquarium trade, though described by some as "sustainable," in fact seriously harm the benefits associated with healthy, abundant and beautiful coral reefs.

DLNR's Division of Aquatic Resources (DAR) leadership has recently called into question the sustainability of the collection of fish for the aquarium trade. In October 2014, a BLNR meeting was held on a rule proposal fashioned by the aquarium trade to set so-called "limits" on their activities. One of the proposed limits was to allow take of 100 immature yellow tang per person per day (with no limits on the number of people doing so). The HSUS/HSI, environmental organizations, and community members voiced strong opposition to the rule package for its lack of meaningful change and maintenance of the status quo. In an unprecedented move, DAR's administrator and respected marine biologist, Frazer McGilvray, also submitted testimony in opposition. Mr. McGilvray testified on the unsustainability of the proposed rules, noting that:

- "The majority of yellow tang taken by the trade are immature and have not contributed to the future of the species. The take of juveniles is generally prohibited."
- "The proposal to allow take of 100 immature yellow tang per person per day, is driven by the demands of the trade and is contrary to good natural resource management. There appears to be no scientific basis for the proposed bag limits for each species."
- "The proposed rule is akin to setting a speed limit at 400 MPH."
- Community input is key but their concerns have been completely ignored.

BLNR approved the rule package despite strong opposition, but at the request of two board members, an agreement was made to explore additional steps in informal meetings with stakeholders (including The HSUS and HSI) and scientists who had been left out of the process. Two separate meetings of stakeholders and scientists were subsequently held in the following months. After one of the meetings, acting DAR administrator Alton Miyasaka disseminated notes from the meeting to the stakeholders demonstrating that DAR does not know what sustainable means or how it should be measured:

"...The main management questions remained unanswered. Those questions are, <u>What does sustainable mean, how do you measure it, what are the management</u> <u>goals, and how do you know if you are meeting those goals</u>" (emphasis added).

SB 1240 will ensure that until these basic management questions are answered, no permits to collect fish for the aquarium trade will be issued.

Before closing, we would like to point out that the bill only addresses collection of fish for the aquarium trade; whereas, invertebrates are also collected for this trade. Invertebrates feed on algae, waste and other debris, provide calcium carbonate, key to reef development and protection against impacts of ocean acidification, and perform other essential ecosystem services necessary for healthy coral reefs. Known as "clean-up crews" in the aquarium hobby, these hermit crabs, sea cucumbers and feather-dusters are taken for the same services they provide, over the course of shortened lives, in tanks. These invertebrates are not captured with nets but, instead, are plucked by hand from their environments. Those taking invertebrates are not required to obtain an aquarium fish permit under HRS 188-31. We, therefore, suggest the bill be amended to

prohibit collection of invertebrates for the aquarium trade.

HSUS and HSI sincerely thank the Committee for taking up this important matter. *We urge the Committee to pass SB1240* and to consider amending it to include all marine life taken for aquarium purposes and restore wildlife abundance and health to Hawaii's reefs.

Dear Honorable Members of the Hawai`i State Legislature:

On behalf of the 232 accredited member institutions of the Association of Zoos and Aquariums (AZA), we would like to take this opportunity to express our concerns regarding SB 1240, which would place a moratorium on the issuance of commercial aquarium fish permits. We respectfully submit that if this bill were to pass, it would impact greatly the ability of AZA-accredited aquariums and zoos to educate and inspire millions of visitors with compelling exhibits that showcase the natural beauty of marine life and habitats, including coral reefs and coral reef fishes.

AZA is a non-profit organization dedicated to the advancement of accredited zoos and aquariums in the areas of animal care and husbandry, conservation, education, science and recreation. With more than 186 million visitors to 232 accredited zoos, aquariums, nature centers, and science centers, AZA's focus on connecting people and animals provides a critical link to helping animals in their native habitats.

AZA zoos and aquariums are committed to conserving the world's oceans for future generations of Americans and people around the globe. We do this by educating our audiences about issues related to ocean health, and encourage them to join us in reducing threats to fragile ocean ecosystems and wildlife. This is very important as a National Research Council study found that people learn as much as 90% of their science in informal settings such as accredited zoos and aquariums. We strongly believe that our message of respect, wonder and appreciation of the natural world contributes significantly to coral reef conservation and management.

AZA-accredited zoos and aquariums fully understand, recognize, respect, and support Hawai`i's desire to maintain its unique and diverse coral reef habitat. We also acknowledge Hawai`i's marine aquarium fishery to be well-studied and well-managed. The fishery is a model for similar aquarium fisheries management programs around the world. We applaud the numerous efforts underway by state, federal and private organizations to accurately determine the health of this fragile ecosystem. Sustainably managed fisheries have a long-term positive impact by helping to assure that generations of children visiting our member institutions and viewing the species acquired from these fisheries will be inspired to a lifetime of proactive stewardship of all our collective marine resources.

Thirty years ago, opponents of fish collecting warned that Hawai`i's fish species were going extinct from overcollecting. Today, with excellent management from the State of Hawai`i, none of Hawaii's fish species is close to endangered or threatened status. Current management practices are working as intended. Coastal fisheries can be managed by monitoring fishermen and establishing protected areas where no fishing is allowed. In the tropics, many reef fishes spawn thousands of eggs every day throughout the year, and the eggs and larvae are widely distributed, including to areas where fish collecting is permitted. This is the management system that allows extraction to continue on a sustainable basis.

The AZA and its members consider themselves to be partners with the State of Hawai'i and its counties in conserving your natural resources. We have the well-documented ability to speak to hundreds of millions of visitors annually about marine conservation needs. AZA-accredited facilities agree that a common-sense regulatory approach that governs the humane take, the husbandry and transport of coral reef species in a fully sustainable manner is a required step in enhancing the coral reef fishery populations throughout the State.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide input on these important decisions.

I'm Robert Wintner with Snorkel Bob's, and I support SB 1240. For many years aquarium collectors opposed a ban on claims of livelihood and sustainability.

Now, current aquarium collector permits can stand, if DLNR develops a comprehensive, sustainable management plan with regard to aquarium take. DLNR has yet to define sustainable. DLNR has never defined sustainable.

The State of Hawaii must stop issuing aquarium-collector permits. Existing permits should be non-transferable in any way.

SB 1240 should not be a limited entry bill to benefit existing collectors but a means to let the aquarium trade fade from Hawaii reefs.

Mainland aquarium interests will oppose this bill, calling themselves Hawaii reef stakeholders, but they're out for the money, with no stake in maintenance or pono management.

Hawaii has a Hawaii's billion dollar reef tourism industry. If SB 1240 becomes law, tourism will surge in numbers and in quality. Informed travelers want to visit a reef state with a mind for reef recovery, a reef state free of aquarium extraction, on the road to reef recovery. DLNR continues with alternate facts, beginning with \$2 million gross aquarium revenue in Hawaii. It's a trade famous for non-reporting, and that is the equivalent of poaching. Dear Members of the Senate Committee on Water and Land,

Thank you for your consideration of the impacts of aquarium trade in Hawai'i. I am writing in support of SB 1240. Protecting the marine resources of Hawai'i should be a priority for a state whose critical economic tourism industry depends upon them. Hawai'i is a major supplier for the aquarium trade (Tissot & Hallacher, 2003; Walsh et al., 2003). This is of potential concern as Hawai'i's collection restrictions are minimal, and maximum sustainable yields for Hawaiian ornamentals are lacking (Ogawa, & Brown, 2001). Further, the accuracy of ornamental catch reporting in Hawai'i is questionable (Rhyne et al., 2012; Tissot & Hallacher, 2003; Walsh, 2000) and can sometimes go undocumented as a result of legal loopholes regarding dealer reporting (Walsh, 2015). There is some evidence indicating the aquarium trade has impacted Hawai'i fish populations. For example, the Achilles tang (*Acanthurus achilles*), an ecologically unsustainable species by the Sustainable Aquarium Industry Association (SAIA), is the third most collected species in Hawai'i (Walsh, 2015).

In this letter I will share data and findings from a recent piece of relevant research I have conducted focusing on a testimony analysis of all 1,652 testimonies submitted for HB 873 in 2015. After removing duplicate testimony, there were a total of 1,455 usable testimonies. This research was presented at an international academic conference in October of 2016, and was invited to be part of a special issue journal. The research and findings have since been submitted as a complete manuscript to *Tourism Geographies*, and are currently under peer review. Additionally, I will be presenting again on the areas of dissension of stakeholder groups surrounding the aquarium industry at an international conference this June. In this letter I will summarize the research findings relevant to SB1240 in attempt to broaden the debate on the importance of the state's marine resources. For brevity, I will focus solely on the issue of sustainability as revealed by the aforementioned research.

Sustainability appeared as a key issue for both the opposition and the supporters of HB 873, yet, for different reasons. In general, the opposition viewed the aquarium trade as sustainable. "Science", as perceived by the opposition refers to findings from specific studies out of Hawai'i (e.g., Tissot et al., 2009; Walsh et al., 2003; Walsh, 2015). These studies, demonstrated or referenced positive results for *some* measured species (e.g., increase in yellow tang populations) from active management in the form of fish replenishment areas (FRAs) or ecosystem-based management (EBM), yet, all of the referenced studies disclosed limitations of the current science and/or regulations and enforcement. Support testimony came from nearly every continent and was widely distributed across the USA. This compares to the opposition who was representation was mostly localized to Hawai'i. Monetarily, tourism sales are estimated annually at \$25.2 billion (HTA, 2016), while the aquarium industry has been valued at \$3.2 million (Hawaii Coral Reef Initiative, N.D.). This discrepancy in economic value and impact demonstrates an urgent need to better understand the sustainability of the aquarium trade and its potentially detrimental impact on the state's tourism industry.

Dear Members of the Senate Committee on Water and Land,

Thank you for your consideration of the impacts of aquarium trade in Hawai'i. I am writing in support of SB 1240. Protecting the marine resources of Hawai'i should be a priority for a state whose critical economic tourism industry depends upon them. Hawai'i is a major supplier for the aquarium trade (Tissot & Hallacher, 2003; Walsh et al., 2003). This is of potential concern as Hawai'i's collection restrictions are minimal, and maximum sustainable yields for Hawaiian ornamentals are lacking (Ogawa, & Brown, 2001). Further, the accuracy of ornamental catch reporting in Hawai'i is questionable (Rhyne et al., 2012; Tissot & Hallacher, 2003; Walsh, 2000) and can sometimes go undocumented as a result of legal loopholes regarding dealer reporting (Walsh, 2015). There is some evidence indicating the aquarium trade has impacted Hawai'i fish populations. For example, the Achilles tang (*Acanthurus achilles*), an ecologically unsustainable species by the Sustainable Aquarium Industry Association (SAIA), is the third most collected species in Hawai'i (Walsh, 2015).

In this letter I will share data and findings from a recent piece of relevant research I have conducted focusing on a testimony analysis of all 1,652 testimonies submitted for HB 873 in 2015. After removing duplicate testimony, there were a total of 1,455 usable testimonies. This research was presented at an international academic conference in October of 2016, and was invited to be part of a special issue journal. The research and findings have since been submitted as a complete manuscript to *Tourism Geographies*, and are currently under peer review. Additionally, I will be presenting again on the areas of dissension of stakeholder groups surrounding the aquarium industry at an international conference this June. In this letter I will summarize the research findings relevant to SB1240 in attempt to broaden the debate on the importance of the state's marine resources. For brevity, I will focus solely on the issue of sustainability as revealed by the aforementioned research.

Sustainability appeared as a key issue for both the opposition and the supporters of HB 873, yet, for different reasons. In general, the opposition viewed the aquarium trade as sustainable. "Science", as perceived by the opposition refers to findings from specific studies out of Hawai'i (e.g., Tissot et al., 2009; Walsh et al., 2003; Walsh, 2015). These studies, demonstrated or referenced positive results for *some* measured species (e.g., increase in yellow tang populations) from active management in the form of fish replenishment areas (FRAs) or ecosystem-based management (EBM), yet, all of the referenced studies disclosed limitations of the current science and/or regulations and enforcement. The Pet Industry Joint Advisory Council (PIJAC) appreciates the opportunity to offer our views regarding SB 1240, a bill that would place an indefinite moratorium on fishing for the aquarium trade, to the Senate Committee on Water and Land. As the country's largest pet trade association, representing the interests of all segments of the pet industry throughout the United States, PIJAC counts among its members national associations, organizations, corporations and individuals involved in the commercial pet trade. More specifically, PIJAC represents the interests of pet stores, suppliers, distributors, pet supply manufacturers, breeders, retailers and pet owners throughout the state of Hawaii and across the country.

Let me start by saying that nobody cares more about healthy and safe pets than do PIJAC and our members. We have for many years provided a well-respected animal care certification program that is widely utilized by not only persons in the commercial pet trade but shelters, humane societies and institutes of higher education as well. Our association has long been recognized as the voice for a responsible pet trade, and we routinely advocate legislative and regulatory proposals establishing governmental mandates where appropriate to advance the public interest and welfare of pets and the environment. PIJAC works closely with US Department of Agriculture and Department of the Interior to ensure effective enforcement of the federal Animal Welfare Act, management of threatened or endangered species and control of invasive species, and have since its inception. We regularly work with federal and state agencies as well as local governments to advance animal welfare and environmental interests.

In this case, a moratorium would be no less destructive than a ban. The idea that the state of Hawaii would kill an entire trade and shut down Hawaiian businesses that have been responsibly operating for decades is unfathomable. To justify the killing of an entire industry, this legislation cherry picks data describing a 2014 drop in the populations of some species of fish while ignoring the fact that populations have been climbing for years and that they rebounded in 2015.

SB1240 asserts that the risk of over-exploitation of marine species is high. In fact, the Hawaii Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) found that the West Hawaii "no-aquarium collecting"

Fish Replenishment Areas (FRAs), implemented in 1999, have been very successful in increasing populations of Yellow Tang (Zebrasoma flavescens) — the most heavily targeted aquarium fish accounting for 84% of the total catch. Fifteen years after closure, the population of Yellow Tang has increased 64.5% in the FRAs while their abundance in the Open Areas has not declined significantly." Overall Yellow Tangs have increased substantially with a current population in excess of 3.6 million fish. Further, aquarium fisheries harvest the plentiful juvenile fish rather than mature adults, further protecting the ability of the different species to reproduce. In fact, the DLNR, based upon the effectiveness of the West Hawai'i FRAs for aquarium fish, recommends that it establish MPAs for non-aquarium fish species. The data clearly show that Hawaii's current management practices are resulting in increased, not decreased, fish populations.

Hawaii's aquarium industry is considered one of the best regulated near-shore fishery in the world. The DLNR, pursuant to State law, submits a report every five years to the legislature entitled "Relating to the West Hawaii Regional Fishery Management Area." The 2015 Report found that the "The Hawaii marine aquarium fishery is currently the most economically valuable commercial inshore fishery in the State with FY 2014 reported landings greater than \$2.3 million." The regulatory mechanisms covering the Hawaiian aquarium fishery supports the tenets of the sustainable use of renewable natural resources supported in the IUCN's Policy Statement on sustainable use. PIJAC strongly opposes SB1240 and encourages the Senate Committee on Water and Land to side with science over unfounded accusations. We ask that the committee decline to take up, or defeat, SB1240.

I disagree with a ceasement of activity albeit temporary on the grounds that you will cause severe disruption to the income of the coastal community I am in agreement that the fishery does need addressing (less so than the food fish industry) and such practices as needle decompression and other handling issues that increase what should be absolutely minimal losses. An enforceable bill of reasonable minimum standards of practice and record keeping would be more productive to all. It would also remove unscrupulous collectors and exporters from the picture and allow for a better vetting of new licenses. It is important that the state works very closely with the qualitative and quantitative data (two years of which is absent from this bill) It is also important that the state works in conjunction with and not against the coastal community. Size quotas can be implemented with immediate effect so that breeding animals are not removed from the reef. I would make the suggestion for example that yellow tangs are not taken above the size of 3 inches length inclusive of tail as these fish are of an age that the population doubling time can easily keep up with so long as habitat remains intact. Mortality rates for reef fish species extracted from our reefs panges from 80-99% within a year of capture, for example.

About forty years ago, DLNR did plan to put a moratorium on the commercial collection of reef wildlife before it got started, so the potential consequences could be studied. That plan was reversed, by Governor Ariyoshi, so the industry could operate and then be studied. Since then, the State government has refused to study the impacts and has gone so far as to claim that the state doesn't have to study the impacts because there are none. In addition, DLNR maintains that Hawai`i has the best-managed and sustainable, aquarium fishery. Nothing could be further from the truth - which says a lot in today's times.

The legalization of commercial extraction of wildlife so aquarium collectors can make money is <u>not</u> <u>sustainable as there are no meaningful limits</u> (while a permit is required for fish, there is no limit on the number of permittees and no meaningful limit on the numbers of each fish species) and there is <u>not even a</u> <u>definition of sustainable</u>; the commercial activities are certainly not managed as there is no program, no limits, no environmental review and practically no enforcement (it's all industry self reporting). To add insult to injury, the lack of a program, rules or enforcement means that <u>illegal traffickers go unchecked</u>.

At a previous hearing, representatives from DLNR could not defend the state's (1) total lack of any definition of sustainable; (2) written materials about the state's reef wildlife collection program (there are none); (3) absence of any rules or practices to prevent conflicts of interest (such as having the person in charge of commercial aquarium collection being a commercial aquarium collector himself); and (4) failure to respond to the Environmental Council's October 2015, letter urging DLNR to take immediate action to address the scientific proof of risks to our reefs and wildlife by issuing a temporary moratorium on commercial collection (the agency said no problem, in the future, we will do a study on coral bleaching). The DLNR continues to defend not just the status quo, but the unbridled, unregulated expansion of commercial aquarium collection of Hawai`i reef wildlife — despite the fact that reef wildlife **p**pidly disappearing.

This is the <u>opposite of how our host culture traditionally managed the nearshore waters</u> and in stark contrast to the Kumulipo, which recognizes the importance of, and cherishes, corals and reef wildlife from the beginning of time.

This issue is not rocket science; <u>basic economic theory predicts the consequences</u> of unregulated human behavior when there is a market for a public good (our coral reef wildlife): scarcity, inefficiency and depletion of resources. We all know this is true — if something is free and people can sell it for good money, it's <u>only a matter of time before it disappears</u>. And there is proof beyond the science and the numbers: if you ask any old timer or anyone who has spent time in the water observing the reefs and wildlife, they will tell you — there are hardly anymore fish, eels, shrimp and even hermit crab. <u>Gone are</u> <u>the animals and vibrant abundance so many still remember</u> (remnants can be found in small protected **a**reas, such as Hanauma Bay).

DLNR does not have the resources (i.e., funding and staff) to in any way manage, regulate or study and prevent devastation caused by commercial aquarium collectors, including the illegal traffickers. Even if DLNR were capable of managing commercial extraction activities, it is too late for them to try as there is not enough abundance left. Our reefs and the wildlife have been decimated, and hurricanes, climate change and ocean acidification are only increasing the die off of coral reefs and disappearance of species abundance, perhaps their existence entirely. It's not too late for our wildlife, however. Now is the time to change State policy, protect what we have left and witness a return of abundance of wildlife and coral in **q**ur nearshore, coastal waters.

<u>Commercial interests and the public interest strongly coincide</u> and require this devastating commercial extraction for aquarium collectors end. Looking at the economic costs and benefits, <u>there is no question</u> that the value of our reef wildlife to tourism and other ecosystem benefits far outweighs the aquarium <u>collection values</u>. Many businesses benefit from, depend on and thrive because of our coral reefs. Also, there will be additional future benefits to the economy and our environment if the commercial aquarium trade and trafficking ends because there will be an incentive to research and invest in growing fish and reef animals; now, there is no incentive because it's free to collect the wildlife from our reefs. Ending commercial collection of reef wildlife for aquarium collectors will also benefit the millions of living **q** reatures that inhabit, or should inhabit, our nearshore reefs.

The existing active permit holders have a right they don't want to lose, and I understand that. Their interests can be addressed in a variety of ways, however, and they pale in comparison to the many reasons commercial collection and trafficking of Hawai'i reef wildlife for the aquarium industry should end immediately.

The future depends on you.

The %33 percent Kona West Hawaii FRA aquarium fish closure and its success is not required for the rest of the state. The larger area of the big island fishery made it practical there. To do the same for other islands is counterproductive and just forces fishermen into less areas creating greater impact on any remaining open areas. Less area means less rotation of fishing spots and more impact not less.

We already have around 30% closure. Of the Main Hawaiian Islands another 30 percent is protected by Sanctuaries, Marine Protected Areas, Fish Replenishment Areas (FRA), Marine Life Conservation Districts (MCLD), Refuges, Fishery Management Areas (FMA), National Monuments, restricted military areas and the strictest laws of any State in the United States.

The vast majority of the Hawaiian Island shores are untouched by fishing and diving. High surf in the winter closes northern shores of all islands for many months. Summer surf affects southern shores. High winds from the east, for most of the year shut down east shores for diving. Poor accessibility too many areas due to distance, lack of harbors and roads, ensures these areas remain untouched. More than 90% of Hawaii is not impacted by fishing! Almost all of Hawaiian waters receive periods of "no catch" due to weather and inaccessibility. Untouched areas are already in place.

Most of isles' coral recover from mass bleaching (Corals did not bleach last year and nearly all recovered state wide!)

HONOLULU (HawaiiNewsNow) -

It's being called a spawning event of "Biblical" proportions -- a summer swarm of fish over Hawaii's reefs. Aquarium fisherman and underwater photographer Ron Tubbs shot video off Oahu's coastline showing the population explosion.

"I made a special trip last week to see it and video it myself. It really is unlike anything anyone has ever seen," Rene Umberger said. Even **dive shop owner**, anti fishing activists agree there lots tons of reef fish right now all across Hawaii.

"In 35 years this is the most fish I have ever seen. For most species, it's just incredible. It's just amazing. Areas where you see hundreds of fish normally, that's a lot of fish for an area, you're seeing thousands of fish," Ron Tubbs said "This year the numbers are just exceptional." What about Aquarium fishing in Hawaii?

January 2014 saw the new Kona aquarium fish rules go into law. Aquarium fishermen and Kona DLNR scientists created stricter laws for an already sustainably fishery. Dr. Bill Walsh now advocates for these fishermen due to their cooperation and efforts to maintain fish populations. The same thing has been done on Oahu with the DLNR researchers there. The Oahu DLNR scientists also believe we are already sustainable but agree further regulations can help to protect our reef fish. The Oahu rules should go in to effect sometimes in 2015. As a result we have wide spread support from many members of Hawaii's legislature, DNLR and UH scientists and even private eco groups who once opposed us. Aquarium fishermen continue to work with researchers to make it the greatest sustainably fishery in the world. The oceans belong to all and to protect them and preserve it wonders is the job of all ocean users.

What do Hawaii's ocean researchers say about aquarium fish collecting?

Here are some shortened quotes from Public testimony Hawaii County Council testimony 2014, Hawaii news now and West Hawaii Today news excerpts.

Dr. Bill Walsh October 2014:

In my capacity as the West Hawai'i Aquatic Biologist for the Division of Aquatic Resources I have been involved in the management and biological monitoring of the West Hawai'i aquarium fishery for over 15 years.

I would like to share with you some of the results of our latest monitoring efforts as they relate to the issue at hand. Two species, the Yellow Tang and Kole make up over 93% of all aquarium fish caught in West Hawai'i. Since the no-aquarium collecting Fish Replenishment Areas (FRAs) were established in 1999 (protecting 35% of the coastline), the numbers of Yellow Tang have increased in the FRAs by almost 65% while not significantly decreasing in the remaining Open Areas. In the 30'-60' depth range alone, the numbers of Yellow Tang in West Hawai'i have increased by 1.3 million fish. Similarly Kole populations have increased not only in the FRAs (by 24%) but also in the Open Areas as well (by 28%). Kole populations in the same depth range have increased by over 2 million fish! Clearly resource management efforts are working in West Hawai'i.

Scientific studies which have indeed found high levels of mortality among aquarium fishes have typically been conducted in remote areas with poor handling capabilities. That is clearly not the case in Hawai'i.

Dr. Dan Polhemus:

It is a good thing for folks to scrutinize and ask questions about what's going on in our fisheries and on our reefs. These are important to all of us. A realistic perspective does need to be maintained however. Let me elaborate. On Maui in 2009 there were a total of 16,300 aquarium animals caught, representing 82 different species. Yellow tangs accounted for 69% while Kole was 7% of the catch. During that same year non-aquarium commercial fishers captured (and killed) 319,491 reef fishes of 75 species. While yellow tangs weren't caught to any degree there was considerable overlap in a number of the other species. To the commercial food catch one can add another 480,000 reef fish taken by recreational/subsistence fishers (extrapolated from 2006 NOAA Rec Fishing Survey data). So, in the grand scheme of things, the aquarium take on Maui is literally a drop in the bucket, representing less than 2% of the total mortality of reef animals that year. This serves to point out that undue focus and hyperbole about aquarium collecting and its impact on the reefs is dangerously shortsighted and counterproductive. We need to think and act holistically.

Hope I didn't overwhelm you with numbers. (as of 2014 no aquarium fish collectors were taking fish on Maui and the number of collectors state wide have decreased and so has catch.)

Emily S. Munday, M.S.

For my master's research at Washington State University, I studied the West Hawaii aquarium trade from 2010-2012. Part of my study focused on holding and transport of live yellow tang in the West Hawaii aquarium trade.

My research on fish holding and transport indicated that the practices implemented by Hawaiian fish exporters do not cause mortality in yellow tang. In June of 2012, I collaborated with fishers and exporters in Kona, and caught 60 yellow tang from the reef, held them in a working export facility, and shipped them from Kona, HI to Portland, OR. The fish were then transported to the Hatfield Marine Science Center in Newport, OR where they resided for 6 months. My study shows 100% survival rate of these tangs during collection, holding in the export facility, air transport, and after a 6-month holding period. In fact, the fish have now become part of an exhibit at the Hatfield Marine Science Center about sustainability in the aquarium trade and I have received no reports of mortality after 2.5 years.

As far as aquarium related mortality in Hawaii goes here's a quote from a Cesar 2002 study "Mortality rates of aquarium fish are low and have gone down considerably since the last survey in 1984. Currently, mortality rates from collection to wholesaler are estimated at 0 to 1 percent. In the wholesaler's tanks, mortality rates range from close to 0% up to 2%. During shipment, rates range from 0.75% to 2%. This give a current total of between 1% and 5%, down from a range of 5% to 8% in the early 1980's (van Poolen and Obara, 1984; estimates of wholesalers and collectors, own study).

These studies quoted are old and much better technology and care techniques now exist so we are sure it is an even lower rate today. Decreased transport times due to better roads and more airline flights make it even easier to ship shipments with no DOA at all. Life extension techniques are used by the hobbyist at all times. Customers demand such care. Life spans of fish can be greatly increased in captivity. Many aquarium fish hobbyists tout their ability to increase fish pets life spans. Several cases have pet fish owners keeping fish alive for 15 years.

Life span of the average fish in the wild can be very short. Without enough food and the predators eating many smaller fish survivability to adult breeding state is only 2%. In 2014 a much bigger percentage survived due to increases in plankton due mainly to changes in currents. If the food is there the 1-5 million fry per adult pair spawning can result in astronomical population growth. This has resulted in biblical increases in fish populations in fall of 2014.

A few species like Angels only produce 10,000 fry per spawning which is way below the norm for most reef fish. Even those species are doing great in population numbers. Fish are very efficient breeders.

Tina Owens executive director of the LOST FISH Coalition, Member West Hawaii Fisheries Council says:

A great deal of the "sky is falling" news you've heard about the reef recently is just plain not true. Try giving credit to the thousands of volunteer hours given by your neighbors to the West Hawaii Fisheries Council to get the gains you are now free to enjoy. (done with the help of Aquarium Fishermen on the council who agreed to the laws)

Lost Fish Coalition, through the venue of the West Hawaii Fisheries Council, has been working with many stakeholders to get a reasonable settlement to the long-standing problem of the aquarium industry harvest. In almost 16 years, we have accomplished the following management actions:

• We have 55-plus miles of coastline where reef fish cannot be taken. These areas allow the fish to grow large enough to be very successful breeders. These areas — Fish Replenishment Areas — are the nurseries for the reef fish to spread out to the rest of the reefs.

Thanks to these measures, West Hawaii has more fish than most every other widely accessed reef in the state, especially the beautiful ornamentals that give tourists and residents so much delight. If someone says that nothing has been done in West Hawaii, they are either lying, unaware or are being duped by someone else's lies about the situation. There are a few "outsiders," by which I mean people who don't live here, who have decided that West Hawaii doesn't know what it's doing. This group, headed by Maui resident Robert Wintner, and Wintner's frontman Rene Umberger, decided it was going to be the ones to get aquarium collecting banned, to make themselves the "rescuers of the reef."

Clearly if the goal is to get rid of the industry and management prevents that goal being reached, then discrediting the benefits and successes of management would seem the only way left to go. And so they have taken that path.

They have held community meetings and displayed a lot of false or twisted data, quoting from papers outdated by more than 15 years, and "re-interpreting" data from scientific papers. They have been telling people that "there are no fish left," which is patently untrue. I once had a woman tell me with great passion and assurance that there are no fish left anywhere in West Hawaii. I asked her why she thought that, and she replied that everyone knew it. I asked if she swam in the ocean. No. Did she dive? No. Did she know anything about the management strategies in place? No. She had, however, just come from an "information session" in which she heard these things from Wintner's frontman Rene Umberger.

Which brings me back to the wide-screen TV. The TV runs a 90-minute loop of undisturbed, natural activity of fish on the reef. Apparently, the footage was filmed on West Hawaii reefs. The article states: "Wintner praised the videos. 'It shows what abundance looks like,' Wintner said." At least he got that right.

It wasn't unusual to see a very large great barracuda or a couple of white-tip reef sharks just hanging out at about 25 feet as well. Now it really isn't that much different than snorkeling at Kam Point. It is obvious to me what is happening and it is unconscionable! The aquarium trade is literally raping our near-shore waters! 98% of saltwater aquarium fish are wild caught! I beleive an immediate moratorium on ALL aguarium trade activities are crucial to the health of all of Hawaii's near shore waters. Please consider doing all in your power to stop the extraction of reef wildlife from Maui county. Opposition to Bill SB1240

February 15, 2017

Chair Rhoads and committee members,

My name is Dennis Yamaguchi and I am opposed to bill SB1240. While I am relieved the Legislature read the Report on the Findings and Recommendations of Effectiveness of the West Hawai'i Regional Fishery Management Area" (I'2014 DLNR Report"), there are some statements I wish to comment on.

On page one, line 6, for example, bill SB1240 claims "populations of nearshore fish have disappeared". I have read the report three times and have not found this statement anywhere.

While sustainability was not defined in the report, it is part of reason for the existence of the West Hawaii Regional Fishery Management Area. The following is an excerpt found on page nine:

Act 306, SLH 1998 established a West Hawai'i Regional Fishery Management Area along the entire west coast of the Island of Hawai'i (§188F-4, HRS). Overall, the purposes of Act 306 were to:

(1) Effectively manage fishery activities to ensure sustainability;

- (2) Enhance nearshore resources;
- (3) Minimize conflicts of use in this coastal area.

As evidence of the success of the sustainability plan in Act 306, the following results were offered on page three:

-The FRAs have been very successful in increasing Yellow Tang populations. Fifteen years after closure, the population of Yellow Tang has increased 64.5% in the FRAs while its abundance in the Open Areas has not declined significantly.

-Overall Yellow Tang abundance in the 30'-60' depth range over the entire West Hawai'i coast has increased by over 1.3 million fish from 1999/2000 to 2012-2013 to a current population of 3.6 million fish.

-Two of three sites at long-term studies in South Kohala and South Kona have found Yellow Tang populations have increased to levels found over three decades ago before the expansion of aquarium collecting.

Lastly the following quote from page nine gives special insight into how Act 306 addresses the notion of the socioeconomic well being of the people mention in lines three and four, page 3, SB1240:

"Additionally, Act 306, SLH 1998, also provided for "substantive involvement of the community in resource management decisions." This mandate was a unique and key aspect of the legislation which allowed the community to actively participate in the development of resource management actions. This approach was at once both innovative and far-reaching. As noted by Maurin and Peck (2008)¹ "The Act's requirement for 'substantive' community input before management decisions can be taken to achieve the goals has been described as 'revolutionary.' It required, explicitly and for the first time, that the state agency regulating ocean use go beyond the standard public hearings which often occur late in the rule-writing process, and engage in active and ongoing consultation with its constituents."

Please do not pass SB1240.

Comments: Aloha Chair and Committee Members, I am a scientist and have been working on sustainability issues for a long time, most recently on fishery improvement projects. I got certified as Scuba Instructor in Hawaii and during my more than 600 dives around the Hawaiian Islands, many times equipped with my UW camera, I learned even more to appreciate the beauty of our reefs. Reefs are already increasingly threatened by factors like global warming, ocean acidification, and land-based pollution. On top of that, reef wildlife, primarily herbivores are being removed in unlimited numbers for aquarium purposes. Herbivores like tangs are proven to be vital for reef balance, reef resilience and recovery as they prevent excess algae growth. The targeted wildlife is juvenile Yellow Tangs which are more susceptible to cumulative trauma, like injuries, stress, starvation, toxic chemicals, and poor water conditions during a long and complex supply chain. Many die and to offset the losses, more fish are taken. Reported landings of 2010 are 990 000 with catch report compliance low and regulations unenforced. These numbers impact the health of our reefs. Our reefs are imperative not only for Hawaiian culture and values but also for one of the state's largest industries, tourism. The economic value of healthy reefs for the local people by far surpasses the value of a trade that removes wildlife in unlimited numbers and for free and serves an off-island entertainment and décor industry. It is in contrast to the message of Aloha and not pono. Food fisheries in Hawai'i are managed by catch quota, monitoring protocol and mandatory dealer reports. Other reef wildlife is protected by law like corals: it is unlawful to break, damage or take corals from Hawaiian waters. I support bill SB1240 to ensure a sustainable future for Hawaii reefs; end new aquarium permits with a moratorium on existing permits pending a comprehensive plan for sustainable management. Testimony on SB 1240

Bruce A. Carlson, Ph.D.

Honorable members of the Senate Committee on Water and Land:

Conservation biologists recognize that all humans interact with the environment and therefore they work to develop management where natural resources can be used sustainably. The United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization states that: *"Fishing is sustainable when it can be conducted over the long-term at an acceptable level of biological and economic productivity without leading to ecological changes that foreclose options for future generations".* This contrasts with a preservationist ethic where no extraction of any kind is permitted.

Reef fishes spawn thousands of eggs, often daily, throughout the year, and the eggs and larvae from protected areas are widely distributed, including to areas where fishing is permitted. <u>The prodigious</u> reproductive ability of reef fishes coupled with a management system of protected areas, is the reason why an aquarium fishery can continue on a sustainable basis in perpetuity.

The West Hawaii Aquarium Fishery is an example of one of the most regulated and best managed fisheries in the State. This is a direct consequence of ACT 306 (1998) directing DLNR, along with community input, to establish what has now become a textbook example for the management and monitoring of a coral reef fishery. Data clearly indicate that these long-term actions have resulted in the stabilization of populations of herbivorous fishes collected for the aquarium trade. Instead of shutting this activity down, the Legislature should applaud the work conducted by DLNR staff and act to apply these lessons to other herbivorous fish species, such as *uhu* (parrotfishes), which are the species of primary concern to reef biologists. Last year, <u>DAR/DLNR surveyed hundreds of coral reef biologists both worldwide and locally and they responded that aquarium collecting activities were of minimal importance compared to other factors affecting the resiliency of our coral reefs; references:</u>

- 1. Coral Bleaching Recovery Workshop, Final Report, DLNR, August 11, 2016
- 2. West Hawaii, Integrated Ecosystem Assessment: Ecosystem Trends and Status Report, NOAA Fisheries Pacific Science Center, special publication SP-16-004

It is not necessary for the Legislature to pass additional legislation requiring the State of Hawaii to shutdown aquarium fish collecting and then define sustainable collecting. Ensuring sustainability is already required by ACT 306 1998 and codified as HRS 188F. For example, among the stated purposes of ACT 306 were to:

- (1) Effectively manage fishery activities to ensure sustainability
- (2) Enhance nearshore resources
- (3) Minimize conflicts of use in this coastal area (West Hawaii)

Also, the text of <u>SB 1240</u> misrepresents the conclusions presented in the <u>DLNR 2014</u> report to the Legislature. SB 1240 states that "according to the report…populations of native near shore species have disappeared as increasing threats of climate change, ocean acidification, habitat degradation, and pollution diminish prospects for their proliferation." Nowhere in the report do the words: "disappeared", "threats" "ocean acidification" "pollution" or "proliferation" even appear. Rather, among the report's actual conclusions are:

1. Based on over a decade and a half of experience, the <u>WHFC has been found to be a</u> <u>model system for the resolution of issues surrounding fisheries resources</u>

- 2. <u>Fifteen years after closure, the population of Yellow Tang has increased 64.5% in the fish</u> replenishment areas, while its abundance in the Open Areas has not declined significantly.
- Overall YT abundance in the 30'-60' depth range over the entire West Hawaii coast has increased 58% (over 1.3million fish) from 1999 – 2013 to a current population of 3.6 million fish
- 4. The FRA management system has also been successful in increasing Kole populations (the second most collected species).

In conclusion: The system of marine protected areas and fish replenishment areas established on the West Hawaii coast as a result of ACT 306 (1998) has proven to be effective and should be receiving accolades for effective management. <u>Nearly two decades of work involving legislators, state employees, the public and aquarium fishermen have produced a model management program that has become the very definition of a sustainable fishery.</u> How could it be otherwise when the populations of key aquarium fish species have been stable or increasing despite continued collecting activity. Do not backtrack on the progress you, the Legislature, have helped create. <u>We urge even greater support for the measures promulgated in ACT 306 (1998) including the application of this fishery management model to other reef fish species of concern in Hawaii.</u>

Dear Chair Rhoads and Committee Members:

I wholeheartedly support SB1240. I am a businessman. I have a BS in Zoology and a MS in Tropical Agriculture. Both my undergraduate and graduate studies involved interactions between species.

I have learned to appreciate the powerful symbioses that evolved with living creatures on Earth. The existence of most plants, animals, and fungi are so intertwined that with the elimination of one seemingly small player, an entire ecosystem can collapse. This was illustrated when the California sea otter was nearly wiped out. The great schools of fis disappeared from the Pacific Ocean off the California coast, followed by the fis ermen. Scientists discovered that sea otters ate species of sea urchins that dined on kelp forests that, in turn, provided sanctuary to fis species. And kelp forests take CO2 out of the atmosphere through photosynthesis! I think you can see where I am going with this argument.

Many herbivorous fis species have symbiotic relationships with coral reefs. Just one of many examples is the Yellow Tang that eats algae that would otherwise smother the coral reefs. The unchecked growth of algae can contribute to coral bleaching and, potentially, the collapse of the entire ocean ecosystem. The Yellow Tang is apparently the favorite species for the local aquarium collectors. The reduction in their numbers alone could greatly harm Hawaii's ocean ecosystem.

The collection of Hawaii's reef fis must be limited, pending more intensive independent research to determine various species populations and dynamics. SB1240 helps address another part of the puzzle in our quest to determine the importance of all these interactions.

RE: SUPPORT for SB1240; Relating to Aquatic Life

For the Fishes strongly supports SB1240 which would place a moratorium on aquarium fish permits until a definition of "sustainable" and practices and limits designed to achieve sustainability are proposed to the legislature and enacted. We also urge you to consider amending SB1240 so that it includes aquatic life *taken by any means* for aquarium purposes. The possesion of an aquarium permit under HRS188-31 is not necessarily required to take aquatic life for aquarium purposes. For example, in its current form, the bill excludes important fishes such as sharks and eels, which may be captured by means other than fine mesh nets, and invertebrates such as hermit crabs, which are captured from tidepools and shallow reefs by hand, in numbers ranging from tens to hundreds of thousands annually.

For at least a decade, DLNR has referred to the "sustainability" of wildlife capture by the aquarium trade when opposing efforts aimed at reducing aquarium trade impacts and restoring abundance to a majority of Hawaii's reefs. These bills, rules, and resolutions, whether at the state, county or local levels, have proposed solutions ranging from take and permit limits, to area closures and total bans. In all cases, hundreds to thousands of Hawaii residents and concerned citizens elsewhere have urged the adoption of strong measures to address and mitigate the trade's degradation of Hawaii's reefs. Equally, in all cases, DLNR has based their opposition and inaction, either in part or whole, on the so-called "sustainable" level of take by the aquarium trade, inexplicably ignoring their own publications and reports by staff that document the opposite of sustainable. For example:

- "Storm effects combined with overfishing resulted in the collapse of the aquarium fishery along [the southwest] portion of the Oahu coastline" (Walsh, et al./DLNR 2004).
- Aquarium fishing is a "main cause of coral reef degradation" on Oahu and Hawaii Island (DLNR, 1998)
- "a number of aquarium-targeted species have not responded to the increase in protected areas and have actually decreased in West Hawai'i since 1999" (Walsh, et al./DLNR 2010)
- Severe overfishing for aquarium trade occurs even in the United States: Aquarium fishes **outside** of reserves [in West Hawaii] experience significant declines from 14% to 97% (U.S. Coral Reef Task Force, citing the West Hawai'i Aquarium Project Report, 2002)
- DAR Administrator Frazer McGilvray testified against Oahu aquarium trade rules because they did not address ongoing unsustainable take and were contrary to good natural resource management. He referred to the rules as akin to setting a speed limit at 400 MPH. (McGilvray, 2014 attached)

In 2014/2015, as participants in a BLNR directed process to engage stakeholders and scientists outside the aquarium trade in developing next steps for Oahu aquarium fishery rules, we learned that a definition for a sustainable aquarium fishery has never been determined by DLNR/DAR. In a Feb. 26, 2015 email disseminating meeting notes related to this process, then DAR acting administrator, Mr. Alton Miyasaka, summarized the outcome, as follows: *"The main management questions remained unanswered. Those questions are, What does sustainable mean, how do you measure it, what are the management goals, and how do you know if you are meeting those goals."* (attached)

We received that news with enthusiasm and hope, however it was extremely short-lived. On the very next day, Feb. 27, we attended the House JUD committee hearing on HB873 HD1, a bill with extensive community support that would have effectively managed the AQ trade for the first time in Hawaii's history. Mr. Carty Chang, the interim director of the BLNR had submitted testimony for DLNR opposing the bill and alluding to the sustainability of the trade.ⁱ The DAR acting administrator was present at the hearing and answered various questions posed by committee members. In doing so, he directly contradicted the message sent on the day prior by stating to the committee that HB873 HD1 is unnecessary because AQ take is "sustainable". Additional comments from the acting DAR administrator further mislead the committee by:

- Incorrectly portraying West Hawaii yellow tang abundance as having doubled.
- Neglecting to mention significant declines of other heavily targeted AQ species in West Hawaii.
- Neglecting to mention that the yellow tang fishery on leeward Oahu collapsed in the late 1980's and has not recovered.
- Neglecting to mention that four months prior, his former supervisor and DAR administrator at the time, Mr. Frazer McGilvray, had refused to sign-off on the Oahu AQ rules because they were "contrary to good natural resource management".

The glaring inconsistencies we've presented here are just some, of many, examples, and we hope serve to explain why we think SB1240 is so important. While we realize the financial challenges this measure could potentially cause to some trade members, we urge you to consider the following when making your decision:

- "Full-time" work in the trade equates to 3 days/week (Stevenson, 2011)
- About 70 people, statewide, report aquarium fish capture and sale to DLNR about half are "part-time" only.
- Holding commercial fishing licenses, many already engage in fishing for "kau kau" fish and would be able to supplement incomes in that manner (per testimonies from trade members; and, William Aila, 2008).

We hope you'll see the urgent need for this measure in order to reverse the depletion, collapse and degradation that's been ongoing for decades and is surely <u>un</u>sustainable. We urge your support for SB1240, and we thank you very much for this opportunity to testify.

REQUEST TO APPROVE PROPOSED NEW HAWAII ADMINISTRATIVE RULES, CHAPTER 13-77, OAHU AQUARIUM LIFE MANAGEMENT, TO ESTABLISH NEW REGULATIONS ON GEAR, BAG, AND SIZE LIMITS FOR AQUARIUM COLLECTING ON OAHU

Submitted for your consideration is a proposed new Administrative Rule to manage aquarium fish collection on Oahu. There are separate aquarium collection rules for Kona (adopted 2013). This process was started in August 2011. A group of commercial aquarium collectors from Oahu presented to the Department a proposal to regulate the aquarium fishery. They recognized the need for management of the fishery to reduce waste of limited resources and to implement conservation measures that would ensure the long-term economic viability of the fishery.

After receiving the commercial collector proposal, the Division of Aquatic Resources (DAR) held a publicly noticed meeting on November 3, 2011 to discuss the proposal with the broader community. In December 2011, DAR held several working group meetings with different groups of commercial aquarium collectors to refine the proposal and develop the basis for the proposed rules. On January 13, 2012, the Board approved holding a public hearing on the rules.

On June 20, 2012, the Small Business Regulatory Review Board (SBRRB) reviewed the proposed rules at its meeting of June 20, 2012 and recommended the rules proceed to public hearing. Dr. Gail Grabowski (Chaminade University), presented testimony in opposition to the proposed rules. The SBRRB recommended that DAR meet with Dr. Grabowski to discuss her objections. DAR met with her on August 14, 2012. DAR did not change the proposed rules. She argued the rules were not restrictive enough.

On December 5, 2012, a public hearing was conducted at the Waimalu Elementary School in Pearl City, Oahu. DAR received more than 4,000 testimonies. 98% opposed the proposal in varying degrees. Testimonies were pre-printed post cards or form letters. Opposing testimony called for limits on the number of aquarium permits issued or a moratorium on collecting. Opposing testimony focused on the proposed bag limits which they thought were too large. They did not suggest a particular number.

The Division has insufficient scientific information about marine species taken by Oahu aquarium collectors to judge their status. The purpose of these rules is to reduce waste and overcrowding while being collected. The majority of this waste occurs after the fish is taken, due to overcrowding or rough handling the fish are injured prior to delivery to the - 10

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dealer. The dealers will not buy injured fish. Inexperienced collectors often overcrowd their small boats with fish in hopes of higher revenues, take species they cannot market, use too much net, or do not take proper care in handling the fish.

These rules do not address the take of undersize, sexually immature, fish. Yellow tang mature at 5½ inches in length, but these rules would allow the take of up to 100 fish per day under 5 inches. The majority of yellow tang allowed to be taken under this rule are immature and have not contributed to the future of the species. These rules, driven by the demands of the trade, are contrary to good natural resource management. The take of juveniles is generally prohibited. The take of adults is allowed but only where good management practices govern the take.

The proposed rules have new limits on nets used to collect the marine life, daily commercial bag limits, commercial size limits, and a prohibition on the take of certain fish species. The proposed net limits are intended to reduce the use of too long nets that would tend to increase injury to the fish collected. The proposed daily commercial bag limits are large, but these numbers are less than the numbers that currently may be collected. The proposed commercial rule allows the take of 6 very small (less than 1½ inches) and 6 very large (greater than 5½ inches) yellow tang, and 6 kole greater than 5½ inches. The proposed commercial limit on the take of cleaner wrasse recognizes that this species has a very specialized diet. It would be difficult for the average aquarist to provide the proper food to keep this species alive, but there is some take allowed to supply the experience aquarists and the public aquariums, which have the expertise to care for this species. The proposed prohibition on the take of the butterflyfishes is in recognition of the strictly corallivore diets of these species.

Not all Oahu commercial collectors agree with the rule. Some collectors feel that no new regulations are needed. However, they do agree that waste should be avoided and these rules are a step towards reducing waste.

Attached are:

- a) the hearing minutes (Appendix 1);
- b) a summary of the comments and our responses to those comments (Appendix 2); and
- c) the final draft rules (Appendix 3).

DAR made a number of minor changes to the version the Board approved for public hearing on January 13, 2012. The date of implementation of the net gear restrictions has been changed from December 31, 2012 to July 1, 2015 to provide the collectors time to transition to the new gear restrictions. Moreover, the December 2012 date has already passed. Other changes are recommended by the Deputy Attorney General for purposes of clarity and format. These are not considered significant changes and will not require another public hearing.

RECOMMENDATION:

These rules were drafted and submitted for public hearing two (2) years <u>before</u> I became the DAR Administrator. These rules are submitted to you at the request of the Chairperson.

However, as DAR Administrator, I cannot recommend their approval because:

- There is not yet sufficient population data to judge the carrying capacity of the various fish populations;
- The taking of 100 immature yellow tang per person per day is not consistent with good natural resource management when there are more than 50 licensed aquarium collectors on Oahu; and
- There appears to be no scientific basis for the proposed bag limits for each species.

It is my belief that these rules require further work and are not yet ready for adoption.

Therefore, I respectfully dissent.

You may note that while the meeting was a good overview of what kinds of studies are being done by whom, the main management questions remained unanswered. Those questions are What does sustainable mean, how do you measure it, what are the management goals, and how do you know if you are meeting those goals.

The attached document contains my meeting notes, followed by the agenda, then the handouts the various participants provided.

The main takeaways from the meeting were that the managers have to decide what the management goals are, not the scientists. The scientists have the tools or can design the tools to answer the questions but the managers have to first decide what the questions are. For example, science can tell you what the maximum sustainable yield (MSY) for a stock should be but the managers have to determine if sustainable means 20%, 50%, or 80% of MSY. Should the managers use a stock assessment based on catch and effort as the measure of abundance or length-based models instead?

The %33 percent Kona West Hawaii FRA aquarium fish closure and its success is not required for the rest of the state. The larger area of the big island fishery made it practical there. To do the same for other islands is counterproductive and just forces fishermen into less areas creating greater impact on any remaining open areas. Less area means less rotation of fishing spots and more impact not less.

We already have around 30% closure. Of the Main Hawaiian Islands another 30 percent is protected by Sanctuaries, Marine Protected Areas, Fish Replenishment Areas (FRA), Marine Life Conservation Districts (MCLD), Refuges, Fishery Management Areas (FMA), National Monuments, restricted military areas and the strictest laws of any State in the United States.

The vast majority of the Hawaiian Island shores are untouched by fishing and diving. High surf in the winter closes northern shores of all islands for many months. Summer surf affects southern shores. High winds from the east, for most of the year shut down east shores for diving. Poor accessibility too many areas due to distance, lack of harbors and roads, ensures these areas remain untouched. More than 90% of Hawaii is not impacted by fishing! Almost all of Hawaiian waters receive periods of "no catch" due to weather and inaccessibility. Untouched areas are already in place.

Most of isles' coral recover from mass bleaching (Corals did not bleach last year and nearly all recovered state wide!)

HONOLULU (HawaiiNewsNow) -

It's being called a spawning event of "Biblical" proportions -- a summer swarm of fish over Hawaii's reefs. Aquarium fisherman and underwater photographer Ron Tubbs shot video off Oahu's coastline showing the population explosion.

"I made a special trip last week to see it and video it myself. It really is unlike anything anyone has ever seen," Rene Umberger said. Even **dive shop owner**, anti fishing activists agree there lots tons of reef fish right now all across Hawaii.

"In 35 years this is the most fish I have ever seen. For most species, it's just incredible. It's just amazing. Areas where you see hundreds of fish normally, that's a lot of fish for an area, you're seeing thousands of fish," Ron Tubbs said "This year the numbers are just exceptional." What about Aquarium fishing in Hawaii?

January 2014 saw the new Kona aquarium fish rules go into law. Aquarium fishermen and Kona DLNR scientists created stricter laws for an already sustainably fishery. Dr. Bill Walsh now advocates for these fishermen due to their cooperation and efforts to maintain fish populations. The same thing has been done on Oahu with the DLNR researchers there. The Oahu DLNR scientists also believe we are already sustainable but agree further regulations can help to protect our reef fish. The Oahu rules should go in to effect sometimes in 2015. As a result we have wide spread support from many members of Hawaii's legislature, DNLR and UH scientists and even private eco groups who once opposed us. Aquarium fishermen continue to work with researchers to make it the greatest sustainably fishery in the world. The oceans belong to all and to protect them and preserve it wonders is the job of all ocean users.

What do Hawaii's ocean researchers say about aquarium fish collecting?

Here are some shortened quotes from Public testimony Hawaii County Council testimony 2014, Hawaii news now and West Hawaii Today news excerpts.

Dr. Bill Walsh October 2014:

In my capacity as the West Hawai'i Aquatic Biologist for the Division of Aquatic Resources I have been involved in the management and biological monitoring of the West Hawai'i aquarium fishery for over 15 years.

I would like to share with you some of the results of our latest monitoring efforts as they relate to the issue at hand. Two species, the Yellow Tang and Kole make up over 93% of all aquarium fish caught in West Hawai'i. Since the no-aquarium collecting Fish Replenishment Areas (FRAs) were established in 1999 (protecting 35% of the coastline), the numbers of Yellow Tang have increased in the FRAs by almost 65% while not significantly decreasing in the remaining Open Areas. In the 30'-60' depth range alone, the numbers of Yellow Tang in West Hawai'i have increased by 1.3 million fish. Similarly Kole populations have increased not only in the FRAs (by 24%) but also in the Open Areas as well (by 28%). Kole populations in the same depth range have increased by over 2 million fish! Clearly resource management efforts are working in West Hawai'i.

Scientific studies which have indeed found high levels of mortality among aquarium fishes have typically been conducted in remote areas with poor handling capabilities. That is clearly not the case in Hawai'i.

Dr. Dan Polhemus:

It is a good thing for folks to scrutinize and ask questions about what's going on in our fisheries and on our reefs. These are important to all of us. A realistic perspective does need to be maintained however. Let me elaborate. On Maui in 2009 there were a total of 16,300 aquarium animals caught, representing 82 different species. Yellow tangs accounted for 69% while Kole was 7% of the catch. During that same year non-aquarium commercial fishers captured (and killed) 319,491 reef fishes of 75 species. While yellow tangs weren't caught to any degree there was considerable overlap in a number of the other species. To the commercial food catch one can add another 480,000 reef fish taken by recreational/subsistence fishers (extrapolated from 2006 NOAA Rec Fishing Survey data). So, in the grand scheme of things, the aquarium take on Maui is literally a drop in the bucket, representing less than 2% of the total mortality of reef animals that year. This serves to point out that undue focus and hyperbole about aquarium collecting and its impact on the reefs is dangerously shortsighted and counterproductive. We need to think and act holistically.

Hope I didn't overwhelm you with numbers. (as of 2014 no aquarium fish collectors were taking fish on Maui and the number of collectors state wide have decreased and so has catch.)

Emily S. Munday, M.S.

For my master's research at Washington State University, I studied the West Hawaii aquarium trade from 2010-2012. Part of my study focused on holding and transport of live yellow tang in the West Hawaii aquarium trade.

My research on fish holding and transport indicated that the practices implemented by Hawaiian fish exporters do not cause mortality in yellow tang. In June of 2012, I collaborated with fishers and exporters in Kona, and caught 60 yellow tang from the reef, held them in a working export facility, and shipped them from Kona, HI to Portland, OR. The fish were then transported to the Hatfield Marine Science Center in Newport, OR where they resided for 6 months. My study shows 100% survival rate of these tangs during collection, holding in the export facility, air transport, and after a 6-month holding period. In fact, the fish have now become part of an exhibit at the Hatfield Marine Science Center about sustainability in the aquarium trade and I have received no reports of mortality after 2.5 years.

As far as aquarium related mortality in Hawaii goes here's a quote from a Cesar 2002 study "Mortality rates of aquarium fish are low and have gone down considerably since the last survey in 1984. Currently, mortality rates from collection to wholesaler are estimated at 0 to 1 percent. In the wholesaler's tanks, mortality rates range from close to 0% up to 2%. During shipment, rates range from 0.75% to 2%. This give a current total of between 1% and 5%, down from a range of 5% to 8% in the early 1980's (van Poolen and Obara, 1984; estimates of wholesalers and collectors, own study).

These studies quoted are old and much better technology and care techniques now exist so we are sure it is an even lower rate today. Decreased transport times due to better roads and more airline flights make it even easier to ship shipments with no DOA at all. Life extension techniques are used by the hobbyist at all times. Customers demand such care. Life spans of fish can be greatly increased in captivity. Many aquarium fish hobbyists tout their ability to increase fish pets life spans. Several cases have pet fish owners keeping fish alive for 15 years.

Life span of the average fish in the wild can be very short. Without enough food and the predators eating many smaller fish survivability to adult breeding state is only 2%. In 2014 a much bigger percentage survived due to increases in plankton due mainly to changes in currents. If the food is there the 1-5 million fry per adult pair spawning can result in astronomical population growth. This has resulted in biblical increases in fish populations in fall of 2014.

A few species like Angels only produce 10,000 fry per spawning which is way below the norm for most reef fish. Even those species are doing great in population numbers. Fish are very efficient breeders.

A great deal of the "sky is falling" news you've heard about the reef recently is just plain not true. Try giving credit to the thousands of volunteer hours given by your neighbors to the West Hawaii Fisheries Council to get the gains you are now free to enjoy. (done with the help of Aquarium Fishermen on the council who agreed to the laws)

Lost Fish Coalition, through the venue of the West Hawaii Fisheries Council, has been working with many stakeholders to get a reasonable settlement to the long-standing problem of the aquarium industry harvest. In almost 16 years, we have accomplished the following management actions:

• We have 55-plus miles of coastline where reef fish cannot be taken. These areas allow the fish to grow large enough to be very successful breeders. These areas — Fish Replenishment Areas — are the nurseries for the reef fish to spread out to the rest of the reefs.

Thanks to these measures, West Hawaii has more fish than most every other widely accessed reef in the state, especially the beautiful ornamentals that give tourists and residents so much delight. If someone says that nothing has been done in West Hawaii, they are either lying, unaware or are being duped by someone else's lies about the situation. There are a few "outsiders," by which I mean people who don't live here, who have decided that West Hawaii doesn't know what it's doing. This group, headed by Maui resident Robert Wintner, and Wintner's frontman Rene Umberger, decided it was going to be the ones to get aquarium collecting banned, to make themselves the "rescuers of the reef."

Clearly if the goal is to get rid of the industry and management prevents that goal being reached, then discrediting the benefits and successes of management would seem the only way left to go. And so they have taken that path.

They have held community meetings and displayed a lot of false or twisted data, quoting from papers outdated by more than 15 years, and "re-interpreting" data from scientific papers. They have been telling people that "there are no fish left," which is patently untrue. I once had a woman tell me with great passion and assurance that there are no fish left anywhere in West Hawaii. I asked her why she thought that, and she replied that everyone knew it. I asked if she swam in the ocean. No. Did she dive? No. Did she know anything about the management strategies in place? No. She had, however, just come from an "information session" in which she heard these things from Wintner's frontman Rene Umberger.

Which brings me back to the wide-screen TV. The TV runs a 90-minute loop of undisturbed, natural activity of fish on the reef. Apparently, the footage was filmed on West Hawaii reefs. The article states: "Wintner praised the videos. 'It shows what abundance looks like,' Wintner said." At least he got that right.

I have been involved in global environmental causes since 1982, worked with the United National Environment Programme from 1986-1996, co-negotiated the first global environmental treaty between the USA and the USSR in 1990 (the "Only One Earth" Treaty at the UN), and have been an advisor to various environmental causes and associations over half of my lifetime.

Sustainability is a phrase which can be easily misinterpreted to mean access over an actual nature-specific sustainable level. For example, it is true that clear-cutting down 2,000 year-old Redwood trees and replanting seedlings on a ratio of 4:1 can be seen as sustainable if one pushes out the impact of sustainability to, say, 2,000 years. However, that length of time is ridiculous as recent rain storms have shown in California as such seedlings lack the root support due to clear-cutting practices. Selecting cutting could be said to be more sustainable, but still evaluating the impact over a 2,000 year period is, frankly, folly more akin to spiritual divination than science and fact.

Reef cultures, bio-diversity of marine life, and, never least, the inter-relationship of marine life populations are virtually unknown, hardly studied across broad undersea acreage, and never, once, seen as a priority for life on Earth as we know it.

"As we know it" is a key phrase here. We know so little, it is true, but what we do know about the structure of marine eco-systems, seas' pollution, and dwindling undersea life colonies leads only to one conclusion: Preservation is critical before we reach a tipping point. The simple fact is, those countries that have preserved their undersea life best shows a lack of degradation of marine eco-culture and, importantly, are able to sustain a financial resource in eco-tourism which far outweighs the scant benefit to a profit motive industry pillaging reefs of what is, after all, a publically held natural resource.

Those fishing and marine capture industries are like the logging companies selling Redwoods to the Japanese. If those logging companies wanted to cut the nation's oldest

living trees in Kings Canyon and Sequoias National Park – say the General Grant tree, would not the argument be that such a resource is help in the public trust for the benefit of tourism and the nation? So too with the marine life surrounding Hawaii, such reefs and marine life are part of the national trust, of great benefit to the tourism industry of Hawaii and, importantly should be best preserved for the benefit of future generations.

I urge you to support the passing of SM1240.

Testimony in support of SB 1240

Ladies and Gentlemen:

While we sit at our desks, idle our cars at traffic lights, watch movies in our houses, hike or jog or walk or bike- and while we go about our busy lives we cannot be fully aware-- as terrestrial creatures on two legs--- that there is another world. A world under the surface of the ocean.

Having spent decades of my life in offices and at desks, how well I know how far away nature can seem.

Who can explain the wonder we feel with mask, snorkel and fins swimming in Hawaii's oceans-- viewing the wildlife at Hawaii's reefs-----Some of my personal favorite beach parks and places are "Four Mile" (Kealoha Beach Park), Richardsons, "Two Step", Kapoho, Puako, and Hapuna.

People may think Hawaii has very little wildlife- being such an isolated Island chain. But really Hawaii has abundant wildlife—it's just underwater.

History has shown that the humanity does not have a great track record when it comes to protecting wildlife. I don't begrudge anybody trying to make a living—we all have to do it--but taking wildlife from Hawaii's near shore reefs, our public trust -- has got to be sustainable and strictly regulated.

Just because Hawaii's abundant wildlife is hidden underwater, it should not be available for the grabbing for those seeking profit. We can understand that the spectacular colors, enchanting movements and pure charm of these critically important reef creatures are dazzling-- and marketable to aquarium enthusiasts worldwide. If there is a dollar to be made—some enterprising human will be all over it. But in this case some seller's opportunity--- is Hawaii's very real loss.

A coral reef is like an underwater rain forest. It needs its reef fish. It needs its herbivores to stay healthy.

Should we as stewards of Hawaii's reefs allow Hawaii's wildlife to be snatched up and sold? No! Of course not. These dazzling reef creatures are OUR wildlife—not just for aquarium traders to net up and sell.

Let us treasure and protect OUR wildlife, OUR fish. OUR reefs. OUR oceans in Hawaii.

For me this is personal. I know these Hawaii reef fish species first hand. I have watched them in the wild. I know they are beautiful beyond words. That is why I spend countless hours with snorkel, fins and mask in Hawaii's waters. And I am not the only one.

No dazzling colorful fish in our reefs—no tourist dollars. Even I can do the math.

It is worth noting that these animals have real lives, real families, and feel real pain. They experience real fear and real stress. They also experience good feelings just like we do. They have sentience. And they are so much a part of the reefs--- the reefs depend on them to stay healthy. That is science. Not sentiment. Don't' take my word for it. Read the book "What a Fish Knows" by Jonathan Balcombe, Ph.D (2016).

My daughter is at U.C. Davis right now studying Fish and Wildlife Conservation. Our oceans are in trouble. Overfishing, dumping millions of tons of plastic and trash, acidification and global warming----human impacts from a human population going on nine billion are taking a toll. Read the Pulitzer Prize winning Sixth Extinction by Elizabeth Kolbert (2014).

So why should we even consider risking the health of Hawaii's reefs? Why should we even consider letting the aquarium trade have free rein to decimate the most colorful and fantastic looking species of reef fish that live in Hawaii?

The untold multitudes of fish taken by the aquarium traders don't even live long in the aquariums. If they make it that far. What a waste! And what a rip off.

No—let's not allow it. Let's stop it. Or at the very least let's strictly regulate it—after extensive study. Until then—<u>complete moratorium</u>. These fish are Hawaii's property and heritage. Fight for them. Go to bat for them.

If Hawaii's government officials won't even take the time to study whether the unfettered taking of Hawaii's beautiful and amazing reef fish for commercial exploitation by short sighted profiteers is sustainable--- we are in trouble ----our priorities aren't right. Other countries like Indonesia protect their fish and their reefs- they know that it is a huge tourist draw- and the right thing to do. Hawaii should be a leader in this area of stewardship and conservation—not dragging behind.

Let's be the Hawaii that recognizes the treasure that these dazzling reef herbivores are in their natural and true home. Defend Hawaii? Defend her fish! These fish have evolved over millions of years to keep the priceless coral reefs healthy.. Let's not let some people destroy or degrade the reefs for their own short term profit. The ocean and the reefs are part of a web of life that keep all life on earth alive and well.

We need a moratorium as set forth in SB1240 now. We have been putting this off way too long. Let's protect the beautiful reef fish that Hawaii is so famous for. Let's protect them so they will multiply and flourish and bring joy to countless people who come from near and far—just for the privilege of viewing them where they belong and where they are most safe---- in Hawaii's own reefs.

I absolutely without reservation support SB1240.

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While SB1240 is a strong measure in its own right, sharks should be included in the moratorium of takings via aquarium permits given their global and local vulnerability and importance. As apex predators, sharks hold a key role in maintaining the health of ecosystems by preventing any mesopredator release from further exacerbating fish declines, particularly in regards to that of aesthetically appealing reef fishes that draw immense tourist interest, increasing revenue via activities such as snorkeling, scuba diving, and other ecotourism ventures in addition to all other businesses that benefit from increased tourism presence (i.e. hotels, restaurants, taxis, etc.) and maintain the health of the corals themselves by maintaining proper algal growth which if left unabated is both damaging to the ecosystem and visually unappealing. The value of fish, particularly that of sharks, is even greater when assessing the impact that decrease taking for aquaria purposes would have when looking at fishing yields, even when the species protected are not those sought by commercial and recreational efforts given the complexity of food webs. Sharks not only maintain proper ecosystem balances, allowing all other fish populations to persist at healthy levels, they also serve a critical role in keeping disease prevalence at normal, low levels by disproportionately preying upon sick fish, thereby reducing the spread of disease that could wipe out crucial fish stocks and populations. All in all, this measure could greatly benefit the community, various stakeholders, and the ecosystems themselves when fish are left to engage in their natural ecosystem services in the water and the benefits produced by such a measure will dramatically increase if expanded to include sharks and shark pups on the aquarium permit moratorium until tangible definitions of sustainable takes can be made.

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Testimony of William Chandler on SB 1240 Before the Senate Committee on Water and Land February 15, 2017

My name is William Chandler and I support SB 1240. I am an environmental policy expert with over 30 years' experience in the marine and terrestrial fields. I have spent approximately 10 years working on Hawaii conservation issues. As former vice president of government affairs and consultant with Marine Conservation Institute, I led the institute's policy initiatives to improve both the federal program for conserving the Hawaiian monk seal, and to establish protected US marine reserves in Hawaii and the US Pacific territories of the United States.

When a fragile environmental area such as coral reefs suffers significant damage, restoration depends on government (1) reducing or stopping damaging uses within the area either permanently or for a long period of time to restore the area, (2) strictly regulating and enforcing direct and indirect uses of the area, or (3) establishing a fully protected reserve.

Use regulations have failed spectacularly in the conservation of large swaths of Hawaii's reefs and aquatic wildlife as evidenced by scientific studies on the status of the state's coral reef ecosystems and reef fish populations. The fact that the state has no limit on the number of permits issued to take aquatic life, and furthermore does not limit the amount of take under most issued permits as stated by SB 1240, flies in the face of modern wildlife and fisheries management as practiced by most states today. Although there is more than one stressor on coral reefs, populations of many reef fish species collected for the aquarium trade have been reduced significantly from their naturally occurring population size by industrial-level collecting. This trade must stop if Hawaii hopes to recover its near shore resources.

It is time to change course. SB 1240 would do this by placing a moratorium on new permits for the taking of "near shore aquatic life for aquarium purposes," and directing the Department of Land and Natural Resources to define sustainability and sustainable collection practices, including take limits, for near shore aquatic life. If done well, this strategy will produce long-term benefits for the state's citizens by protecting the state's beauty, spirit, ecology, natural history, fisheries, and economy—all of the things that make the state unique in America and attract visitors like me. Knowledgeable divers no longer go to Caribbean islands because their reefs have been destroyed and reef fish decimated. Hawaii can avoid this fate by passing SB 1240.

I have observed reef fish here for over thirty years. Being also a birdwatcher, I have applied birdwatching techniques to my observations, creating detailed lists. In fact, I may have coined the term, "fishwatching."

With this background, I can say irrefutably that fewer species are to be found at snorkeling depths (down to 20 feet) on the Big Island of Hawaii than were found here 25 years ago. This is not a subtle change...its dramatic and disheartening. It is my impression that those species that remain, it is an intrinsic part of the Hawaiian heritage.

These changes affect tourism, but more importantly our Hawaiian heritage is at stake.

I'm a member of Keauhou Canoe Club and have lived in Hawaii for 30 years. As a paddler, swimmer, snorkeler, etc. I am very concerned about the sustainability of aquarium fish collecting – especially on the Kona Coast of the Big Island where I live.

In the 25+ years I've lived and paddled outrigger canoes in Kailua-Kona, I personally have noted a reduction in the number of yellow tangs in and around the entrance of Keauhou Bay. There's one coral outcropping in particular that used to be completely covered in yellow tangs, but now there are very few if any when I paddle by.

Over the years I've witnessed fish collectors with nets, etc. placed around the bay and in other places along the coast. There's seems to be less obvious illegal collection activity in the last few years – probably due to more visible concern about rules and limits. Unfortunately, it appears that the "damage has been done" in some areas.

I think it's extremely important for Hawaii, and the Kona Coast of the Big Island in particular, to immediately halt all aquarium fish collecting at least until good scientific studies can be completed to determine where, when and how to regulate this industry that benefits only a few while damaging such an important natural resource that should benefit all residents and visitors to the islands.

Fills it with colorful tropical fish (some perhaps caught by profiteers right in Hawaii's aquamarine waters--poor little tropicals!--born to a tropics reef, spending their last days in a suburban living room in gray, frozen Michigan). The fish die. She buys more. They die. She buys more ... this continues. Finally, she gets the "hang" of keeping her little fish alive. One year later--she's tired of the aquarium and offers it for sale on Facebook. I was so disgusted at this point I stopped following the story.

This is the fate of 90% of the tropical fish (statistics say) that make it through capture and transport. (And a large percentage don't even make it that far ...). We know we're over fishing the oceans and emptying them of life. Bad as this is, and it is bad, at least there the fishing is to feed people (starves the seals, orcas, etc but ...). In the tropical fish trade, no such utilitarian motive is offered: instead the fish are snatched from their reefs simply to provide temporary entertainment to bored humans. The loss to the reefs is immeasurable: the gain for the humans, trivial.

Every responsible scientific study, and even Hawaii's own DLNR, say that the management practices currently in place have resulted in an increase in Hawaii's fish population over the last 15 years. Of all the things that affect the health of the reef and its inhabitants, fishing for the aquarium trade has the lowest impact. Tourism, while essential to the Hawaiian economy, has a far greater impact than aquarium fishing does. To see tourism businesses like diving guides complain about the aquarium trade is opportunistic and hypocritical. They are seeking to use the legislature to gain a business advantage, not protect Hawaii.

Marine Protected Areas (MPAs) and the DLNR Aquarium 'White List' for West Hawaii of 40 species permitted for the aquarium trade are working. I support this bill strongly. I can't testify with statistics--I'm a writer, not a biologist--but I can testify what my eyes have seen in nearly 30 years on Hawai'i Island: There are far fewer fish on our reefs than there used to be. Aquarium gathering may not be the only cause of that decline, but it's certainly one cause, and a particularly egregious and gratuitous one. Snorkeling used to be one of my favorite activities, but in recent years, the joy of being out on the reef has been countered more and more by the pain of seeing our local reefs as they are now, and remembering them as they were.

A small, personal example: Back when I was working as a paralegal in Hilo, I used to go out three times a week and snorkel at Richardson Ocean Park. I had a roughly circular route around the bay, defined by the "landmarks" (seamarks?) of particular coral heads. I got to be familiar with the denizens along the route, including six small moray eels that occupied coral niches along the way.

Then, within a few days, all six disappeared.

I can understand people fishing for food, but those six little guys altogether wouldn't have made much of a meal. I suspect somebody nabbed them for the aquarium trade. They probably spent the rest of their lives in somebody's glass cage--and their lives were probably very short, like those of most saltwater aquarium fishes, because they were ripped out of an entire interdependent ecosystem, from corals and algae to cleaner wrasses to grazers to top predators like the moray--a system that simply can't come close to being duplicated and kept in balance in a small glass tank. Had those little guys been left alone on the reef, they could have lived for years and grown into magnificent creatures a few feet long. Instead, they probably died young, for no good reason except that people wanted to ogle them without traveling to Hawaii.

This shouldn't just be a debate about whether or not aquarium gathering is "sustainable." It should be about whether capturing reef fish and shipping them thousands of miles to a slow death in an aquarium is animal cruelty, an unjustified and unnecessary privatization of a public resource, and a friggin' waste.
