1 **Fiscal Implications:** None for the Department of Health.

2 **Department Testimony:** The Department of Health (DOH) supports SB1304.

3 The creation of a Native Hawaiian Public Policy Advisory Council was recommended by the

4 Native Hawaiian Health Task Force, established by Senate Resolution 60 Session Laws of

5 Hawaii 2014. The department's participation on the Task Force revealed an emerging and

6 promising nexus of socio-economic and health data, academic and cultural expertise, and

7 community organization to systematically address root causes of health disparities.

8 Health disparities are avoidable risks and outcomes to an individual or community's health due

9 to differences in environment, health care access, and life opportunity. These so-called "social

10 determinants of health" are <u>overwhelmingly</u> associated with health care costs and quality-

11 adjusted life years when compared to, for example, a family's risk for inherited diseases. In

12 short, your ZIP code exerts greater influence on your health than your genetic code.

13 All residents directly benefit from the host culture's proximity to tourism, for example, as well as

14 natural resource protection, land-use, and education. A Native Hawaiian Public Policy Advisory

15 Council may similarly integrate host culture values into public policy discourse to improve

16 overall public health and Native Hawaiian health.

17 The department defers to the Office of the Lieutenant Governor on any administrative impacts.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) Beneficiary Advocacy and Empowerment Committee will recommend the Board of Trustees a position of <u>COMMENT</u> on SB1304, which seeks to implement the recommendations of the Native Hawaiian Healthcare Task Force and create a multi-disciplinary Native Hawaiian Public Policy Advisory Council.

OHA's strategic priorities include Mauli Ola (Health), which represents our commitment to improve the quality of life of Native Hawaiians, by reducing the onset of chronic diseases and of obesity in particular. In furtherance of this priority, and in line with Act 155 (Reg. Sess. 2014) and Hawai'i Revised Statutes Section 226-20, we support a "social determinants of health" approach that takes a holistic and systemic view in addressing health in Hawai'i's communities. As part of our commitment to Mauli Ola, OHA participated and helped to fund the Native Hawaiian Health Task Force. The recommendations from the report represent the work of 27 agencies and individuals from broad range of fields.

OHA can appreciate that the establishment of a Native Hawaiian Public Policy Advisory Council and the establishment of a directory of Native Hawaiian community leaders for governor appointed positions can positively address Native Hawaiian social determinants of health. Data show that Native Hawaiians continue to have disparate outcomes compared to the rest of the state population, with Native Hawaiians having the highest prevalence of most chronic diseases like asthma, obesity, and diabetes, compared to the state population¹. These health disparities are correlated with disparities in the social determinants of health such as housing, education, social services, leisure, individual rights, culture and public safety. For example, Native Hawaiians have much lower median family income despite higher participation in the labor force². Eliminating disparities and achieving health equity across demographics is a national priority, as unequal health outcomes and disparate well-being are pervasive even when people have health insurance and medical care.

OHA notes that Act 155 (2014) already requires all state agencies to address the social determinants of health of Native Hawaiians and other communities as part of their agency work. We look forward to continuing to work with the agencies and the Council should SB1304 pass.
