S.B. 277 - RELATING TO HEALTH CARE COORDINATION

The Hawaii Government Employees Association, AFSCME Local 152, AFL-CIO has strong concerns and reservations regarding the purpose and intent of S.B. 277 which appropriates \$3 million over the fiscal biennium to implement a model of health care delivery in Maui County.

Although there is brief reference to Section 323F-12, Hawaii Revised Statutes, which outlines short-term and long-term goals for the Maui County privatization of hospital services, it is unclear what these funds will specifically be used to accomplish, who will be expending these funds, and what, if any, level of accountability there will be. Since the privatization of the Maui Region of HHSC has been contentious for employees, we respectfully request that if the Committee continues to move this bill, there be more transparency and accountability.

Thank you for the opportunity to raise strong concerns regarding S.B. 277 as it is currently drafted.

I am submitting testimony in support of SB 277 with amendments

Some of the major issues plaguing the healthcare delivery system are census issues, "wait-list" issues and financial issues.

Census Issues

Maui Memorial Medical Center

From a census standpoint, Maui Memorial is the only acute care hospital on the island, often exceeding its capacity, resulting in "back-ups" in the emergency room due to the lack of beds and/or inability to transport patients to Honolulu.

Much of the problem with Maui Memorial operating over capacity is related to the high number of patients who are no longer considered "acute" and are no longer in need of acute level services (and are not reimbursed as acute care patients) and are waiting a transfer to long term care facilities. Maui Memorial which with around 200 acute care beds, has approximately 35-40 beds per day taken up by these "wait-list" patients (approximately 20%).

Kula Hospital

Kula Hospital is operating near capacity, and for financial reasons related to its Federal "Critical Access Hospital" status, it is most financially beneficial when they have Medicaid/Medicare patients filling their beds.

Hale Makua Health Services

Hale Makua has been operating with a census of about 80-85%, with unoccupied nursing home beds of over 40 beds per day. This is on top of converting one of its Wailuku facility's nursing home wing to a 22 bed adult residential care home. These care home beds have an occupancy of only 50% or 11 beds filled.

Wait-List Issues

The wait-list issue continues to be a significant problem for the healthcare delivery system as these "subacute" patients end up staying in the hospital and often times there are no beds available for acute care patients, which results in acute/emergency room patients being held in the emergency room and/or elective surgical procedures being cancelled to eliminate need for beds. This domino effect results in delayed care of patients by a hospital providing services for the entire island of Maui.

In a study by Hawaii Health Information Corporation (HHIC), the reasons for waitlisted patients across the State were:

- Lack of sufficiently-staffed bed (to appropriately match waitlisted patient health needs)
- Source of payment for high cost antibiotics
- Source of payment for specialty equipment
- Source of payment for higher skill/mix at long-term care facilities

In addition previous studies done by Maui Memorial in collaboration with Hale Makua reflected that 36% of the wait list is related to financial issues. This population includes the uninsured, homeless or Medicaid ineligible.

Financial Issues

The financial issues that have resulted from this wait-list issue is that the cost per day to the State and the healthcare delivery system of a wait-listed patient is \$1,500 per day. Assuming an average of 35-40 patients per day for the year would equate to a loss of \$19.2 million to \$21.9 million per year. Meanwhile, the cost of a SNF/ICF patient at Hale Makua (which currently has capacity) is about \$300 to \$500 per day, or for those same 35-40 patients, \$3.8/\$6.4 million (for 35 patients per day) to \$4.4/\$7.3 million (for 40 patients) per year.

Hale Makua is unable to admit these patients for the following reasons:

- No payer/funding source
- Acuity is higher than the current clinical capabilities at Hale Makua
- Costs to take care of these patients exceeds insurance reimbursement

The problem will be exacerbated as the MMMC-Kaiser transition takes place, as Kaiser is bringing more physician capabilities to Maui to allow more Maui residents to stay on island for their acute care needs. From a financial perspective, without adequate capacity to bring in more profitable services, it will result in continued subsidies to support wait-list patients at the highest cost (hospital vs. nursing home)

Proposed Amendments

It is requested that amendments be made to the bill to provide that the \$1.5 million be used to solicit proposals to reduce the wait-list at Maui Memorial Medical Center to improve the quality of care and to reduce State subsidies to the hospital related to wait list issues

Conclusion

Any resources that are provided to assist in mitigating this problem will

- Improve the quality of care for the residents of Maui County as care will be delivered in the most appropriate care setting
- Increase capacity for Maui Residents and visitors of acute care beds without requiring the construction of new hospital facilities

- Save the State money through the reduction of subsidies to support the wait-list at Maui Memorial Medical Center

Simply put, this bill is a cost-effective investment in the healthcare system on the Island of Maui. These funds will strengthen the existing partnership between Hale Makua Health Services and Maui Memorial Medical Center by supporting physician services, specialized equipment and supportive staffing to assure that patients receive expedited discharge from acute care to skilled nursing or long term care. Hale Makua's two nursing homes and home health agency receive over 40 patients a month from Maui Memorial.
